Retirement Ends 52 Years of Railroading for Roy Ramey, Well Known Kendrick Depot Agent

Roy H. Ramey, Northern Pacific railway station agent at Kendrick, ended 54 years of service with that organization, and 38 years at Kendrick, on Wednesday, June 21, when he retired.

"Actually, it's 54 years and one day," said Roy, who began work with the Northern Pacific June 21, 1907, as night operator at Palouse, Wash. Mr. and Mrs. Ramey's son, Roy, Jr., is continuing in the work, having served as N. P. agent at Rosalia, Wash., since 1940.

Dieselization has probably been the biggest change to come to the railroads since he started his career, Ramey said. "The first steam engine was pretty slow going compared to the powerful diesels we now have."

Roy remembers a number of floods, train wrecks and landslides that occurred during his many years with the railroad, and recalled that at times he had to work two or three days and nights in a row.

"However," said Roy, "that's just a part of the work when you railroad." He remembered one instance in particular in the spring of 1934, when Kendrick had what was probably its biggest flood.

"The depot was on an island, surrounded by water on all sides," Roy said, "and Main Street had a lot of water flowing down it, with sandbags piled in front of the business houses."

Mr. Ramey was born at Wood, Vt., Sept. 5, 1887, and lived there until the age of 13, when he moved to Gate City, Va. In 1905 he came west to Spokane, "when the state fair was on."

After being employed by the railroad, Roy worked for short periods of time at various places before becoming agent at Creston, Wash., in 1912. He was married to the former Mae Crosby in June of the same year. In April of 1923, the Rameys moved to Kendrick, where they have lived since.

On Wednesday morning, June 21 — the day of his retirement, Mr. Ramey received the following telegram: "R. H. Ramey, Kendrick. This day completes 54 years of faithful, efficient and loyal service for the Northern Pacific Railway. Through these many years your services have been outstanding. The Northern Pacific and officers of this Division Salute one of our finest agents. For you and Mrs. Ramey we extend our sincere wishes for a long and happy retirement." — N. M. Lorentzen, Superintendent.

On Roy's last day on the job many of his co-workers called to congratulate him. That evening he, with Mrs. Ramey were the guests of honor at a steak dinner in the Clarkston Country Club. Hosts were a number of officials of the railway.

FINAL RITES FOR C. DOUGHARTY, AREA PIONEER

Final rites for Clarence Dougharty, American ridge pioneer farmer, who was killed Tuesday, June 20, in a traffic accident at an over-pass near Worley, Idaho, were held at the Juliaetta Methodist Church at 9:00 a. m., Friday, June 23, with the Rev. Ernest Gates, Palouse, Wash., and the Rev. F. C. Schmidt, pastor, officiating.

Music was furnished by the Juliaetta Church Choir, which sang "No Night There" and "Asleep In Jesus." There were accompanied by Mrs. M. C. Halliday on the organ.

Pallbearers were Marvin Chaney, Troy; Cecil Rogers, Colfax; Harold Powell, Cream Ridge; Matt Johnson, Clarkston; Archie Rowland, Colfax; and Harold Roberts, Kendrick. All except Mr. Roberts were cousins of Mr. Dougharty.

Interment was in the American Ridge Cemetery. Short's Chapel of Moscow was in charge.

Mr. Dougharty was born on the family homestead on American ridge, March 8, 1891 and had lived in this area all his life. He farmed the original family place until his retirement some four years ago.

He was united in marriage to Maude DePartee, at Orofino, Nov. 16, 1912, and they had since made their home on American ridge.

He was a member of the Juliaetta Methodist Church.

Surviving besides his wife, at the family home, is a brother, Lawrence, Moscow.

DUMP PAPERWORK NEARS COMPLETION, PUBLIC MEETING CALLED ON MATTER

The Kendrick Village Trustees will meet in regular session on Wednesday, July 5, instead of the usual meeting night of Tuesday, July 4.

At the meeting, the council will hold open public discussion on a possible solution of a fair and just way of charging for the pickup and disposal of garbage. At the present time the garbage collection is on a private enterprise basis, but this situation will no longer exist when final legal documents are signed and the village takes possession of one acre of ground recently leased from Jack and Gerald Lohman.

The biggest problem facing the council at the meeting, regarding the dump will be how to make the dump area pay for the upkeep of a road, bridge and fence, and \$50.00 a year lease fee, and also make it something of an income for the person making the garbage pickup.

Presently garbage is being picked up on a per-house and amount basis, a strictly private enterprise, with no expense to the village. Now, with no dump ground facilities available without expense to the village, it becomes a real village problem.

The question becomes: What shall be charged per house and business establishment, and how shall it be billed? One solution is that it be carried on the water bill, with a set

NEW WELL IN FULL OPERATION

By Thursday morning of last week, the new village well at Kendrick went into full operation to help eliminate the threatening shortage of water to the town.

Although no pumphouse has been erected, the pump was hooked to the newly installed six-inch line and since that time has been providing ample water to keep the reservoir level at the top.

E. M. White said that the new well, although without a metering device, was giving an estimated 125 to 150 gallons per minute into the system. He added that the pump was required to run only a few hours daily to give the village an ample water supply.

The old well, near the City Hall, has not been pumped since the new well went into operation.

MEMORIAL POOL TO OFFER FAMILY SEASON TICKETS

Beginning immediately, it will be possible to purchase a single season ticket admitting all the family, it was announced this week by the Swimming Pool committee of the Village Trustees.

Following some study on the possibilities of having one season ticket that would cover the entire family, a policy was adopted whereby a set price, depending on the size of the family, will allow the entire family to use all of the pool facilities of the Area Living War Memorial Swim Pool at Kendrick — from swimming lessons to afternoon and evening swims for relaxation.

The families desiring them will be charged according to the number in the family. The first break will come at (up to and including four) members of a family — they will be able to purchase a season ticket for \$12.00. The next break will be five (5) through seven (7) inclusive, and this size family will be able to purchase a season ticket for \$15.00, and the final change of charges will be \$17.50 for families with eight (8) or more persons in the family.

The above mentioned prices will include all members of the family — who are of a "swimmable age" — father, mother and children. The tickets will be on sale at the Swimming Pool office immediately, and will be for one family, and non-transferable.

Children who wish to purchase the tickets for the family must have a written note from the parent stating how many are included in the family, and it must be signed by one of the parents.

Season tickets which have already been purchased by children or adults will not be transferrable, nor will they apply to the purchase price of a family season ticket.

It was also the decision of the Swimming Pool committee that it will be required that persons taking swimming lessons will have to have a season ticket — junior, senior, or family.

It was learned this week that there are no regulations stating that Red Cross Swimming lessons must be given free of charge. And, due to the fact that the Red Cross will not subsidize the classes, it has become mandatory that a charge be made to help defray the expenses at the pool. Heretofore, gate receipts have not covered (with the exception of one year) the cost of salaries, chemicals, electricity. Other items, such as repairs and upkeep of the pool, must come from the village general fund.

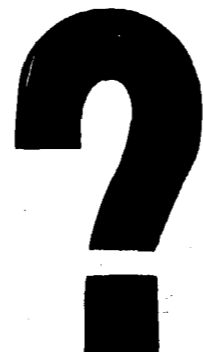
Instruction in common finishing materials and accepted methods of application will provide practical experience with a variety of materials applicable to wood and metal. Morning classes will run from July 3 to 14.

380 THOUSAND CATTLE, SHEEP GRAZE NAT. FORESTS

Over 380 thousand head of livestock grazed on National Forest ranges in the Northern Region last year, Boyd L. Rasmussen, Regional Forester said in Missoula this week.

More than 1,400,000 animal months of grazing were furnished in 1960 by national forests and national grassland ranges, he said. The lands are located in Montana, Northern Idaho, northeastern Washington and western parts of the two Dakotas.

In all, about 3,000 outfits grazed some 192,000 cattle and 189,000 sheep on the 7 million acres of suitable rangeland managed by the Forest Service in the Northern Region. Sheep grazed a total of 457,965 animal months, cattle 945,056 animal months. Northern region national forests furnished seasonal grazing for 141,331 cattle and 182,521 sheep, and the national grasslands 51,365 cattle and 6,545 sheep.

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\$179,000 AVAILABLE TO MATH, SCIENCE TEACHERS AT U. OF I.

Counselors and teachers of mathematics and science in secondary schools will receive eight weeks of intensive training aided by nearly \$179,000 in federal grants at the University of Idaho Summer School.

About 150 junior and high school teachers, predominantly from Idaho towns, will participate in the Summer School institutes beginning Monday, June 19.

Directing the Summer Institute for High School teachers of Science and Mathematics, attended by 76 teachers, will be Dr. Edgar Grahn, associate professor of chemistry. A grant of \$94,000 has been provided by the National Science Foundation to cover expenses of the institute and allow a stipend for each participant. This is the fifth consecutive year that the University has been awarded funds for this institute.

An additional amount of \$41,900 has been awarded by NSF for the second Mathematics Institute for junior and high school teachers. A total of 36 educators will take part in the institute directed by Dr. Kenneth A. Bush, head of the mathematics department.

A grant of \$42,421 was provided under the authority of the National Defense Education Act of 1958 to the university for the second annual counseling and Guidance Training Institute. Dr. Eugene Giles, Professor of psychology, will direct the eight-week session. It will be attended by 30 teachers and counselors who intend to engage in professional counseling and guidance in secondary schools.

A Stipend of \$600 will be provided through the grants for each participant, in the three conferences, plus allowances for travel and dependents. The purpose of the institutes is to increase the overall competence of secondary school educators.

DREDGE MINING CONTROVERTIAL

A final report of a committee to study and recommend solutions to problems arising from alluvial mining has just been released by the Idaho Bureau of Mines and Geology.

"Over the years dredge mining has been done as a source of profit to some Idahoians and annoyance to others," said Dr. E. F. Cook, director of the Idaho Bureau of Mines and Geology and dean of the college of Mines. "Problems arising from the disturbance of stream channels and banks led to stringent Dredge Mining Protective Act. In other states of the northwest similar problems arise from sand and gravel recovery operations in stream beds.

In 1958, the Columbia Basin Inter-Agency committee, composed of federal and state representatives looked into the problems covering dredge mining, hydraulicking and sand and gravel operations. Dr. Cook was elected chairman of the committee composed of eight federal and three state officials.

The final report has been published as an information circular titled, "Alluvial Mining in the Pacific Northwest." Dr. Cook points out that the report represents the consideration judgment of a group of resource experts on a problem of general concern and interest.

Subjects covered include the extent of alluvial mining in the Pacific Northwest, laws and regulations governing such activities, and recommendations for such changes in controls as the committee feels are necessary to protect beneficial water and land users from unwarranted damage by alluvial mining.

Single copies of the new publication are available without charge upon request from within Idaho to the Bureau office in Moscow.

STUDENT TEACHERS SET SUMMER SCHOOL

More than 100 elementary school students in the vicinity of the University of Idaho will begin summer studies June 26 in Moscow's Whitworth school under the supervision of six university student teachers.

Dr. John Snider, Professor of elementary education, said teachers will be enrolled in Ed. 130, Student Teaching in the Elementary school and receive six credits for their teaching.

A week of lesson planning will begin Monday June 19. Time for evaluation will also be arranged for the week of August 4 to the end of the University Summer School August 11.

Pupils enrolled in the grades one through six, will attend classes from 8 a.m. to 12 noon Monday through Friday.

**NEW Y. W. C. A.,
LEWISTON, OPENS**

The new Lewiston-Clarkston Young Women's Christian Association residence building at 300 Main St., Lewiston, will be officially dedicated on Thursday, June 29. A public open house is scheduled from 4:00 to 5:30 and 7:00 to 8:30 p. m.

The contemporary design of the new Y. W. C. A. building incorporates a laminated wool structural system and light weight aggregate block curtain walls. An attractive front features and expanded metal screen, made of steel, and ceramic-mosaic tile with glass block inserts. Many wood products, manufactured by Potlatch Forests, Inc., have been used in this unusual building. The Lewiston firm made all but the largest supporting beams. Material used in the ceiling and roof is lock-deck, a PFI product, and lock-wall has been used for paneling in many areas. Ply-plank, a new type of hardwood flooring recently developed by PFI was used in all hard wood floors and is the first installation of its type.

In addition to office space, the main floor has a large social room that will be used for a variety of classes, meetings and social events by the Y. W. C. A., and the community. Five unique cabinets provide storage space for 200 chairs, and may be moved to section the room for smaller gatherings. Complete kitchen facilities are available. Another area may be divided into two club rooms. All rooms open onto the lanai, or courtyard, featuring a pool with mosaic rock designs in the bottom. The block pattern of cement and mosaic rock sections in the floor are high-lighted by distinctive plantings.

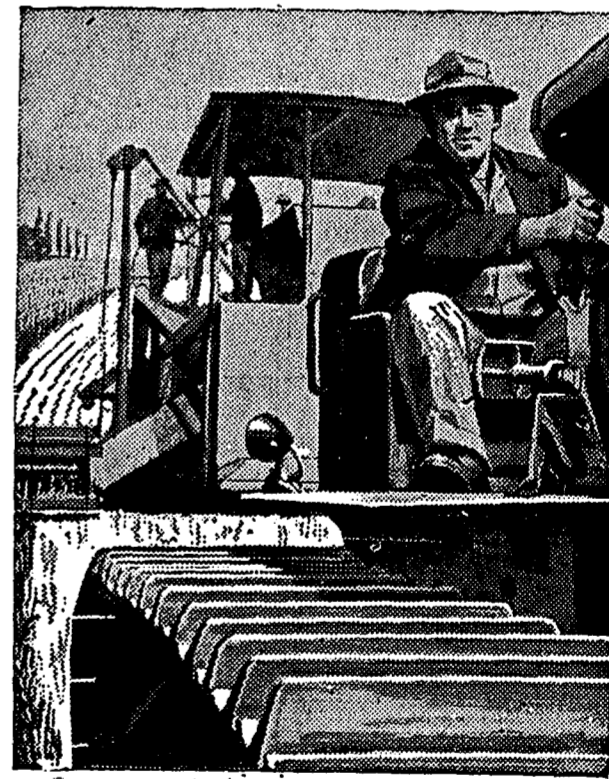
