MRS. W. L. McCREARY DIES SATURDAY, MAY 20, FOLLOWING LONG ILLNESS

Mrs. W. L. (Floy) McCreary, died Saturday, May 20, 1961, at the family home in Kendrick, following a long illness from cancer. She first underwent surgery in March of 1960, and apparently was doing very well until some two weeks ago, when she began to fail rapidly. Death came at 10:39 a. m.

Floy had served the Kendrick Gazette and community as reporter and editor until about 14 months ago, when first stricken. She also had done feature writing for the Spokesman-Review at Spokane, and the Lewiston Morning Tribune.

Mrs. McCreary was born August 28, 1907, at Chewelah, Wash. When she was a child she moved with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Frank E. Griffith, to Spokane, and she lived there until 1926. She was united in marriage to W. L. McCreary at Spokane on October 2, 1926.

Mr. and Mrs. McCreary lived at Genesee from 1926 to 1929, moving in March of that year to Stanwood, Washington, where they made their home until December of that year, when they moved to Kendrick.

Floy McCreary was a member of the Kendrick Community Church, being a member of the church board and of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, where over the years she had held many of its offices. She was an honorary life member of the latter organization.

Mrs. McCreary was a lover of the out-of-doors and of flowers. Her rose garden was always of thing of beauty in season, and flowers of every kind bloomed in profusion about the family home. She also loved to fish, and several trips a year were "a must."

Surviving besides her husband are a daughter, Mrs. Robert A. Stensland, Seattle, and a son Frank P. (Parker) McCreary, Kendrick; two brothers, the Rev. Raymond F. Griffith, Wenatchee, Wash., and Paul S. Griffith, St. Paul, Minn.; a sister, Mrs. Edward E. Sands, Juneau, Alaska, and four grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held on Thursday, May 25, at 10:00 a. m., in the Kendrick Community Church, with the Rev. Frederick C. Schmidt, pastor, officiating. Burial will be in the Kendrick Cemetery.

The French Government has decorated a University of Idaho Professor for distinguished services rendered to the field of agriculture, it was announced this week.

Dr. Lorin W. Roberts, assistant professor of Botany has been informed that the French Minister of Agriculture has named him a Chevalier de l'Ordre du Merite Agricole. Dr. Roberts will receive the insignia of the order in a ceremony in Boise, when Pierre Esdevant, French Consul General, San Francisco, comes to Idaho.

"The honor is probably for the work we did in France last summer," said Dr. Roberts. He served last summer as president of the Botany section of the First International Congress of Histochemistry and Cytology held in Paris. Under the appointment of the French Society of Histochemistry, Dr. Roberts was chairman on an international symposium and organized a panel of speakers from all parts of the globe.

The Idaho professor has gained international recognition for his work. At the Congress, he presented a paper on the histochemistry of sulfhydryl systems in plant wound responses covering research conducted at the University of Idaho under a National Science Foundation grant. In the project, he did a chemical personal history of plant cells which are severed in the laboratory by a razor blade. By study of the plant's ability to repair itself, scientists will be able to predict in advance what cells will divide and where, giving clues to why certain plant cells develop the way they do.

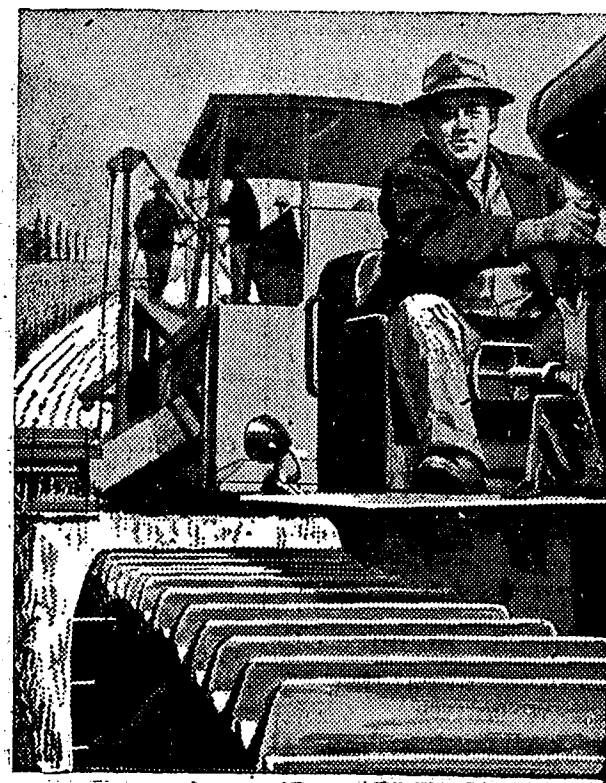
