The coming Locust Blossom Festival was discussed, and the V. F. W. and Auxiliary will have a stand.

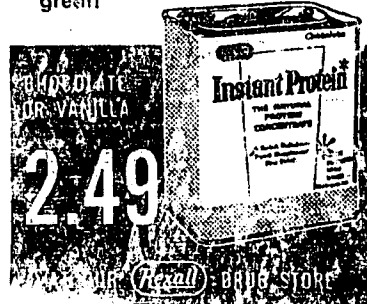
