AREA PIONEER, MRS. EMMA TARRY DIES

Mrs. Emma Tarry, 80, Cavendish, a resident of that area since 1882, died in Lewiston at 1:25 p.m. Friday. She had suffered a heart and liver ailment for 15 years and had been bedfast for two weeks.

Mrs. Tarry was born January 12, 1881 at Chetopa, Kansas. She came with her family to Southwick in 1882 and lived there until 1907. She was married at Lewiston, Dec. 15, 1905, to Walter E. Tarry. The couple moved to Cavendish in 1907. Mr. Tarry died August 14, 1940.

The couple owned and operated the Cavendish Store and postoffice from 1908 to 1940, the year of Mr. Tarry's death.

Mrs. Tarry, a true pioneer of the area, had seen it progress from the dirt-road and trail era to the modern blacktop highway — from the kerosene lamp to electricity with all its advantages. Through all this time she was a worker for progress in every way.

She was a woman who made friends and kept them, and she will long be missed in the community.

Surviving are three children, Mrs. Alice VanAarsdale, Sacramento, California, and Darwin Tarry and Mrs. Lois Vaughan, Southwick; a sister, Mrs. Myrtle Davis, Lewiston; and a brother, Bert Southwick, Seattle, and eight grandchildren.

The funeral was held Monday at 11 at Brower-Wann Chapel, Lewiston with the Rev. F. C. Schmidt officiating. Burial was at Normal Hill Cemetery.

Pallbearers were O. C. Vannoy, T. E. King, Jess Daniels, Given Mustoe, Virgil Peterson and Howard Southwick, all old-time friends of the family.

Music was furnished by Mrs. Burton Souders, Jr., and Mrs. Jack Lohman, who sang "In the Garden of Prayer" and "The Lord's Prayer," accompanied at the organ by Pauline Brigham, who also played background music.

Mrs. Eggers was born Jan. 16, 1920, at Spokane. She moved to Gifford with her parents in 1927, and was graduated from Gifford High School in 1938.

She was married Aug. 31, 1938, to Del Marner, now of Weippe. They were divorced in 1944 and she was married to Glen Eggers at Asotin in the fall of 1947. The couple lived at Gifford and Juliaetta before moving to Veradale some years ago.

Surviving, besides her parents and husband are two sons, Delvin Marner, Gifford, and Shannon Eggers, at the family home at Veradale; a daughter, Mrs. Geraldine McFarlane, Worden, Wash.; a brother, Kenneth Crowser, Pico, Rivera, Calif., and two grandchildren.

Mr. Eggers was employed by Mead & Howard Lumber Co., Inc., and lived at Juliaetta, some three years ago. They are quite well known in this area.

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

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
