

CONTROVERSY HIGH ON DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME

Last week the Kendrick Village Trustees unanimously went on record as favoring the issue of whether or not to go on Daylight Saving Time. Juliaetta has taken no action regarding the matter.

Although Moscow favors the time change, it does not necessarily mean that communities in the county will follow suit. It is up to the respective communities and the merchants within the towns.

Lewiston is still tossing the issue about, but the Court House will go on the new time. The reason for the controversy in a small community such as ours, is the fact that farmers object to the issue for several reasons.

The main factor, in seeking the change of time, is that it will give one more hour of daylight. By going to the time advance, it would mean that our clocks would be set back on hour — as a result we would rise one hour earlier and retire one hour earlier. The farmer standpoint of objecting to the change is that it would cause a shift in store hours, when it is possible for them to get into the fields only at a time controlled by the sun and dew on the crops during harvest season. They say, and truly, that their time can not be measured by the clock, but by weather.

As for business men and merchants it would be an advantage, for they could then enjoy one more hour of the summer sun. At the present time they are "cooped up" and miss out on that hour a day.

The issue is yet to be decided!

Kendrick May Face Tough Sewage Problem in Coming April Election

The following is a letter to the Village Council and Mayor Frank Abrams, from the Idaho department of health. It pertains to the pressing problem confronting the city with regard to the disposal of raw sewage. This issue may be taken to the townspeople in the coming village trustees election, slated for the latter part of this month.

Gentlemen:

On March 29, 1961, I discussed the possibility of working with the Village of Kendrick on sewage disposal with Mayor Abrams and was informed that your intentions were to place the question of sewage treatment on the forth coming ballot. I hope that we will be able to work with the Village in planning for sewage treatment this coming summer.

Federal Law makes it illegal to dump waste into interstate streams and we have been working the past few years in arriving at sewage treatment for all of the cities and villages of the Clearwater drainage.

As you know Lewiston and Kamiah have completed their sewage treatment projects and Orofino and Koski are expecting to start construction this summer. The next largest remaining contributor on the Clearwater drainage will be Kendrick and we feel that it is necessary that plans be initiated soon as there is a great deal of time between the original idea and the completed project. State Law as adopted by the Board of Health on May 11, 1959, states:

"That all wastes discharged to waters of the State shall be subjected to such treatment that they shall not create a health hazard or nuisance and such wastes shall not impair the quality or interfere, either directly or indirectly, with the treatment process of any public water supply. Waters of the State shall include surface water and underground waters. Minimum acceptable treatment for any wastes shall be equivalent to the removal of readily settleable and floating solids. Minimum treatment for wastes containing domestic sewage shall include removal of readily settleable and floating solids and effective disinfection."

At the present time the raw sewage from the Village of Kendrick may carry a great deal of disease organisms such as typhoid, dysentery, enteritis, amoebiasis, infectious hepatitis and poliomyelitis. These disease bacteria or viruses can be carried throughout the community by various types of vectors — flies, mosquitoes, rodents and others. They can be carried also by fish and fowl which may come in contact with humans. The outfalls are also prospective breeding grounds for rats and other disease carrying rodents which once they get a foothold in the community are exceedingly difficult to eradicate.

May Get 30% Aid From State

The Public Law I mentioned earlier which prohibits the dumping of raw sewage into interstate waters course also provides for financial assistance in the construction of sewage treatment and some of the interceptor and outfall lines. This money amounts to 30% of the cost of construction, engineering, legal and fiscal work on that portion of the project considered to be interceptor sewers and treatment and outfall facilities. money should be made through this office at about the time that you have your bond election. Part of the engineering which covers the preliminary planning can be financed through the Housing Home Finance Agency if it is impossible for the Village to raise the necessary money to pay for the preliminary engineering work. The engineering for the project will probably run from 9 to 10 percent of the construction costs and the preliminary plan and estimates will amount to 20 percent of this figure. In other words, if your project should run \$50,000 for construction, the engineering preliminary cost should cost up to \$1,000. This varies somewhat with the different engineers and it would be up to the Village Council to discuss this when they sign the contract for preliminary engineering.

C. H. DAUGHERTY, AREA PIONEER, DIES AT SPOKANE

Clyde H. Daugherty, an area pioneer, died at the family home in Spokane, Sunday, April 2nd, at noon, following a long illness. Final rites were held at the Smith Funeral Home in Spokane, Wednesday, April 5, at 11:00 a. m. Cremation followed at the Crypt Niche, and interment in the Greenwood Cemetery, Spokane.

Mr. Daugherty was born at Little Elm, Texas, Jan. 30, 1893. He came to Idaho as a child with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Daugherty in 1902 or 1903, settling on Potlatch ridge. He attended the Fairview Grade school and the Kendrick High school.

October 5, 1916, he was united in marriage to Edna Johnson, at Spokane, and to this union were born two children, Margaret and Clyde, Jr.

For some years Mr. Daugherty was employed at the DeWinter & Goudward store at Leland. Later they moved to Kendrick, where from 1928 to 1931 he was employed at the Deobald Brothers Garage.

In 1931 he purchased the Kendrick Auto Freight and established hauling from Kendrick to Lewiston. In 1933 he sold the line to Everett Crocker, and was appointed Kendrick Postmaster, which position he held until 1944, when he resigned and moved to Spokane. At the later city he operated a service station for some time, and then accepted employment at the Klaus Jewelry Store in that city. He remained there until ill health forced his retirement.

Besides his wife, Edna, at the family home, he is survived by two children, Mrs. Bob Stewart (Margaret) and Clyde Daugherty, Jr., all of Seattle, and four grandchildren. He is also survived by three brothers, Harrison Daugherty of California; Phil Daugherty of Kellogg; and Jake Daugherty of Lewiston; three sisters, Mrs. Sylvia O. Peters of Spokane; Mrs. Ruby Bresgal of Spokane and Mrs. Geraldine Harrison of Lewiston.

McGLOTHEN HURT IN CAR CRASH

Wayne McGlothen, 30-year-old Juliaetta resident, was taken to the St. Joseph's hospital Friday evening after his car skidded off State Highway 42, plunged down a bank, and onto its side. He is said to have fractured ribs and a possible lung injury.

State Patrolman Joe Mach of Lewiston said the accident occurred at 6:30 p. m., about a mile from Juliaetta, on what is known as the "Branscom Curve." His 1952 Chevrolet sedan plunged down a ten-foot bank, Mach said the curve is a very short one and the vehicle left 117 feet of skid marks.







LUMBER COST CAN BE INCREASED BY ADDED TRUCK TAX

Wash., D. C. — The gross product cost of the American lumber industry would be increased by many millions of dollars a year if the proposed tax changes to finance the interstate highway system go into effect, a California lumberman told Congress.

Carl S. Walker, president of the Walker Lumber Co., at Mad River, California, testified for the National Lumber Manufacturers Association against the tax proposal before the House Ways and Means Committee, citing cost increases in California alone as exceeding \$4,000,000 annually.

Pointing out that truck taxes are important since "one of the biggest single problems in the lumber business is transportation," Walker said, "Because log and lumber production is much the same anywhere in the United States, I believe that the lumber industry generally would be bearing an unfair share of the interstate system if the proposed tax changes on trucks, fuel and rubber are enacted."

The witness asserted: "A check of the cost records of several long established lumber companies showed that the proposed increase in taxes would increase the cost of log hauling over 45 cents per thousand board feet."

He added: "Considering the area, terrain, and the type of roads we use the contrasting limited use we could make of the interstate highway system, it appears the proposed tax increase would place a very inequitable burden upon our industry. Walker told the Committee: "I haul logs 20 miles to my mill, and travel only 1,000 feet on a paved road — the rest of the 20 miles is dirt and classed as county road."

Calling the committee's attention to the mountainous forested areas of our country, he said: "Before there will be any return on a forestry investment, each tree has to be moved down to a mill. Thus forestry, to a large extent, depends upon transportation of logs, which nowadays mean diesel powered trucks and tires. Since lumber within recent years has become fiercely competitive with many other building materials, such cost increases will have to come out of the timber, and tree growing will become even more costly."

Walker offered a proposal that "provision be made in the legislation that increased highway user taxes provide a refund of taxes for logging use. We believe this is the only equitable thing to do and will be willing to suggest methods if you intend to proceed with the President's proposal."





GREEN THUMB AWARDS AVAILABLE FOR 4-H'ERS

Chicago — Two sponsors of 4-H projects, representing a combined program background of nearly four decades, again are providing 4-H awards on a national scale.

For the 24th year Mrs. Charles R. Walgreen of Chicago is arranging for awards in the 4-H Home Beautification project. In addition to engraved 19-jewel wrist watches for state winners, she offers medals to county winners and expense paid trips to National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago for national champions. Mrs. Walgreen is a well known horticulturalist and photographer.

The project's main goal is to make home surroundings more attractive, and to develop a feeling of pride and joy in a home. She also hopes that the club members will learn to ap-

preciate plants and their artistic uses and acquire a knowledge to correctly care for lawns, flowers, trees and shrubs.

This is the 14th year of award sponsorship for American Forest Products Industries, Inc., in the forestry program.

The awards setup spans diversified areas, including six \$400 scholarships on a national scale; 12 expense paid trips to the 4-H Club Congress on a sectional basis, fountain pen and pencil sets for state winners, and gold-filled medals of honor for county winners.

Through its 4-H sponsorship, the forest industries hope to develop desirable attitudes of conserving forest resources for the public welfare, and the importance of farm woodland as a source of income. Learning good forestry practices and skills in executing them, and developing leadership in forestry are also major aims of the program.

HUNTING OUTLOOK TO IMPROVE DURING NEXT 10-15 YEARS

Sportsmen can look forward to better hunting and fishing in the national forests during the next 10 to 15 years because of a new wildlife habitat management program, according to Chas. L. Tebbe, Regional Forester, U.S. Forest Service, Missoula.

The plan, called National Forest Wildlife, is part 2 of Operation Outdoors, a program to provide new areas and facilities and renovate existing ones to relieve overcrowding by outdoor recreationists.

In announcing the plan, Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman said, "In this atomic age of specialization and mounting pressures, periods of rest and relaxation have become tremendously important to the welfare of the American people."

"More and more people visit the national forests to relax with rod and gun. Forest Service records show nearly 200 percent increase in sportsman visits during the past ten years. Some 23 million visits are made annually by hunters and fishermen.

Operation Outdoors is a more detailed presentation of the wildlife phase of the program for the national forests already approved by Congress and commonly known as Operation Multiple Use, Tebbe explained. It is designed to improve fish and game conditions and meet the growing public needs. Planning of improvements for each area will be carried out in cooperation with the Montana, Idaho, Washington, North Dakota and South Dakota fish and game departments.

Highlights of the national program include: Planting shrubs, grasses and herbaceous plants on 1.5 million acres of game range; clearing operations, food patches, and game ways for wild life in dense vegetation on 400,000 acres; and improvement of 7,000 miles of fishing streams and 56,000 acres of lakes by stabilizing banks, planting streamside cover, and constructing channel improvements. The cost of improvements nationwide is estimated at \$25.6 million over a 10 to 15 year period. Nearly \$3.5 million of this may be available in the Northern Region.

The forest Service also plans to improve hunting and fishing by more carefully coordinating wildlife management with the development of other resources, Tebbe said.

Selective cutting of timber, for instance, or cutting in small blocks will open up dense stands and provide food for wildlife. Leaving small clumps of conifers will provide protection for wildlife.

Roads will be located to provide access to hunting and fishing areas. Livestock watering places will be constructed and located so they will also benefit deer, turkey, grouse and quail. Range seeding will include browse and other plants for wildlife food and cover.

VETERANS GET CASH BENEFITS

Veterans and their families in Idaho received a total of \$24,700,481 in cash benefits and services during the fiscal year of 1960, Loryn E. Kopan, manager of the Idaho VA center announced last week.

In Idaho compensation for service-connected disabilities and pension for total and permanent non-service connected disabilities were paid to 12,245 living veterans in the amount of \$10,600,955.

Death compensation and pensions were paid to the dependents of 2,842 deceased veterans in the amount of \$2,394,646.

Certain GI insurance dividend and indemnity payments totaling \$3,174,621 were paid to veterans and their beneficiaries.

An average of 43 disabled veterans of World War II and the Korean conflict in Idaho trained during the year under the vocational rehabilitation act to overcome handicaps of their disabilities. They received \$82,273 in subsistence, tuition, supplies and equipment.

An average of 1,000 veterans trained during the year under the World War II and Korean GI bills. They received \$1,464,033 in cash allowances. The remainder of cash benefits, services and other VA expenditures in Idaho during the year totaled \$6,983,903.

These cash benefits and services included war orphans' educational allowances, hospitalization, loan guarantees and direct loan programs, automobiles for certain disabled veterans, wheel chair homes for the seriously disabled, administrative costs and miscellaneous benefits.


