KENDRICK'S CLEAN-UP DAYS SET FOR APRIL 20-22, NEED GREAT

In line with the Village of Kendrick official proclamation of the week-end of April 20, 21 and 22 as "Clean-up Days", a village crew composed of Bill White, Max Dammarell and Edgar Bohn have been hard at work all week cleaning up the streets, park and alleys.

Bill and Max have been washing the streets and cleaning the gutters, and in a distance of three blocks, from the foot of the schoolhouse hill to the Abrams Hardware, took out two truck-loads of surplus gravel, mud and debris. Yes, it's hard to believe there was that much — but there was!

Edgar Bohn has been mowing the lawn at the park, cleaning and raking on parking strips, and in general, cleaning up.

We must say that the results are very satisfactory in all operations, and Kendrick is beginning to take on the "clean look of spring."

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TV EQUIPMENT STOLEN MARCH 8 FOUND IN GULCH

One lot of the stolen TV equipment of Brocke & Sons, Inc., television cable was found last Friday by Harley Porter, while engaged in logging operations, about half-way up Brady Gulch.

The equipment was still housed in its container, a steel box with a padlocked door. The padlock had been hammer off, but the contents of the box were still intact.

George Brocke, Jr., said that although the equipment was still intact, it was doubtful if any of it could be used again, due to damage by rough handling and weather.

The box and contained equipment was ripped from a pole at the antenna site, on Potlatch ridge, March 8th. At that time the thieves pried the box from the pole, cut the wires, loaded it into a truck or car, hauled it through Kendrick and up Brady Gulch, where it apparently was rolled from the edge of the road down into the canyon. It was found about a half mile above the entrance to the Marlon Rowden home on the Brady Gulch (Troy) road.

Brocke also reported that the finding of the box did not hold any clues to who the thieves might be, as neither had removed all traces of fingerprints.

If you can't answer them properly, tell him why. A child's vocabulary is limited, and he does not have the skill of expressing himself, so listen for what the child means and not what he says. Even if he can't express himself properly, he is trying to tell you what he means.

If you really listen to him, your understanding of him will deepen and his ability to learn will grow. Helping your child to learn to listen, will place his feet firmly on the first step to the stairway to education. — Myrtle Danquist, Southwick (4th, 5th and 6th grade instructor).

SCHOOL, BUSINESSES, BANK APPROVE NEW ADVANCED TIME

On midnight, April 30, residents of Kendrick will advance their clocks one hour, to be in line with the Village Trustees' action to go on daylight saving time.

This week, Kendrick's Mayor, Frank Abrams, said that the village council had unanimously approved the advanced time for this community. He added that the majority of the business firms had consented to take the advanced time, and he felt sure that the others would fall in line.

On Monday, May 1, the village siren will be sounded one hour earlier for the daily noon test — the new time then being in effect. So remember, it will not be the fire siren as such.

Ray Howard of the Mead & Howard Lumber Co., Inc., at Kendrick, said Tuesday that if others were on the new schedule, the sawmill would also go along with the daylight saving time. The Farmers Bank will also observe the new time, it was learned Tuesday.

R. L. Meserve, superintendent of the local school district, said that the schools would fall in line with the village, and that they would go on the new time, May 1st.

The only business that will definitely not be included in the new time will be the Postoffice at Kendrick. They are government controlled, and cannot change the time of arrival of trains and planes, so they will be on standard time. This means that the local postoffice will open at 9:00 a. m. and close at 6:00 p. m. — on the new time schedule.

Remember, if you are going to be in line with the Kendrick business firms, schools, etc., set your watches and clocks up one hour before retiring, on the evening of Sunday, April 30. But, if you are not planning to change, be sure to remember that your hometown shopping center will be on an hour faster time — meaning that the stores will close one hour earlier in the evening, and will open one hour earlier in the morning. However, store hours on all local business firms will remain as they now are — so far as hours of service go.



DISSATISFIED WITH LEGISLATION

Elmer S. Crowley, executive secretary of the Idaho Education Association, was a Kendrick visitor on Thursday of last week. He met with the local teachers organization.

Mr. Crowley said that "despite the fact that many good educational bills were passed by the 36th Idaho Legislature, the 1961 session was one of the roughest for education in the last ten years."

He said that "The appropriation for public schools was far from adequate in view of the pressing demands on education at all levels."

Crowley pointed out that it will take nearly two-thirds of the \$6 million increase just to provide for the new youngsters that will be enrolled during the next two years. Idaho's schools are now serving over 163,000 boys and girls, and this number will be increased to over 170,000 by the time the 1963 legislative meets. Furthermore, 90 percent of Idaho's school children are in districts now making the maximum levy permitted by law, so these districts must look to the state or federal government for the additional revenue," he said.

Crowley said: "That if the legislature is called back into special session it should be for the purpose of increasing the appropriation to the public schools, not to renew debate on the foundation program formula. There is nothing wrong with the formula that more money will not correct."



Miss Wallace is a granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oral Craig, Kendrick.



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
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
