## FACULTY FOR THE COMING SCHOOL YEAR ANNOUNCED

"The faculty for our local schools is almost complete for the next school year," announces R. L. Meserve, superintendent.

At Southwick, all personnel are returning. Mrs. Tarry as principal and teaching grades one, two and three; Mrs. Sandquist will teach grades four and six. At the present time there are no pupils registered for grade five. Mrs. Cowger will continue to be school lunch cook and building custodian.

At the Juliaetta Elementary School the staff remains unchanged. Mr. Manfull will be principal and teach the sixth grade; Mrs. Nelson, fifth grade; Mrs. Gruell, fourth grade; Mrs. Taylor, third grade; Mrs. Erlewine and Mrs. Callison, the second grade classes, and Mrs. Perryman, first grade. Mrs. Cope will continue at part-time office secretary. Mrs. Carlton and Mrs. Bowen will feed the students, and Mr. and Mrs. Eckman will maintain the building.

### Junior High

At the Junior High Mr. Merrick will be the principal and teach Mathematics, Science, and part of the Social studies. Mrs. Jones will be teaching the Language Arts (reading, time to teach the Commercial sub-Social studies.

### Senior High School

In the Senior High School Mr. Racicot will take over the duties of High School Principal, in addition to his coaching; Mrs. Deobald will continue to teach the Commercial subjects and English; Mrs. Merrick will be in the Library and teach French and English.

Douglas Christensen will be teaching full time this coming year in the Vocational-Agriculture department.

Roger Christensen will take over the Science Department. Mr. Cook is planning to return to our High school this coming fall in the Mathematics department. The Home Economics position is still vacant — there have not been any applicants for the position.

Clive Lindsey will be teaching music in the three schools this coming year.

## MRS. N. NETHKEN WINS HONORS IN ALASKA

Anchorage, Alaska — Mrs. Norman Nethken, secretary to Buell A. Nesbett, chief justice to the Alaska Supreme Court, has been named the Legal Secretary of the Year by the Anchorage Assn. of Legal Secretaries.

As the winner of the local honor, Mrs. Nethken will compete for the national title at the national association's convention in July. This is the fifth year that the Anchorage association has nominated a member for the national honor.

A resident of Anchorage since 1954, Mrs. Nethken has done legal work since 1942 when she left her position as a high school teacher of commercial subjects to become a legal secretary to an attorney in eastern Washington.

Mrs. Nethken's first lawyer-employer owned an abstract and title insurance company and later she became office manager for him.

In Alaska since 1950, Mrs. Nethken first worked in Juneau, where she was in the adjudication department of the Veterans' Administration. She began working with Judge Nesbett while he was a partner in the law firm of McCutcheon and Nesbett. She was the first Supreme Court employee in the Anchorage Supreme Court office.

A graduate of Kendrick (Idaho) High School and the University of Idaho, Mrs. Nethken likes legal work because "it's so very interesting. There's never anything monotonous about it."

"I've been very fortunate in having good employers, too," the new Legal Secretary of the Year noted.

Mrs. Nethken, who is known to her friends as "Alicie," is a charter member of the local legal secretaries organization and has served two terms as vice president.

Married to a Federal Aviation Agency employee, Mrs. Nethken spends most of her time away from the office at her home at 2107 Lincoln Ave. Her hobbies include flower gardening, ceramics and fishing.

## PROJECT TALENT TEST TAKERS BEING SOUGHT

Ninety thousand persons, a dozen or so of them living in this school district, are being "hunted" by a national research project, it was learned last week-end by R. L. Meserve, superintendent of schools.

The "search" stage of "Project Talent," the national research program, was begun last week as the University of Pittsburgh project staff announced that follow-up questionnaires were being mailed out to 90,000 persons, all former high school students, who took the tests of "Project Talent" last year.

In the project, financed by the Cooperative Research Program of the Office of Education and other agencies and supervised by psychologists of the University of Pittsburgh, more than 440,000 high school students were given two days of testing in their abilities in school subjects, their basic aptitudes and their general information and other subjects.

This testing was done in 1,353 high schools in the spring of 1960, the purpose being to measure the abilities, not just of superior students, but of all kinds of students in all kinds of high schools throughout the nation.

In this community, the tests were given to students at Kendrick High school. With the help of the school staff, including Ben P. Cook, principal and R. L. Meserve, superintendent, the staff of "Project Talent" is seeking to mail the follow-up questionnaire to each of the 20 students who were seniors at the time of the testing. In December, the headquarters of the project mailed to each high school the scores made by the students on the tests. These test results are being used by each high school in accordance with its own educational and guidance program.

As the first stage in the follow-up, said Prof. John C. Flannigan, director of the research project, the first questionnaire to get information on the students' careers after high school, was put in the mail last week. The questionnaire asks the ex-high school student whether he is in college, what jobs he has had, and how well he is getting along.

"This is the first large research project outside of the military service which will gather information on young people's abilities and later find out what kind of schooling and what kind of occupational success they have," said Prof. Flannigan. "Thus educators will be able to plan school policy on the basis of detailed knowledge of just what aptitudes and just what courses, and just what kinds of outcomes they may expect from various kinds of students. All information on the questionnaire is kept confidential and is merely used for statistical purposes. We expect that in the future the directors of educational institutions, including high school principals, supervisors and school boards can know more about the practical results of our American educational system."

Each member of "Project Talent," at the time of taking the test in the spring of 1960, received a registration card and was told that from time to time in the future, the researchers of "Talent" would be in touch with him or her to seek more information.

## LAYING PIPE LINE

Heath Brothers of Stony Point have been busy here the past two weeks digging the ditch for the new well to the start of the old six-inch pipe line from the Gif Candler home to the new well adjoining the ball diamonds.

The new six-inch steel pipe line is now being installed in the ditch — and not a bit too soon, for with hot weather close at hand, the water from the well is going to be needed.

The six-inch line will cut down on friction, as well as providing much improved fire protection in the west end of town.

## FIRE HELD TO BIN AT PLANER MILL

Two fire departments and a crew of men confined a sudden fire in a shavings bin at the Mead & Howard Lumber Co., Inc., planer mill at Juliaetta, Friday afternoon. Damage was not extensive.

The Juliaetta and Kendrick fire departments were called at 5:45 p. m., and the night crew aided in fighting the blaze. Jack Mead said no estimate will be made on the damage until an adjuster arrives. The cause of the blaze is not known, but was believed to have resulted from a spark being carried into the bin by wind from the burner.

Shavings from the mill are blown into the bin. Farmers pick up loads from it for use in poultry houses, feed yards, etc.

Mr. Mead congratulated the mill crew and the fire departments on their quick work in controlling the blaze.

The night crew had begun work at 5:00, the day crew leaving at 4:00 p. m.

**IDAHO PLANS YOUTH CAMP**

Boise — State Forester Roger Guernsey announced plans this week for the Idaho Youth Conservation Camp provided for by the last legislature. The legislature appropriated \$61,000 for the biennium for a pilot project aimed at conservation and development of Idaho's youth and natural resources. The State Forester was given responsibility for running the camp.

Guernsey said the purpose of the camp is to take boys 14 to 17 years of age, of good character, and teach them good work habits and woodsmen skills, and thus promote their further development mentally, morally, physically and spiritually. A companion objective will be accomplishment of worthwhile conservation measures.

The State Forester said the camp will be located in Priest Lake State Forest in far northern Idaho. The camp will officially open on July 10 and close August 30. Since this is a pilot project the camp will be limited to 44 boys, one from each county. Applicants will be required to produce a birth certificate and each boy selected will be required to show a doctor's certificate proclaiming him physically strong and capable of performing moderately heavy labor. The final selection will be made by holding drawings for each county. Each boy will be paid \$30.00 per month with transportation, food, shelter, sleeping bag and shoes furnished. No private cars will be permitted at the camp. Transportation will be via forestry department bus with stops at Idaho Falls, Pocatello, Twin Falls, Boise, McCall, Grangeville, Lewiston, Moscow and Coeur d'Alene.

Guernsey said the main emphasis will be on productive, meaningful and healthful work designed to develop stronger bodies and sharper minds. There will be a minimum work day of eight hours, including travel time, five days a week on projects, with special assignments and organized recreation on Saturdays and Sundays.

Projects will include road-side clean-up, trail clearing and thinning of over-stocked stands of small trees. The boys will be given training in fire fighting the first day in camp. However, it is not planned to use youth camp enrollees on dangerous sectors of running fires. Rather, the youth camp crews would be used to patrol controlled sectors of large fires and mop up after control is gained.

Mr. Guernsey urged all interested boys to write to the State Forester, Boise, for a special application blank. He said applicants for jobs as camp director, crew leaders and cooks should also apply to the Boise office.



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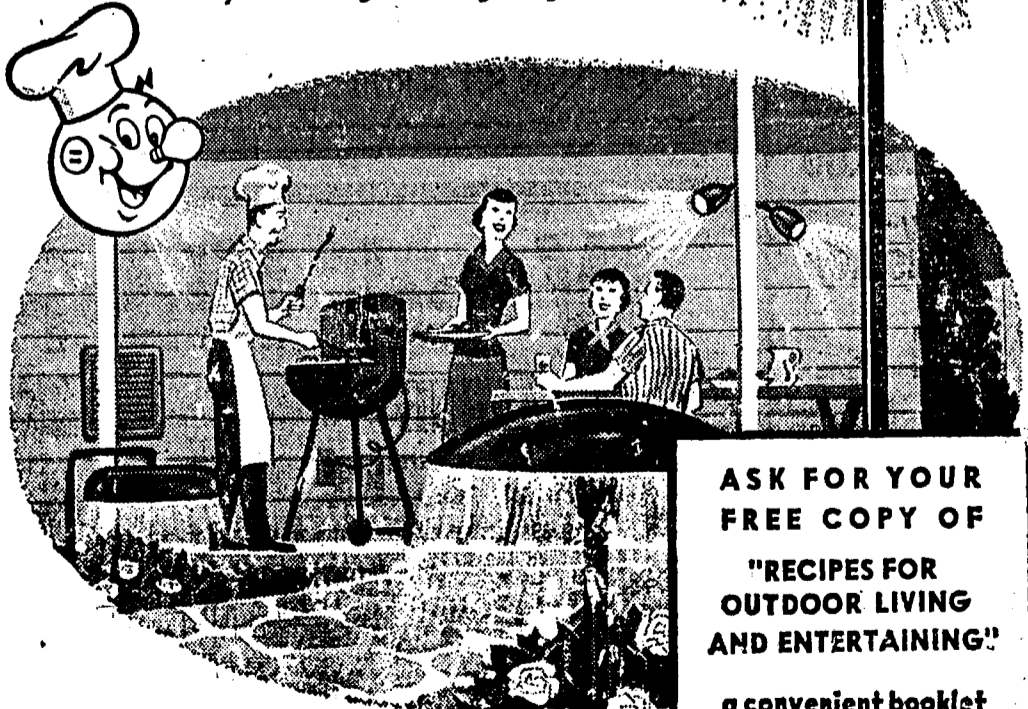
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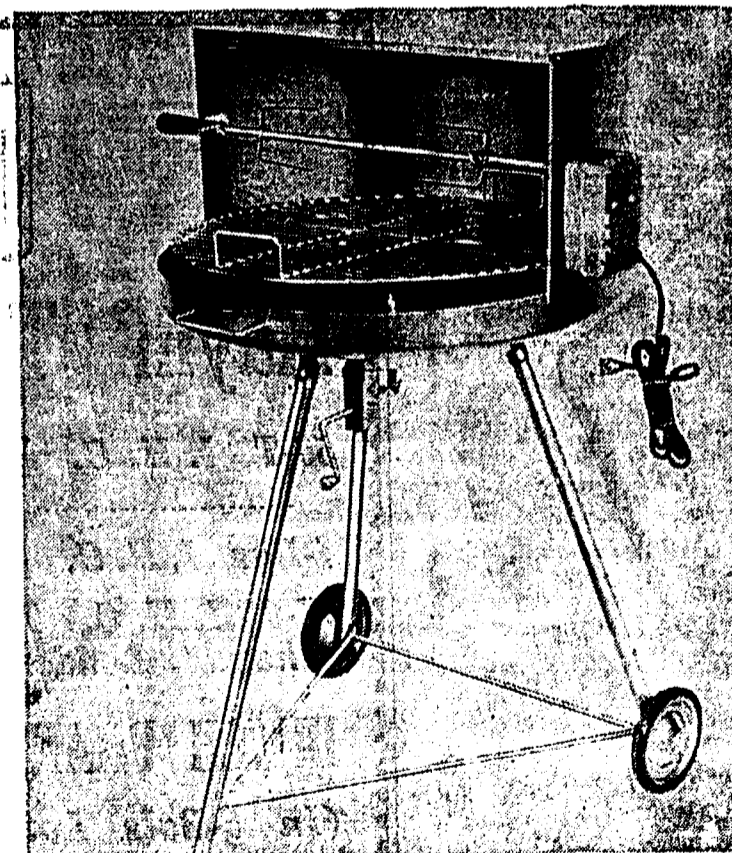

### STRIPE RUST SHOWS IN FALL WHEAT

Moscow — Heavy infestations of stripe rust is showing in fall wheat from one end of Latah county to the other, reports Homer Futter, Latah County Agent.

If the rust follows a similar pattern to that of last year, we can expect to see fields turn yellow within a few weeks. Although research workers from the universities and chemical dealers have been looking desperately for a chemical to control stripe rust, as yet the search has been unsuccessful. There is no chemical control that warrants the cost to the farmer, to this date.

Futter reports that the wheat variety, Brevor, which is quite resistant to the stripe rust spores, is being covered with so many spores that some leaf damage is evident.

"It is difficult to predict the amount of loss in yield that will result from the stripe rust," said Mr. Futter, "but from results last year, we know that wheat can make fair yields even where heavily affected with rust. Wheat that had all the leaves destroyed from the rust, was not a crop failure, so we can come out in yield, but still have some wheat to harvest."

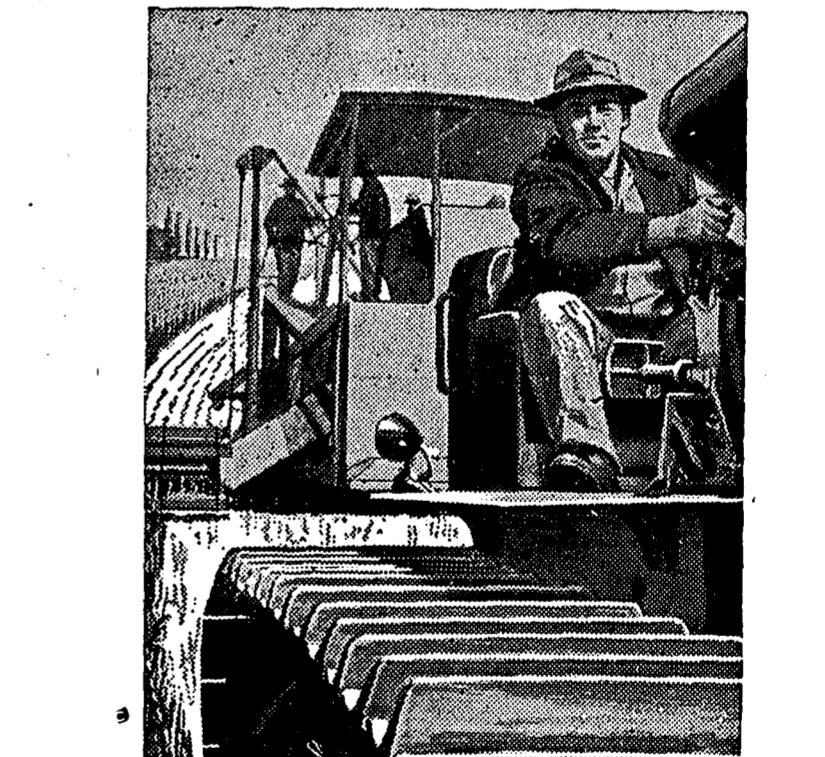
