

## SCIENCE FAIR, SPAGHETTI FEED DRAW MORE THAN 225 TO HIGH SCHOOL FRIDAY EVENING, MARCH 17

A spaghetti feed, benefit the Kendrick School Lunch program, was held in conjunction with the First Annual All-School Science Fair, at the Kendrick High school Friday evening, and proved to be a real success, as more than 225 persons attended the fair and enjoyed dinner.

Mrs. E. M. White, School Lunch director and chairman of the benefit spaghetti dinner, reported that 188 of the persons attending paid for their dinner.

During and after the dinner, the Science displays from all grades in the school district were on exhibition. Robert Hall, high school science instructor, gave the awards to the winners later that evening.

Dee Magnuson was the sponsor of the Junior Red Cross helpers, with Mrs. Claude Jones as advisor. Geo. Merrick, principal of the Junior High was in charge of the ticket sales.

Mrs. White reported that the dinner guests consumed 40 pounds of hamburger and 34 pounds of spaghetti. Also on the menu was a choice of salads, hot rolls, and coffee or milk. Mrs. White also reported that Dana Magnuson from the 8th grade, and Kathy Silflow from the seventh grade won free meals for being top salesmen in the advance ticket sales.

Mrs. A. A. Kremmin, school secretary, reported that 141 adults, 58 children, and 30 under six years old were served. Sales amounted to \$188 and expenses, were \$52.45. The profit, added to the \$60.70 already on hand, will go toward the purchase of new trays for the local cafeteria, costing \$241.21.

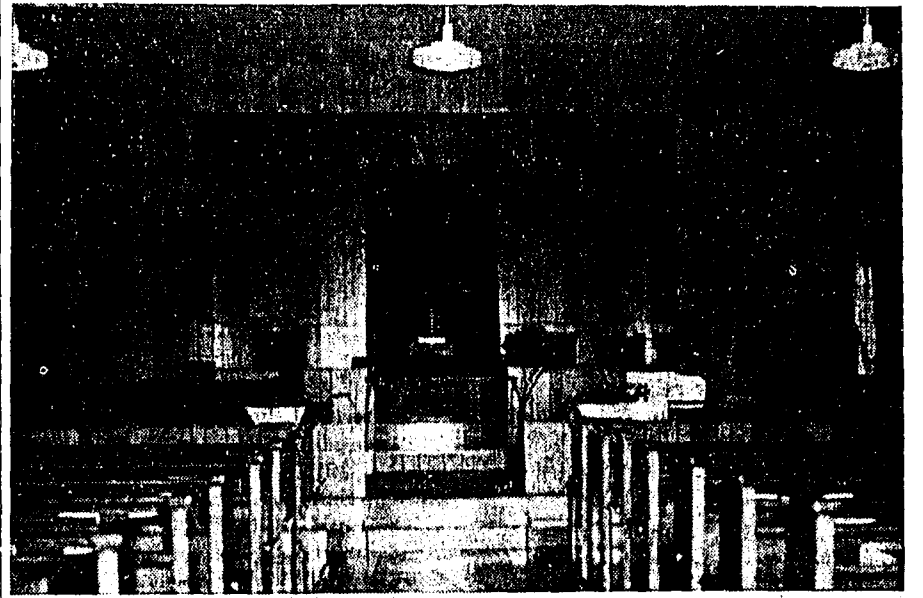

In the full academic year, Mr. Hall has received an additional fellowship for summer study at the University of Idaho. 

**WHEAT EXPORT APPEARS FAVORABLE**

The wheat exports situation appears favorable, the University of Idaho extension service said today in the publication, "Economic Facts for Idaho Farm Families."

Export sales in recent weeks have

been quite large and prospects are that a strong demand will continue into the new crop year. European exports have been stimulated by heavy rains which not only damage harvest of the 1960 European crop, but also reduce seeding of the 1961 crop.

"Idaho livestockmen reduced total cattle numbers in 1960," said Mr. Wayne Robinson, marketing information specialist. "The decline was

due to a decrease in milk cows, beef heifers one to two years old, and 'other' calves. The number of beef cows on Idaho farms and ranches was the same as a year earlier, but the number of milk cows was three percent smaller. Idaho sheep numbers on January 1, 1961 were only slightly smaller, less than one percent, than a year ago.

"Price prospects are expected to

improve for sheep and lambs as spring approaches but no great improvement is expected since prices presently are \$2 to \$3 lower than last year."

U.S. livestock imports, the specialist points out, consist of meat products, animal hair, and cattle for feeding and breeding. By-products are our main livestock exports. Imports of beef and mutton are expected to decline in 1961, but imports of frozen dressed lamb may increase. U.S. exports of livestock products increased in 1959 and 1960 and may increase further this year.

**SCHOLARSHIP FOR TOP STUDENTS**

Sixty-four students from all parts of the nation and some foreign students at the University of Idaho are taking advantage of what is considered to be one of the most challenging scholarship programs for the nation's top young scholars.

Under the program which began last September, the 64 students automatically are refunded their non-resident tuition for attaining a 3.33 grade average out of a possible 4.0 while carrying 14 credits or more. Most of the students carried a much higher study load than the minimum.

"The number is higher than statistically expected, which indicates the ability of students to achieve scholastic excellence may be underestimated," said President D. R. Theophilus. "Sometimes all that youth needs is a challenge to attain greater heights."

Three achieved perfect marks. They are Charlotte Barnes, Norman, Oklahoma, Thomas Cametti, Pittsburgh, Pa., and Sharon Price, Richland, Washington.

Residents of Idaho pay no tuition, but out-of-state students currently are charged \$250 a year.

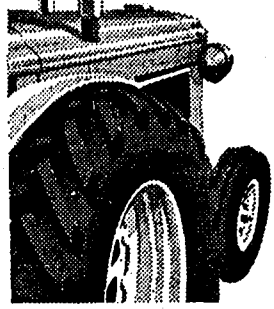
In announcing the program last fall, President Theophilus said, "Our first responsibility is to the residents of the state and for that reason we had to limit our out-of-state enrollment. Non-resident students must be in the upper half of their high school graduation class to be admitted to the university."

"As a broadening influence, it is important to a university to have students from different parts of the nation and world, and we wish to give particular encouragement to the top scholars. It was felt that non-resident tuition should be awarded a scholarship returning their tuition for attaining the average of 3.33. By its charter in 1889, the university of Idaho granted a free-tuition scholarship to every resident of Idaho."

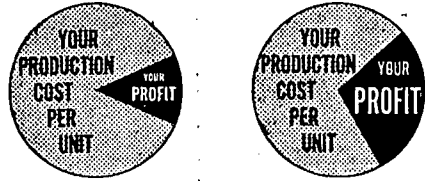

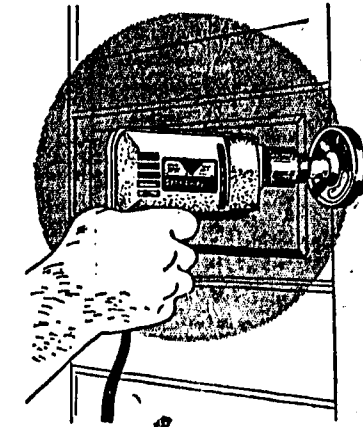

Q. What is the most efficient—and easiest—way to put a hole through a door to accommodate a doorknob?

A. With a hole saw attachment for your portable electric drill. Hole saw attachments are inexpensive, and available in sizes that pick up where your drill bits leave off. They may be obtained in diameters ranging from 3/4 inch to 4 inches. Generally a 1 1/4-inch hole saw is required for drilling lock sets and a 3/4-inch saw for the bolt hole.

I think you will find the complete set of hole-saw attachments of sufficient value, and that they belong in the well-planned workshop.

Q. I find it very difficult to miter the edges of 1/4-inch hardboard paneling I am installing, and wonder if there is another way to achieve a finished appearance at corner junctions.

A. Visit your lumber dealer and ask if he has any 1/4-inch quarter-round. This delicate molding was designed for purposes such as the one you describe.

Workshop tips from readers: Frustration can be avoided when you're painting window molding if you cut a piece of newspaper to the size of the pane, wet the paper and press it against the glass until its snug. It will adhere long enough for you to paint the wood before losing its grip, and it's easier to remove than masking tape!

Most commercial glues can be used as they are in the can. If an especially strong glue joint is required, however, it can be obtained by warming the glue to a temperature around 90 degrees

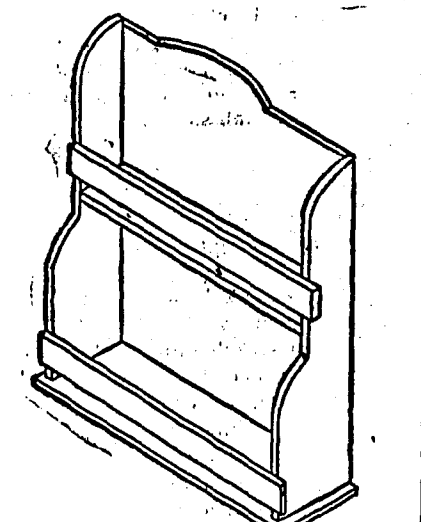

A spice rack that the home handyman—or a teen-ager—can construct for mother's kitchen requires only a short time to build, but will be more meaningful to mom than a piece of bric-a-brac.

The spice rack can be professionally fashioned from 3/4-inch plywood with a portable electric jig saw. Join the pieces with finishing nails or strong glue.



Mom would like this spice rack. It's easy to construct.

When completed the spice rack's edges should be sanded smooth and the material painted or stained to complement the kitchen decor. The rack should be locked to the wall with bolts and anchors.

From the mailbox:

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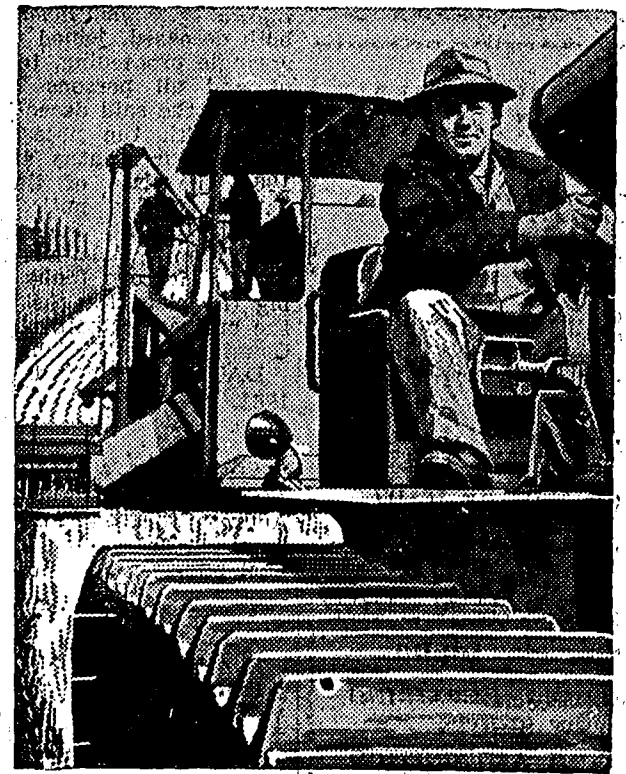
