CROWD ESTIMATED AT 2,000 IN TOWN SATURDAY FOR LOCUST BLOSSOM FESTIVAL

A crowd estimated at 2,000 poured into Kendrick last Saturday, May 27, to witness the First Annual Locust Blossom Festival, a day that dawned cloudy, then turned to warm, comfortable sunshine—just right for the visitors. Every spot that would accommodate a car was taken, with the vehicles running almost to the village limits.

The day opened with a parade—one that featured a little bit of everything, from horses to pets, from the beautiful to the commercial, the latter including the community's life-blood, farming and lumbering. Included were two bands, that of the Kamiah High School and Kendrick High School. There were 81 horses and riders, almost all of these latter taking part in the Gymkhana, later in the day at the baseball diamond.
