Mrs. White reported that the dinner guests consumed 40 pounds of hamburger and 34 pounds of spaghetti. Also on the menu was a choice of salads, hot rolls, and coffee or milk. Mrs. White also reported that Dana Magnuson from the 8th grade, and Kathy Silflow from the seventh grade won free meals for being top salesmen in the advance ticket sales.

Q. What is the most efficientand easiest-way to put a hole through a door to accommodate a doorknob?

A. With a hole saw attachment for your portable electric drill. Hole saw attachments are inexpensive, and available in sizes that pick up where your drill bits leave off. 
