

## BERNARD H. JONES FINAL RITES FOR

Bernard Horton Jones, 49, a life-long resident of Big Bear ridge, and well known farmer, died Wednesday morning, December 21, at 7:35 o'clock at his home on that ridge. Mr. Jones had suffered from heart trouble for some four years, and a heart attack was the immediate cause of death.

He was serving as temporary mail carrier on the routes out of Kendrick, and had gone from the house to service his pickup preparatory to departure for Kendrick when stricken. He was found by his brother, Ray, with whom he lived.

Mr. Jones, with his brother Ray, and the late Claude Jones, had farmed on Big Bear ridge all his life. In addition he was the substitute mail carrier.

Bernard Horton Jones was born Sept. 1, 1911, at Kendrick. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Jones. He had never married. He was a member of the Deary Odd Fellows Lodge and the Deary Grange.

Bernard loved the out-of-doors, and while health permitted loved to hunt and fish. He watched growing things, and always found the early buttercups, pussywillows and other harbingers of spring. He was a kindly and friendly man, numbering friends by acquaintances.

Survivors include two brothers, Ray of Kendrick, and John of Moscow, five sisters, Mrs. Ollie Sherbon of Fullman, Mrs. Marvin Redington of Salmon, Idaho, Mrs. Jack Maynard of Lewiston, Mrs. Ray Shoemaker of Connell, Wash., and Mrs. Stanton Bennett of Spokane.

Funeral services were held Saturday morning at 11:00 o'clock from the Browning-Wann Chapel in Lewiston, with the Rev. F. C. Schmidt, pastor of the Kendrick Community Church officiating. Interment was in Wild Rose Cemetery on Big Bear ridge.

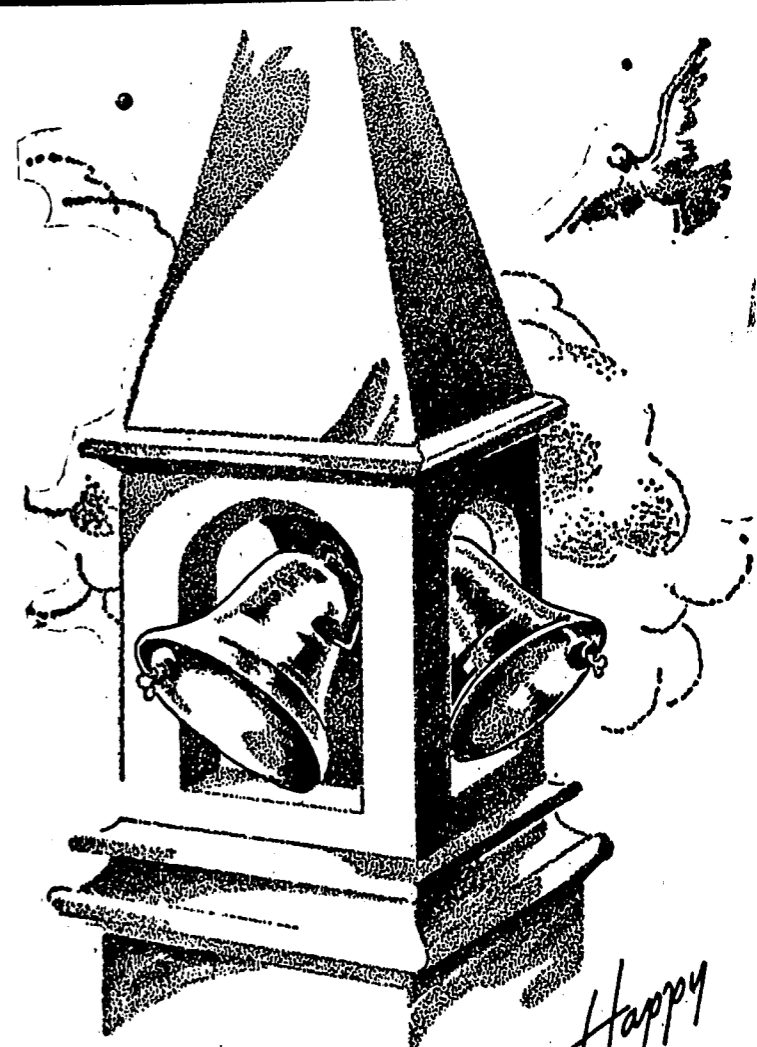

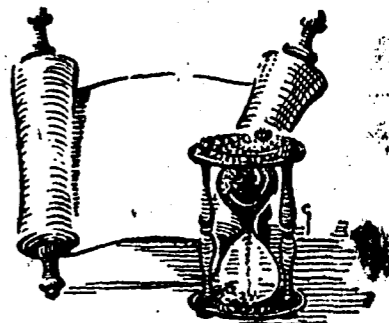

**MEYER SISTERS TELL OF LIFE IN INDIA IN ANNUAL LETTER**

(Second and final Christmas Letter — continued from last week)  
 Renigunta, Nov. 19, 1960  
 Dear Friends:  
 We are in the middle of the monsoon season and this morning we are having strong, gusty winds and a good rain. After the severe hot season this season is most welcome. In fact, the weather is quite cool now and the other evening I told one of our Doctors that it was going to snow. As of course, most of them have never seen snow they really didn't know what I was talking about. Actually they have no Telegu word for snow. Anyway, 70 degrees these days does seem cool after the hot season in which we had 95 degree weather day and night for over a month. To the south of us they have been having severe floods but so far here the rain has been most welcome.

There have been a lot of comings and goings this past few months. The first part of October the Renigunta Women's Samaj was host to the F. E. L. C. (Federation of Evangelical Lutheran Church) women's conference. This brought together women from all over India. With many problems facing the Indian church these days I think it very good for the Indian women to get together and discuss the various problems confronting them. Dorothy, Millie and I were in charge of an English drama. In this area to find many women who speak English fluently to take part in a drama is quite a task. With Dorothy's choir providing the background music. Mildred Monke doing the directing and six local women and myself from Renigunta the acting was managed quite well and I think it was by all. I enjoyed working with the women as it took quite some time for them to get the English pronunciation. They had many fine speakers and many Indian women who have spent time studying in the U. S. A. Mrs. Manikam, wife of the Bishop, whom some of you may have heard when he was in the U. S. A., gave a fine talk on Christmas in many parts of the world. She has traveled quite extensively with her husband.

The middle part of October, Miss Brosius, the nursing superintendent of our hospital arrived back from Arlington. She was gone only six months. As Miss Brosius' sister travelled back to India with her we spent some of the short time she was here seeing the other parts of the mission field. Our visit to the Piler area was to me a most depressing one and we are certainly grateful to God for the rains which should bring some relief to those people who have suffered so much during the famine. During that time we had many people who came to the hospital from that area from only lack of food. They have been supplied much grain and other foodstuffs from the National Christian Council. The morning we were in Piler we were told that as many as a thousand people had stood in line for a small amount of grain which had been prepared into a kind of porridge. Also there were many who came to receive medical treatment. This past week a number of us were going by car to Piler to conduct a dispensary for one day. This had to be cancelled but we hope to go as soon as the weather is clear.

The big news in our laboratory department is the beginning of the laboratory training center which started the 1st of September. Since this is a new project we have had to do a lot of groundwork in setting up the center. The Christian Medical Association of India has recognized our training center and therefore the students will be eligible for the examination qualifying them for the Laboratory Technician Certificate. We are limiting the course to four students and this is a basic problem. These boys have had the equivalent of high school training and are students which are eligible for university. The boys will spend one year with us. As they are required to have two hours of lecture each day this has really kept me busy. The doctors on the staff also assist in the lecture classes. We must have one trained technician for each two students and we have three trained technicians for the four students. This year the class is all boys, but we hope another year to take a class of girls. The boys come from different parts of our field. Mr. Jesudosa

who is a poor orphan boy from the Piler field; Prabhudaylu from Kodur, Joseph from the Gudur field and Prakasm from the Kalahasti field. Two of the boys have received a scholarship for study and two are being supported by missionaries.

The Blood Bank program which we have been working on the past two years has really been accepted. We no longer have any difficulty getting people to donate blood. Of course this past month we had many would-be donors who wanted the RS. 10.00 which is to them a large sum of money. The only problem is that many of them came from the famine area and were not physically fit to give blood. We still encourage the giving of blood free so as to decrease the cost to the patient. However the RS. 10.00 is a large sum of money to them. About a month ago we had a most interesting case in the hospital and certainly an example of the help derived from the life giving transfusion. A man was admitted suffering from the bite of a snake similar to the Russell Viper. The venom causes the blood not to clot and the patient bleeds to death. The patient was brought from a nearby hospital where they had no blood bank facilities. With the immediate use of two transfusions the man was able to go home in a few days. The news, has traveled to the nearby villages. In fact I have heard that I have been called the "Blood Misamma." We are now able to supply to any of the local doctors in the village if they need the use of a blood transfusion.

Besides my hospital duties am still trying a bit of farming and my chicken raising. In fact now I wish to try some of the methods in the Organic Farming magazine to see if this would help this sandy soil. Maybe my next project will be to get a water buffalo. The water buffalo milk is very good and rich and they say they are much easier to raise than a cow in this part of the country. The water buffalo is an extremely ugly animal and on the road very stubborn. They have been called

"brake inspectors," as they often stand in the middle of the road and one has to slam on the brakes to keep from running into them.  
 This last month we have been busy also trying to reorganize the young people's association of our local church. We have been trying to get an active program started and are now working on a Christmas program. Most of these young people are working in the local high school or hospital so we do have a problem getting them together at one time.  
 How the time goes and I can hardly believe that in another year my term will be up and by this time next year we should be traveling to the U. S. A.

We are glad that Loeda has consented to get this letter into the mail from the U. S. A. You should receive it much quicker than if sent from here. It is good to have Dorothy close by here in Tirupati, and we do get to see each other much more often.  
 As we remember the birth of Jesus this Christmas season may we share in the song of the angels, the gladness of the shepherds and the worship of the wisemen. As we seek Jesus this Christmas we pray that the door of hate may be closed and that the door of love may be opened all over the world. Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to all of you. 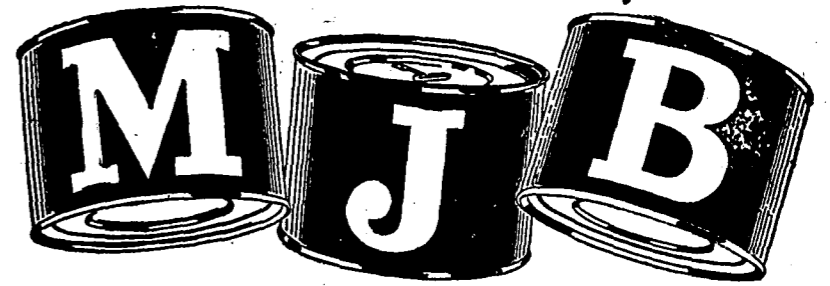
