• Now is the time to freeze fresh rhubarb right out of the garden. Just cut into 1" pieces, place in a plastic bag and seal with hot iron or a wire twister. Freeze. When ready to use, do not thaw, just use it as you would fresh rhubarb.

• Here's one for the kids; peanuts, popcorn, and candy bars can be stored in the freezer.

• Dorothy Smith says, leftover baby foods can be frozen right in the can. Special plastic lids are available for these cans.

• For future convenience, freeze meat stocks and juices for later use in stews, soups and gravies.

• Peg Lewis offers this timely recipe for Peanut Butter Bacon Roll-ups. Remove crusts from thinly sliced pumpernickle bread. Roll slices to prevent cracking. Spread with peanut butter and cut each slice into 4 strips. Cut bacon slices in half crosswise, and lengthwise. Roll up peanut butter strips, wrap bacon around them, fasten with wooden picks and freeze. To serve: broil frozen roll-ups until bacon is cooked on both sides.

### LAW AND THE FREE CITIZEN

The following essay, a prize-winner in recent competition, was written by Rona Armitage, Southwick, and it is with real pleasure that we present it to the public:

"God created mankind to be free. Man cannot be happy if his freedom is impaired. The spirit of mankind seeks to roam as the wind, unhampered by people or circumstances. Of course, there are bounds beyond which even freedom cannot rightfully go. In His creation of the universe, God made rules for its maintenance. We must realize that consideration of the rights of others will demand adherence to some universal moral laws, but obeying these laws will not cramp the human spirit. The true spirit of freedom emits kindness and unselfishness.

"If everyone would respect the freedom of others as they desire their own freedom to be respected, there would be no need for man-made laws; but ever since creation, there have been people who forget that their freedom is maintained only as long as their desires do not bring sorrow or harm to others. Because of these people who forget, laws have been adopted and must be enforced. In countries all over the world, systems of rules adopted by the people and enforced by the government are striving to correct the sad situations caused by those who infringe on the rights of their fellow men.

"The United States of America was founded and settled on the principle that all men are created equal and have certain undeniable rights and freedoms. The Pilgrims were intolerably abused by the Church of England, so they decided to gain religious freedom in a new, uncorrupted land. They knew, however, that

they would still need laws; therefore, they signed the Mayflower Compact before setting foot on the new land. These first settlers realized the importance of individual freedom, so they made laws to preserve what they believed to be right, and to punish what they believed to be wrong. Ever since the time of these great pioneers, America has been singularly blessed by God with good leaders — men of faith, wisdom and vision. These men, representing the people of the United States as a whole, established a government on the principles for which the Pilgrims came to America so long ago. The theme of the laws of our land is individual freedom. That this theme deserves pre-eminence is proven by the fact that for many years the United States of America has been regarded by the world as the Land of Promise, where men truly have the rights to Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness.

Not only do national laws need new recognition, but great stress needs to be placed on God-given universal laws. As a well-known news commentator said the other day, 'If America is determined to be ruined, she can be. God owes nothing to America. She can sink in the mud of selfishness and faithlessness just as many other nations who have forgotten God have done. The only hope for the happy survival of humanity depends on nations putting their trust in God and obeying the life-giving laws of rightness. Only then will there be what can truly be called 'free citizens'.

"The youth of today will be faced with new situations calling for regulations as they become the world leaders. New problems will arise from space conquests and other world developments; and, like the ever-changing winds, the citizen of tomorrow must be well-informed and conscientious, thereby being able to adjust himself to the rapid changes that will confront him, his country, and his relations with other countries in the world so that freedom may be preserved on earth. — Rona Armitage.

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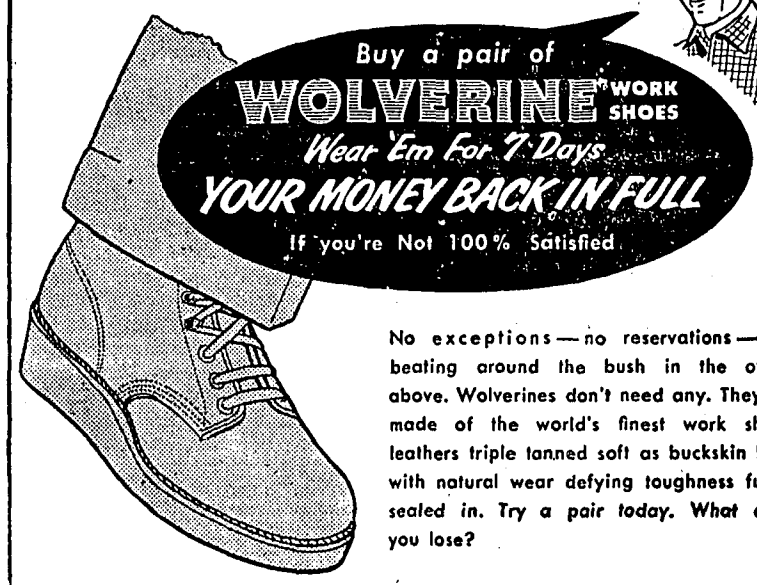
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
