### LESTER WALLACE, ELMO ELDRIDGE WIN IN 4-YEAR RACE, F. P. McCREARY TAKES 2-YR.

Kendrick voters Tuesday indicated approval of a \$65,000.00 sewage disposal plant for the village, by a 52 to 28 margin, but failed to carry by the "necessary" two-thirds majority. In the Village Trustee election, Lester Wallace and Elmo Eldridge won the 4-year terms, and Frank P. McCreary was elected to the 2-year position. Eldridge was a write-in for the 4-year term, and edged Bill Rogers, another write-in by eight votes.

For the 2-year term: Frank McCreary, 38; Don Millard, 29; Marvin Long, 1; Bob Watts, 1; Bill Rogers, 4; Elmo Eldridge, 2.

Village Clerk Robert Magnuson reported that many voters were turned away from the polls because they had

failed to register. He said that because they had voted in the presidential election last fall, it did not qualify them for voting in the village election. Magnuson also said that several ballots were cast out, as they were voted incorrectly. He added that of the 122 registered voters, 86 participated in the election.

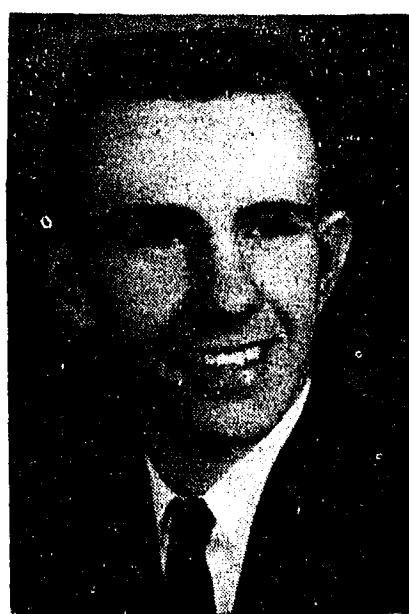

### SCOUT CAMP RAID PUT ON BY LOCALS FRIDAY NIGHT

Lewiston — The "good guys" won the battle, but victory was short-lived.

Victorious were about 350 Boy Scouts and 40 adult leaders. They learned the value of a lesson stressed in Scout manuals: "Be Prepared."

The aggressors were ten youths from Juliaetta, Kendrick and Southwick, who swooped down on tents in the bivouac area of 21 Scout troops from the Clearwater and Alpowa districts about 10:30 Friday night. The Scouts were camped in the grass and timbered area about the old Pilot Rock Schoolhouse, between Juliaetta and Arrow Junction, in the "Elbow bend" of the Potlatch river.

Identified as a hastily formed force with a mission to drive the invaders from their camp, they knocked down the center pole of a number of tents. One of the aggressors, brandishing a knife, slit the canvas side of one of the shelters.

As the Scouts rallied, the invaders were forced to flee. A search began, and one of the gang was captured by several of the older Scouts.

Adult leaders took the captive to Kendrick and several others were implicated and rounded up.

By late Saturday night the Nez Perce County Sheriff's office said the identity of the ten youths had been learned.

Several of those apprehended later appeared at the camp with their parents and agreed to pay for damage done. A deputy said at least two of the ten were Scouts, but had shunned the camporee.

### CLOSED FIRE SEASON BEGINS MAY 1

Boise (April 25) — State Forester Roger Guernsey announced today that the official closed fire season begins May 1, and will end on October 31, unless extensions are necessary. The State Forester made the following statement:

"In Idaho during the closed fire season, it is unlawful for any person to set or cause to be set a fire in any slashing area, to any stump, log, down or standing timber, or to set a fire on any forest lands or dangerously near thereto, or in any field in any forest protective district without having first procured a permit from the District Forest Warden."

"I wish to emphasize that burning can be done during the closed fire season. The various forest wardens and their deputies around the state issue hundreds of permits throughout the season, even during July and August. The determining factor is safety. The purpose of the permit system is to make burning safer by gaining control over fires during periods of high danger when there is threat to life and property. State forest wardens are ready and anxious to help and advise those people who have burning to do. The protection agencies encourage the clean-up of logging slash and other debris, and want to advance this work."

The state forester had two suggestions that could be helpful to those who have burning problems.

First, the area should be prepared by piling or bunching the slash or debris; by building firebreaks or by whatever means are most appropriate. Then, if the person wanting to burn will ask for an advance inspection and approval of his burning plan several weeks ahead, it will facilitate the issuing of the permit at a later, most favorable time.

Second, the state forester said that if neighbors will agree in writing to pool their fire fighting resources and work together on burning, then the forest warden may, on some occasions, issue a permit that he would otherwise regard as unsafe.

For the information of those wishing permits, Norman Lewis, Kendrick, is the deputy state fire warden for this area, and permits may be obtained from him.

### OBLIGATIONS TOLD JUNIORS, SENIORS

Representatives of the United States Army, Navy and Air Force met with the Juniors and Seniors of Kendrick High School on Monday to tell them of their eight-year obligation to the federal government.

The students also learned that the different branches of the Armed Services are not interested in persons who have not completed their high school education. The students were urged to complete their education before embarking on a military tour of duty.

Mr. Meserve, superintendent of schools, said that heretofore only the seniors had met with the Service representatives, but this year the junior class was included.

The students learned that many fields are open to them in the Armed Services, and that they will have to face their eight-year obligation sometime within their lives. They were urged to put this service behind them, but only after they had completed their high school education.

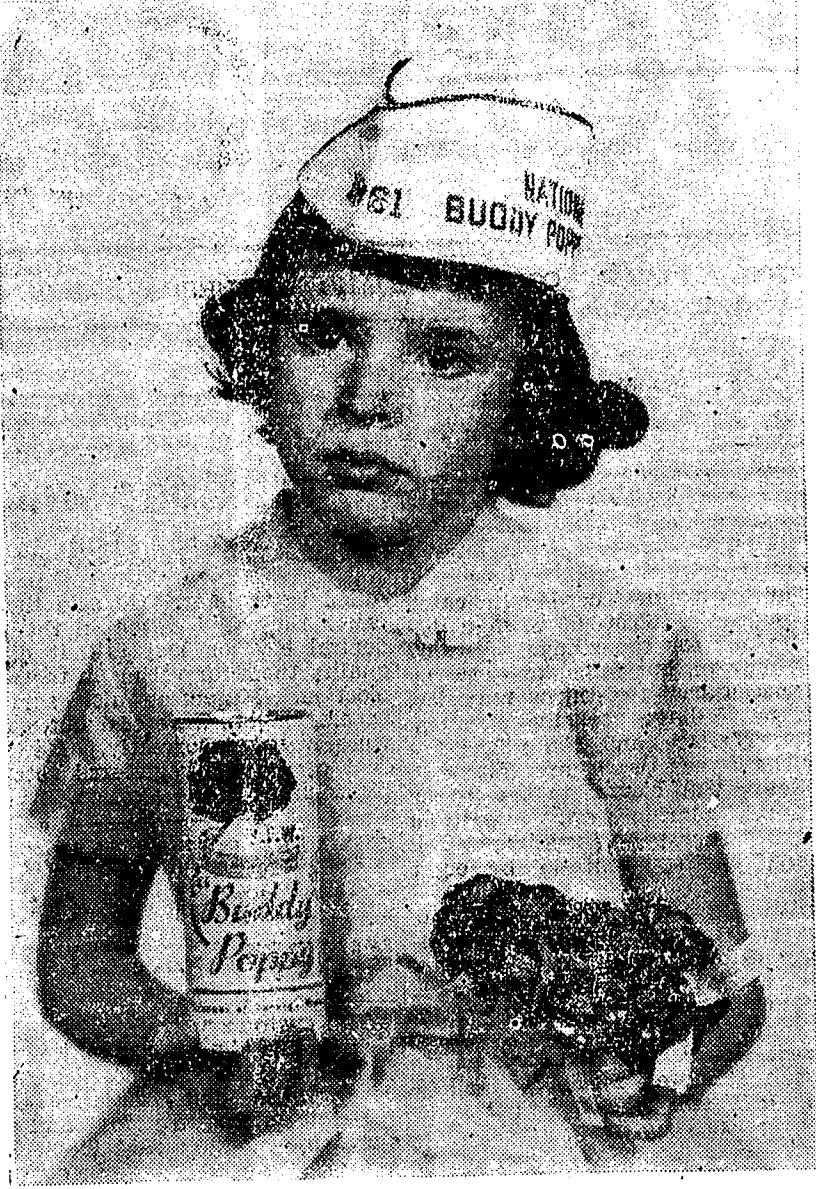

often found in Idaho backyard trees than in the commercial orchards, says Harry S. Fenwick, plant pathologist with the university.

The home orchardist too often fails to take advantage of sprays that would prevent the diseases.

Dead twigs and blossoms and accompanying spotting of fruits are indications of Corynum blight, the plant pathologist says. Thorough sprayings with Bordeaux mixtures in the fall and spring prevent loss due to the disease. Full instructions for mixing and use will be found on the back of each package.

## IDAHO FORESTS AND STATE FORESTRY

By Roger L. Guernsey, Idaho State Forester, Boise.

Idaho's forests have contributed heavily to the welfare of Idaho's people since the days of Lewis and Clark. Those daring explorers were among the very first to use Idaho wood. They stopped along the Clearwater river, near Orofino, to make boats by shaping and hollowing out logs taken from nearby trees. It is interesting to note that today, 156 years later, many of the same trees which were

seen by Lewis and Clark, as they looked south from their trail along the Lochsa River, are now a center of controversy. Here lies the present Selway-Bitterroot area, and the question is: "Shall this area be dedicated as a permanent special use wilderness area or shall boundaries be adjusted to extend the benefits to multiple-use?"

Every Idaho citizen benefits greatly from our beautiful and bountiful forests, be the ownership federal, state or private. This holds true even though you might live in a southern Idaho town miles from the trees and you never visit the woods. These articles on Idaho's forests are written with the hope that Idahoans will come to know better the importance of these forests and join with foresters to improve their productivity and usefulness to everyone in the years ahead.

Idahoans are blessed by the extent and kind of forests we have. Our state ranks fifth in the nation in volume of standing timber. Only Oregon, California, Washington and Alaska have more. The last official estimate, or timber survey, placed the volume of saw timber in Idaho at 96 billion board feet. Thus, our state alone has about three times more timber than is cut annually in all of Russia. A recent survey not yet completed by the U. S. Forest Service will show we have even more timber than that. It is believed that Idaho actually has enough timber to build houses for all Americans living west of the Mississippi river.

The ownership of the bulk of Idaho's forests is shared by Idaho citizens themselves. Of the state's 13,372,000 acres of commercial forest land, 72 percent is under the stewardship of the federal government. Twenty-five percent of the revenues from these lands stays in Idaho — the balance of the revenue being shared with Americans everywhere. The state government owns and manages another 839,000 acres of commercial forest lands. All revenues from these lands are retained in Idaho and contribute substantially to the support of public schools and other state institutions. Private owners hold title to just short of three million acres of the best forest land. One million acres of this privately owned, tax-paying land has been certified as Western Pine tree farms dedicated to the growing of timber crops for perpetuity.

**Increase 4-H Awards Expanded Junior Leader Training Program**

**Sears Provides 12 Scholarships, Trips to Chicago**

For the first time in its 37 year history, the 4-H leadership program in 1961 will offer 12 national \$400 college scholarships to outstanding 4-H Club members.

Previously two \$400 college scholarships were granted, and the top eight winners nationally were brought to the 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. Gold-filled medals of honor for county champions will be increased from two to four.

Norman C. Mindrum, director of the National 4-H Service Committee, announced that the new expanded awards program also provides an all-expense trip to the national 4-H Congress for first-place winner in each state.

Awards this year will be provided for the first time by the Sears-Roebuck Foundation, he said, which also sponsors the national 4-H home improvement program.

To be eligible for a state or national award, the club member must be over 14 years of age and have satisfactorily

completed three years of club work with emphasis on leadership projects.

The state Extension staff will name state winners. A committee of 12 Extension workers will judge state winners' records to determine those worthy of national awards.

From the outset of organized club work in the 1920's, junior leadership training has been recognized as a vital component of 4-H growth, according to Mr. Mindrum. Definite leadership projects were offered by a few states as early as 1923.

The present leadership awards program is being amplified, Mindrum said, and it is expected that current enrollment will exceed the 170,000 boys and girls who participated in 1960. Of this number, approximately 109,000 served as assistant or project leaders.

Leader training is directed by the Cooperative Extension Service and carried out by volunteer adult leaders in each club.

It is estimated that 25 percent of the 302,500 adult volunteer leaders now serving 4-H were former junior leaders, Mindrum declared.

Additional information regarding the 4-H leadership awards program can be obtained from county Extension agents, local leaders, or the state Extension office, he said.

**NEW PROPERTY DAMAGE LAW**  
 Boise — Idaho motorists involved in property damage accidents on and after May 2, must establish their financial responsibility only if property damage amounts to a total of \$100 or more. Ken McCoy, state director of the Department of Law Enforcement, said this week. The recent legislature increased from \$50 to \$100 the amount required to bring a person under provisions of the act. McCoy explained.  
 The director warned that drivers involved in personal injury and fatal crashes, regardless of the amount of property damage, still come under provisions of the act.  
 McCoy said that when a driver comes under provisions of the Safety Responsibility Act, he must now establish proof of financial security, bond or insurance in the amount of not less than \$10,000 for a property damage accident and for each personal injury or death, and not less than \$20,000 in the event of injury or death to two or more people. The previous minimum was \$5,000 and \$10,000 the director said.  
 Effective the same date is the new law which allows the Commissioner of Law Enforcement to suspend provisions of the act when payment has been received for bodily injury or property damage, it was announced.

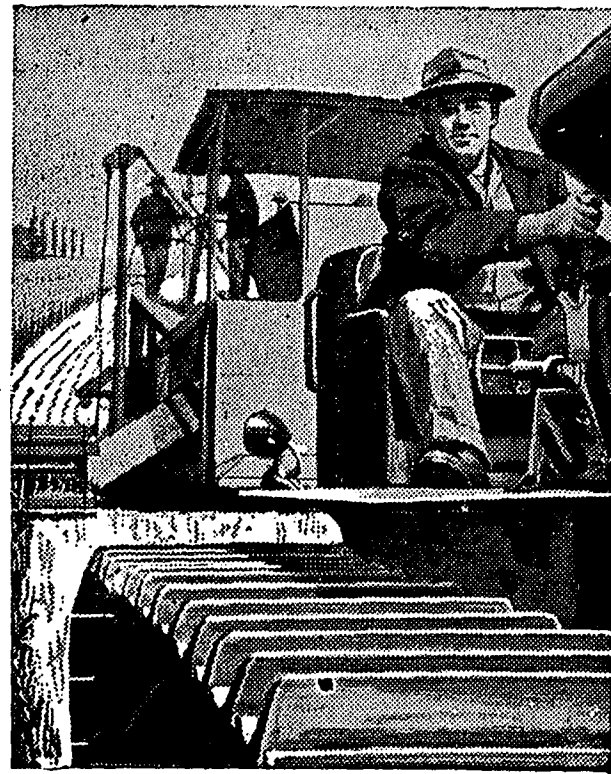
