## WOODROW NYE, FORMER JULIAETTA RESIDENT DEAD

Woodrow Nye, a lineman for the Clearwater Power Co. of Lewiston, and a former resident of Juliaetta, was found dead Monday morning, apparently electrocuted.

Nye 46, Potlatch, was found hanging from a utility pole by his safety belt about 3 1/2 miles south of Potlatch on Rock Creek Road.

He was first thought to have suffered a heart attack. It was after the mortuary removed Nye's gloves that his burned hands were noted. Latah County Sheriff R. C. Lange Moscow, was called and went to Potlatch to investigate.

Mr. Nye has been employed by the company for 18 years. He was a subforeman of a three-man crew stationed at Potlatch as "trouble-shooters" on lines in that area. He occasionally worked alone.

Nye was born Sept. 11, 1914 at Juliaetta and lived there until moving to Potlatch nine years ago. He married Viola Kumpula at Lewiston, Nov. 4, 1944. He was a member of the Methodist Church and Grange.

Survivors include his wife and two daughters, Ardene and Kathy, all at home; two brothers, Eloy Nye of Potlatch and Alvin Nye of Clarkston; and three sisters, Mrs. Donna Cope of Juliaetta, Mrs. Clara Haddock of Moscow and Mrs. Virginia Tweit of Mandan, N. D.

The funeral will be at 2 p.m. Friday at Short's Chapel, Moscow, with the Rev. Joe Anderson, Pastor of the Potlatch Community Church, officiating. Burial will be at Moscow Memorial Gardens.

## HENRY REIL IN GRAVE CONDITION DUE TRACTOR UPSET

Henry Reil, Potlatch ridge farmer, was critically injured Monday morning when the wheel tractor he was driving went over an embankment and overturned. He suffered a triple fracture of the pelvis and a severed urethra.

The accident occurred about 11:00 a. m., while Mr. Reil was mowing hay, some 200 feet from his house. He was not found until 12:30 p. m.

Dr. D. A. Christensen was called to the scene. He administered first aid and rushed Mr. Reil to the St. Joseph's Hospital where surgery was performed about 4:30 that afternoon. During the two-hour surgery Mr. Reil was administered five pints of blood.

Reil said that the tractor had not rolled on him, but that he was thrown about 30 feet, and landed across the road. The tractor was reported to be badly wrecked.

## SIX VEHICLES ARE DAMAGED IN THREE WEEK-END CRASHES

A total of six vehicles received an undetermined amount of damage in three separate accidents near here from Friday through Sunday.

Two of the accidents occurred in the same spot, one on Friday evening, and the other Saturday evening. Both crashes occurred at the Wauchter Gulch bridge, about a mile east of Kendrick.

Saturday evening about 5:30, a 1949 Chevrolet driven by David Preussler of Lenore, and a 1958 Pontiac operated by William Kuykendall, Kendrick, collided on the north approach to the Potlatch creek bridge at the bottom of the grade.

A passing motorist drove Preussler, his mother and two young children to Orofino for examination by a doctor. Kendrick Marshal E. M. White estimated damage to the Pontiac at \$400, and said the Chevrolet was damaged beyond practical repair. He charged Kuykendall with failure to yield the right-of-way.

Friday evening about 8:30, a 1951 Oldsmobile driven by David Kossner, Lewiston Orchards, and a 1960 Jeep operated by W. M. Boring, Lenore, collided on the bridge. White estimated damage to the Jeep at \$75 and said the Oldsmobile was beyond practical repair. He charged Boring with failure to yield the right-of-way. In both instances, he said, the cited driver was on the wrong side of the road.

The third accident, occurring Sunday morning, involved a 1961 Rambler driven by Mrs. Douglas Christensen, Jr., and a 1958 Plymouth driven by Mrs. Arnold Hoisington. The accident happened on the Sperry grade about 10:30 a. m. No one was seriously injured, and damage to the vehicles was said to be light.

## C. DOUGHARTY DIES IN CRASH TUESDAY A. M.

Area residents were shocked and saddened Wednesday morning when they learned of the death of Clarence Dougharty, pioneer American ridge resident, in a one-vehicle accident near Coeur d'Alene Tuesday.

Mr. Dougharty was alone in a pickup truck with camper, headed for Kendrick after a fishing trip, when the accident occurred. Complete and accurate details are missing at this time — and exactly what happened is not clear.

It seems, however, that the accident happened at an over-pass near Worley, at 11:45 a. m., on Tuesday, June 20, and Mr. Dougharty was thrown from the pickup. He was rushed to the Coeur d'Alene General Hospital, and death came at 3:30 p. m. from internal injuries.

Mr. Dougharty had taken the camper and gone with Mr. and Mrs. Dave Denner, the latter in their own car, to Lake Coeur d'Alene on a short fishing trip. The Denners, also on their way home, went by way of Spokane, so were unaware of the accident until reaching home.

The pickup and camper are considered a total loss.

Short's Funeral Chapel, Moscow, is in charge of arrangements. No further information is available at this time.

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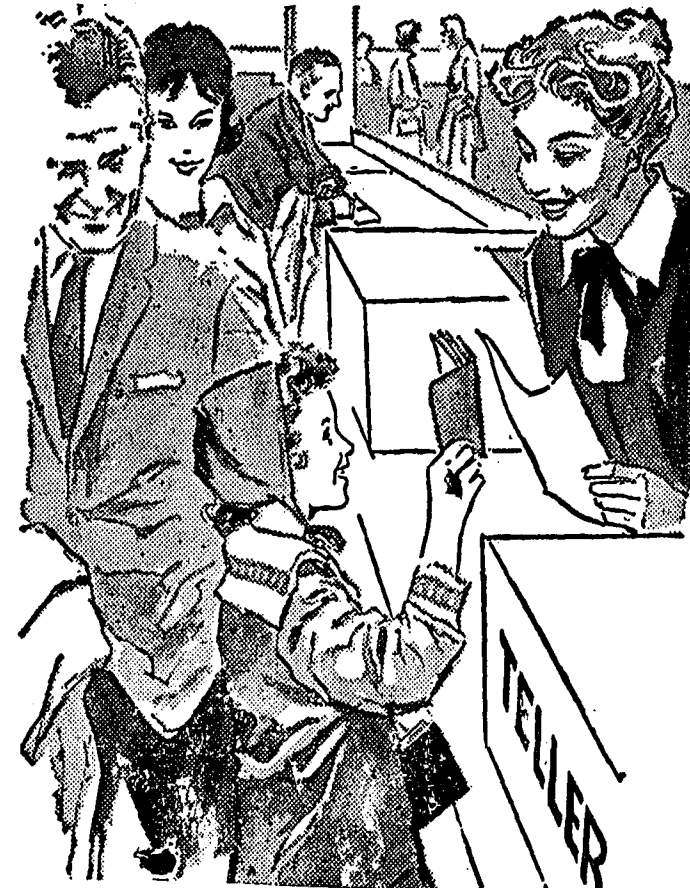
