David Peterson Dies Suddenly
David Peterson, 84, a resident of this area for 70 years, died at his home here at 2:30 Monday afternoon, apparently of a heart attack. He had been in failing health.

Mr. Peterson farmed for 40 years near Deary. He was born Aug. 18, 1876, near Forest City, Iowa, and came to the Avon area, near Deary, when he was 14. He was a charter member of the Mt. Deary Grange.

He was married at Moscow, June 18, 1916, to Tillie Halverson. The family have made their home here since 1956, when he retired.

Surviving besides his wife, are a daughter, Mrs. Kiefford Lawrence of Council; a son, Dr. Donald Peterson, Loma Linda, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. Betsy Hanson, Medimont, and Mrs. Anna Thune, Forest City, Iowa; two brothers, Phillip, Lewiston, and Melvin of Iowa; five grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

The body is at Short's Chapel at Moscow. Further details are lacking at this time.

KENDRICK LANDMARK RAZED, BURNED, SMALL PARK PLANNED FOR THE AREA

The former E. E. McDowell home on the west end of Kendrick, adjoining the baseball diamond, was crushed to a heap of rubble last Friday afternoon, then put to the torch.

Both Mr. and Mrs. McDowell being deceased, the Village of Kendrick purchased the property on bids, the price being \$300.00. Being one of the oldest buildings in town, it possessed little value as such, and it was decided by the Trustees to raze the buildings and make the four-lot area into a small city park.

Everett Farrington was called in with his D8 dozer, and had the buildings knocked down within a matter of minutes — then Raymond Howard did the honors by touching it ablaze. The heap of rubble was still smoldering Monday.

The McDowell home was moved to this ground adjoining the road in 1948, following the two years of flash floods that piled rock about the house, where it formerly sat, at the mouth of Brady Gulch. How old the

home was is not known, but it had been standing since before the turn of the century.

E. M. White and Max Dammarell have been busy since the buildings were destroyed, cleaning the area, and preparing to level the ground and plant grass — a huge improvement over decaying buildings.

HARLEY EICHNER HONORED FOR SOIL CONSERVATION

Harley Eichner was honored as the "Outstanding District Cooperator for 1960", at the regular meeting of the board of supervisors of the Latah Soil Conservation District, in Moscow last week. Harley Eichner was given a certificate of merit in recognition for outstanding soil conservation work by Charles Bower, Kendrick, who is chairman of the board. The award Eichner received is provided by the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. in connection with the soil conservation districts contest.

Eichner has been a district co-operator since 1942, and served two years on the district board. His farm demonstrates many varied conservation practices which have been on the land for many years.

One of the most beneficial practices for soil improvement, the use of grasses and legumes in a regular rotation, has been used for a long time, and to support this system, there has been contour strip cropping on a portion of the farm. Two stock ponds and an irrigation pond make good use of run-off water, and he has over 3,000 feet of tile drains to improve drainage on low areas. Stubble utilization has long been a regular practice.

Special shrub plantings for wild life food and cover round out Mr. Eichner's all around conservation practices.

HARD AT WORK ON NEW STATE ROAD

Saturday, April 1st, the State of Idaho officially took over the road from Kendrick to Troy, thus bringing to reality a dream of many years standing for residents of both towns.

The new road link is to be handled from the Kendrick highway section, by Ed Brown and James Candler, and on Wednesday of last week they completed their first full round trip over its entirety. Ed says it will take every minute they can spare from their previous road areas for a long time, to get it into shape as a gravel road in the state highway system.

Early last week state crews began work with power shovels and trucks to ditch the entire American ridge grade, which is a slow procedure, and will take some time to complete. By the first of this week they had completed ditching operations as far as the John Darby home.

Cooperating in the effort to get the state to take over this very important road link were the Latah County Commissioners, the Latah County Chambers of Commerce, the Moscow Chamber of Commerce, the Troy Chamber of Commerce, the Kendrick Commercial Club, the Kendrick Community Lions Club, Joint School District No. 283, and George F. Brocke, Sr., Latah County State Representative, and many other organizations and individuals.

Whether or not the uprooted trees, which he set back into the ground, will grow again is questionable, Mr. White said, as they had just started to get their spring foliage when they were pried from the ground, and many of the tender roots severed.

IDAHO POTATO CROP USED MAINLY FOR FOOD PRODUCTS

At least half of the 1960 Idaho potato crop was processed for food and other products, Dr. M.L. Jackson, professor and head of the chemical engineering department at the University of Idaho, said at a food technology seminar at the university. The seminar was organized to aid university staff members in keeping

abreast of developments in food processing in Idaho. Dr. R.A. Hibbs, assistant professor of dairy science, was chairman of the group.
Dr. Jackson said the future of potato processing in Idaho appears bright, judging from the rate of growth of Idaho's processing plants in the last few years.
"Fifteen different companies now process potatoes for food and other products within the state," said Dr. Jackson. "The bulk of the processing for food use is for frozen french fries. Dehydrated products account for a substantial total including granules and flakes for reconstituted mashed potatoes, cubes and slices which are used extensively in pre-

pared foods.
Of current interest to the industry is study into disposal of wastes from the food and starch processing operations. Research done at the university for the utilization of processing wastes includes bacterial growth, yeast production for seed and fertilization, protein recovery, and recovery from peeling solutions.

CHILD'S DIET IS VERY IMPORTANT

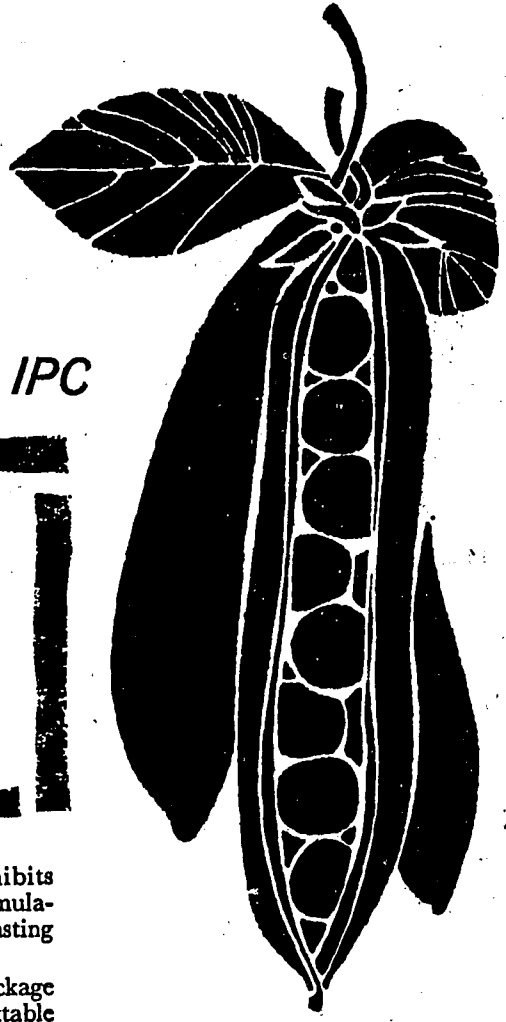
U. of I., Moscow — Report cards brought home by the school child may be reflections of the foods that start his days at school. Poor breakfasts can mean a grumpy, uncooperative, inefficient child that does poor work and has a hard time getting along with schoolmates and teachers.
"No one could guarantee that good breakfasts will make an 'A' student out of every child who has trouble at school," says Miss Barbara Branthoover, extension nutritionist for the University of Idaho. "But we would have a surprising figure if we could know how many times poor breakfasts have kept a potentially good student down in the lower grade brackets of his or her class."
Good amounts of protein in the day's first meal are the key that solves many nutritional difficulties showing up as poor grades on the youngsters' cards. Lack of protein in diets often makes the child listless, cross, nervous, and unable to do efficient work.
Who is most apt to suffer from protein deficiencies? "Watch out for it in teen-agers," Miss Branthoover warns. "Teenagers are making a fast growth in bones and muscles. They have a lot of emotional disturbances during this period of changing from children to adults. To keep them happy, to keep them successfully competing with their fellows, and to give them the growth they need, it is essential that they have at least one-fourth of their day's food intake at breakfast time. Good breakfasts include an egg, cereal, milk and fruit as the bare essentials. Unless parents furnish this to the child every morning, then they should sympathize rather than complain when report cards do not show good marks."

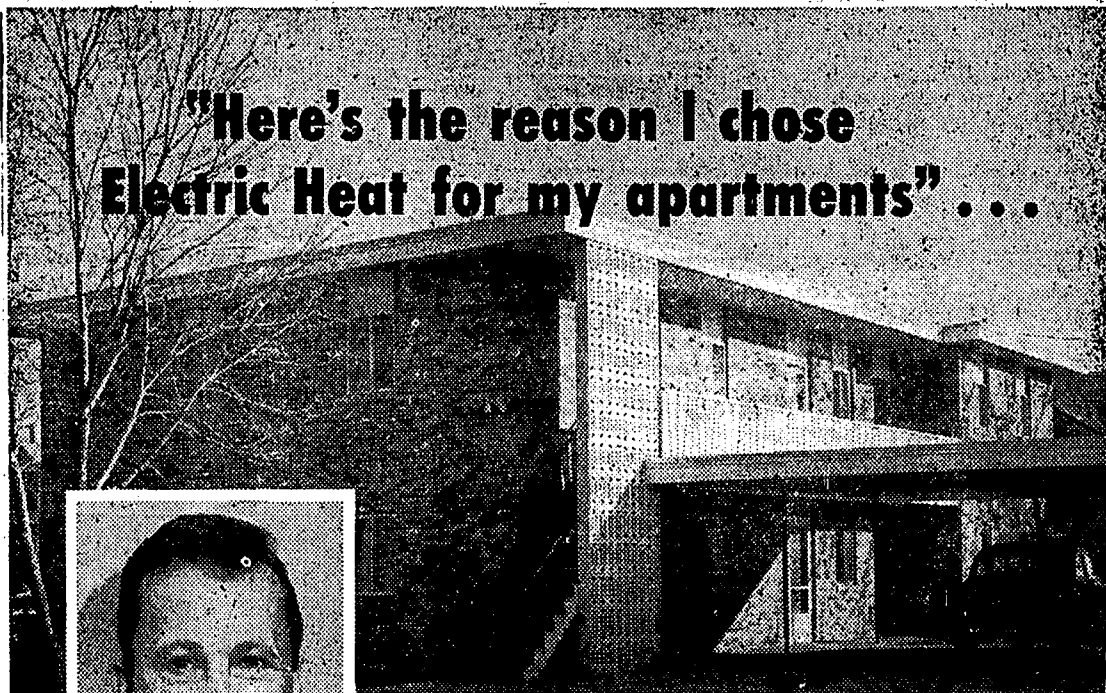

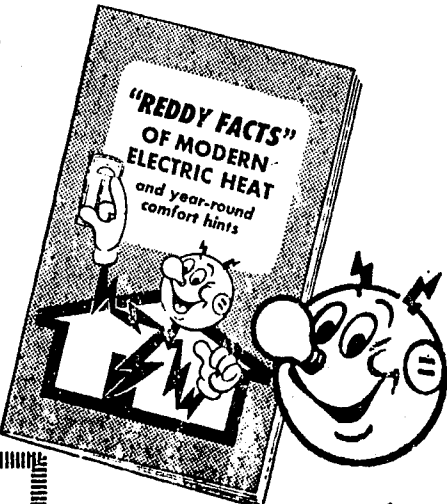

MECHANICAL FISH FEEDER IN USE

Boise — Over 720,000 pounds of fish — that's 360 tons of flashing, fighting trout — is the 1961 hatchery production goal of the Idaho Fish and Game department that will equal or better last year's record.

Director Ross Leonard said the fish will be incubated and reared at the state's 15 hatcheries. There are located at American Falls, Ashton, Clark Fork, Eagle, Grace, Grangeville, Hagerman, Hayspur, Henrys Lake, Mackay, McCall, Mullan, Sandpoint, Twin Falls and Warm River.

In round numbers, the 11 million trout mainly will be rainbow, cut-throat and brook, with lesser numbers of brown, kamloops, kokanee and mackinaw. Some small and some largemouth bass also are propagated.

Several mechanical labor-saving devices have been invented and built by the department for use at Hagerman and other hatcheries. These include a blower-type feeder, automatic live-trout loader and flushing conveyor that transfers fish through a water-filled pipe from one rearing pond to another.

NEW LIBRARY BOOK PLAN SET UP

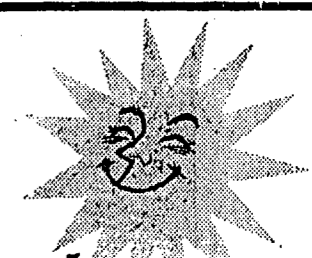
Moscow — A book pool for inter-county circulation of books in the Nez Perce County and Latah County Library Districts was approved by the trustees of the two districts, and the program for Bookmobile circulation was launched March 6 in Nez Perce county.

The librarians will work out a plan for re-stocking the Bookmobile as it moves from Nez Perce county to Latah county. This is an advance in cooperation over the method used last year, when shift of the Bookmobile involved completely unloading at one library and reloading at the next. But that first step in cooperation has now resulted in a closer relationship between the two libraries and a demonstration of increased cooperation between the two counties.

This plan is designed to give a wider circulation of books and place a greater emphasis on the variety of books at the disposal of borrowers.

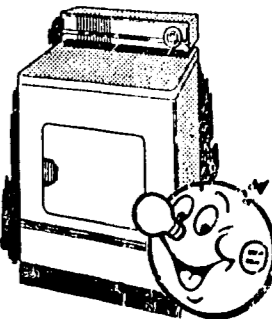
The trustees and librarians of the district formulated the agreement at a meeting with Mrs. Rachel Fenske, assistant extension librarian of Idaho State Library.

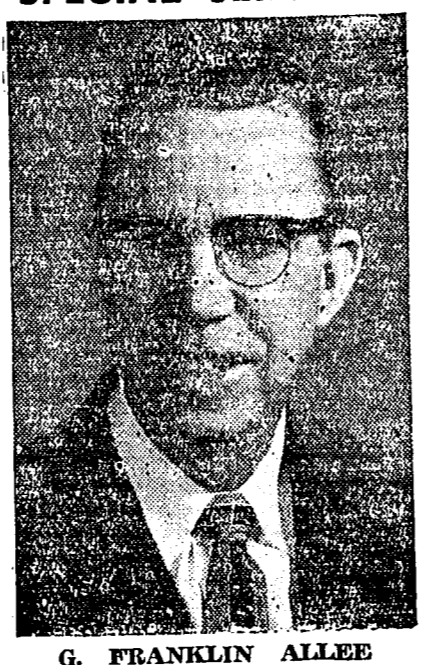
