The Kamiah Cubs edged the Kendrick Tigers 42 to 41 Friday night in an over-time battle. Kendrick led 21-19 at the half-time, and the score was 39-39 at the end of regulation time in the nip and tuck contest.

Fred Mercer sank the winning field goal with two minutes left in the overtime period and after Kendrick missed a chance Kamiah froze the ball for the rest of the extra session. Steve Groseclose sank a field goal with 10 seconds left in the regulation time to force the overtime.

Ed. Reed topped all scores, and Kamiah with 20 points. Bill Blewett tallied 12 points for Kendrick.

Kamiah also won the B squad preliminary 49 to 16.

Mrs. Travis suffered a broken hip recently at her home. The break was set at the hospital late Monday afternoon and she died shortly after being returned to her hospital room. She did not undergo surgery.

She was born April 25, 1887, at Overly, N. D., a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Hagen. She was united in marriage March 23, 1907, to Jack Travis at Bottineau, North Dakota. She moved to Lewiston in 1922 and two years later to the Kendrick-Southwick area, where they farmed and Mr. Travis operated a trucking business. In 1943 they moved to Kendrick, opening and operating a furniture store.

Mrs. Travis was a member of the Kendrick Grange, and attended the Kendrick Community Church. She was a woman beloved of all who knew her, even to acquaintances. The high esteem in which she was held was clearly shown by the packed church and profusion of floral and memorial offerings.

Survivors include her husband, J. G. Travis at Kendrick; one son, Herman of Grangeville; three sisters, Esther Kildgaard of Santa Rosa, Calif.; Effie Bakken of Billings, Mont.; and Tilla Teriff of Lethbridge, Alberta, Canada; three brothers, Herman Hagen of Lethbridge, Melvin Hagen of Haslo, B. ## NEWS NOTES FROM THE HIGH SCHOOL

**Home Ec. II Serves Meal**  
The Home Ec. II class served a meal for the basketball teams, cheer leaders, coaches and officials of Kendrick and Kamiah following the game Friday evening. The menu included: Souper burgers, carrot and celery sticks, milk, jewel jello and cakes made in the shape of a Tiger and a Cub, representing the two teams — and six other cakes decorated in the Christmas motif.

Everyone seemed to enjoy the dinner, and the girls felt they had learned considerably in doing it. To serve 72 people takes a great deal of planning and cooperation by all concerned.

**Serve School Board**  
The Home Ec. I class served a ham dinner to the school board Monday evening, Dec. 12. A pineapple-jello salad in a star mold with pimento on top made a pretty centerpiece as well as an unusual salad. Peas and carrots mixed together, and creamed potatoes were the vegetables.

The girls had made cloverleaf and crescent rolls the week before, and froze them for the dinner. They also made strawberry jam earlier in the year, which they served with the hot rolls. A vegetable juice cocktail with small crackers was served as an appetizer. Coffee and cake completed the menu.

The Home Economics room was decorated for Christmas with stencils on the windows, and little Christmas trees made from ice cream cones, frosting, popcorn and cinnamon candies.

**Vocational Ag. Fills Need**  
Even though the farm population is decreasing every year, the need for persons trained in the fields related to agriculture is increasing. The High School Vocational Agriculture Department helps to fill this need. This division is in part a federally financed and supervised program. Agriculture is a four-year program, where shop work is stressed during the junior and senior years. Livestock and crop production, with an introduction into shop, is given priority during the freshman and sophomore years.

The Voc. Ag. Dept. can be divided into five main categories — shop work, classroom study, home farm projects, the Future Farmers of America organization, and adult education.

In the shop the Ag. boys learn the basic skills such as arc welding, acetylene welding, soldering, tool sharpening, carpentry, plumbing, and forge work. After learning these basic skills, he can go ahead and build or repair things for the home and farm.

The classroom work can involve a variety of subjects — all phases of livestock and crop production, soils, fertilizers, insects, weeds and plant identification, parliamentary procedure, farm management and many others.

The home farm projects are livestock and crop projects, along with supplementary improvement projects and "on the farm training." Some Ag. Depts. have their own ag. farm. This phase gives the boys a chance to learn by doing. It could also give them a start in farming, if carried far enough.

The fourth part of the Ag. program is the Future Farmers of America. This is an organization for and of boys taking Voc. Ag., and like most organizations it has its creed, motto, colors, jackets and symbols. It has its state, national, district and local officers. The national F. F. A. convention is held in Kansas City, Mo., while the state convention is generally held at Moscow. There are many contests sponsored each year for F. F. A. boys. These include livestock judging, crop judging, land judging, parliamentary procedure, and public speaking contests to provide competition between the boys and different schools. There are also trials, such as the Pacific International Livestock Show at Portland; the Junior Livestock Show in Spokane, and the county fairs to provide show places for the boys finished steer, hog or lamb.

Adult education is also a part of the Ag. program, with welding being one of the most popular classes today. These are the components which make up a Vocational Agriculture program.

This is the second in a series of teacher articles — this time presented by Douglas Christensen — on the programs for youth developed in Voc. Ag.

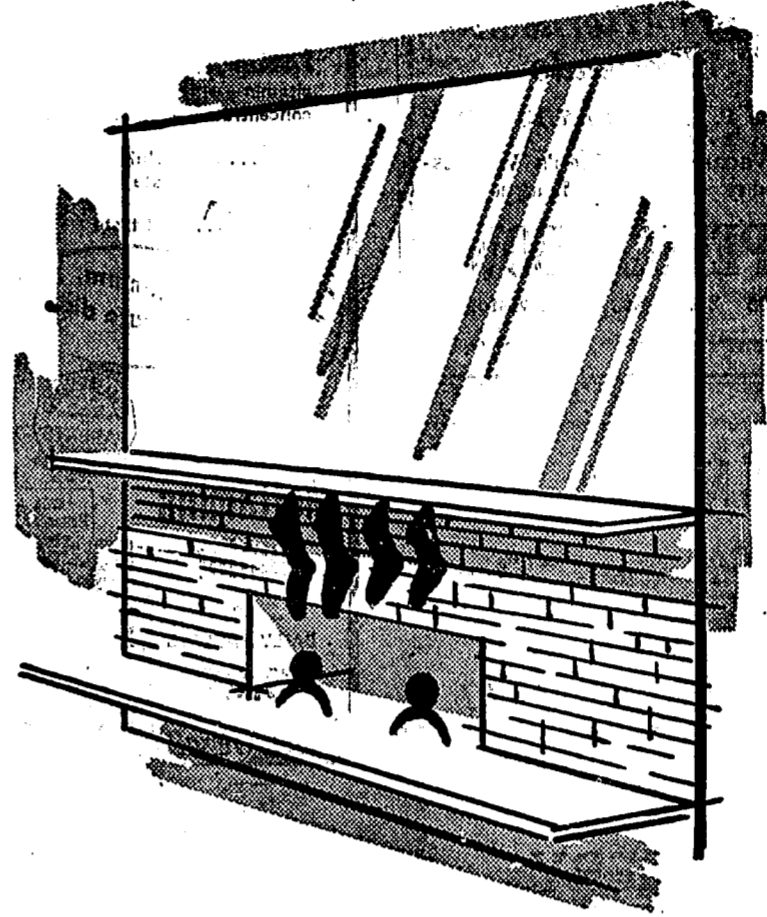

## COUNTIES TO GET FOREST CASH

St. Maries, Idaho — The four counties in which the St. Joe National Forest is located will receive \$135,575.01 as their share of the total receipts from this forest for the period July 1, 1959, to June 30, 1960, according to Supervisor Ray L. Hilding. This is the largest return made to these counties since this payment procedure was established by Congress in 1908. By law, 25 percent of the total receipts from national forests is returned each year to the counties in which the forests are located. In addition, 10 percent of the total receipts also is returned to the forest.

Amounts to be received by the counties are as follows: Benewah, \$7,454.21; Clearwater, \$8,100.23; Latah, \$16,027.45, and Shoshone, \$103,093.13.

The total receipts received by the St. Joe National Forest amounted to \$542,300.26. Of this amount \$536,080 were received from timber sales. The balance was received from grazing, land use, recreation, power and minerals.

Receipts from the forest are based on 47,760 acres in Benewah county, 51,899 acres in Clearwater county, 108,456 acres in Latah county and 660,529 acres in Shoshone county.

Many additional forest values accrue to local communities besides the cash benefits. Among these are recreation, water supplies and access roads. The many miles of access roads built by timber purchasers permit harvest of timber otherwise inaccessible, and make possible the increased recreational use of the forest.
