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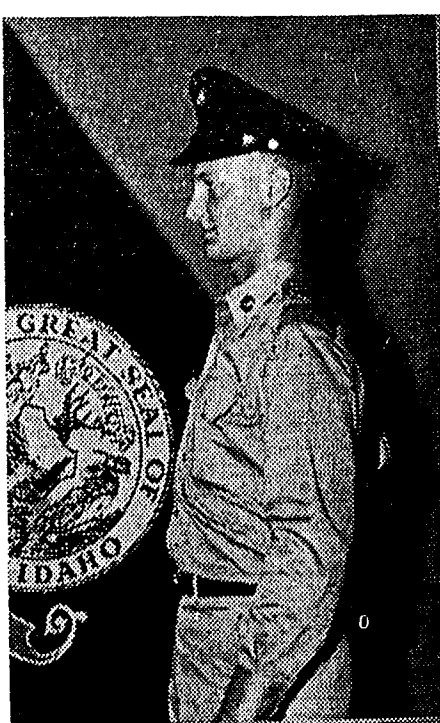

## L. WOLFF, HEATH BROTHERS DELIVER FIRST GRAIN

The Lewiston Grain Growers warehouses, in both Juliaetta and Kendrick, took delivery of the first grain of the season on Monday and Tuesday of this week.

The Heath Brothers delivered fall barley at Juliaetta on Monday, and Leonard Wolff and Sons brought the first grain to Kendrick on Tuesday morning. Both deliveries were of fall barley, and reports are that the grain is of good quality and that the yield is very good.

By Tuesday evening, so far as we have been able to learn, no other farmers were engaged in harvesting operations, but it is expected that by the end of the week, or the forepart of next, many will be in the fields to garner early crops.

Both Heath Brothers and Wolff are located on Potlatch ridge — the one which usually has the earliest harvest.

Farmers and warehousemen say that this marks the beginning of one of the earliest harvests in many years — usually it does not begin for another two or three weeks.

## KENDRICK DISTRICT KEPT ON JUMP BY FIRES

Men of the State Forestry Department have been kept pretty busy fighting fires this past week — and the fire danger season is just now coming into "full bloom" says Norman Lewis, district deputy fire warden.

He reports blazes as follows:

July 5th, 6:30 P. M. Location: Arrow Junction. An old cellar was burning next to the railroad depot. Two men and pumper unit extinguished the blaze. No estimate of damage. Cause unknown.

July 9th, 8:30 A. M. Location: Six miles south of Potlatch on the head of Rock Creek. An abandoned house and cellar burned, and threatened nearby timbered area. Pumper and three men from Kendrick, and the Potlatch Fire Department put out the fire.

July 9th, 5:00 P. M. Location: One-half mile west of Arrow Junction, on Highway 42. This blaze destroyed 160 acres of grass. It also damaged telephone poles, and threatened a house and outbuildings.

Eight men and a pumper from Kendrick, the Nez Perce county sheriff, his deputies, and a county pumper, plus about 25 volunteers extinguished the blaze. This fire was caused by a cigarette thrown from a passing vehicle.

No estimate of damage available.

## FREEZER FACTS

Here are tips on "how to get the most out of your home freezer." Featuring Dorothy Smith and Peg Lewis of the Home Economics Department of the Washington Water Power Company.

Your original freezer ideas and recipes are solicited for this column. Mail your suggestions to "Freezer Facts," Home Economics Dept., The Washington Water Power Co., P.O. Drawer 1445, Spokane, Wash.

Here's a real money saver. Buy several kinds of bread at the "day-old" bakery store and repack in mixed loaves. This gives a variety to each meal.

This one the kids will like. Next time you prepare strawberries, raspberries and other berries for freezing, make popicles from part of the fruit and juice, using popsicle or gelatin molds.

Peg Lewis recommends that frozen cakes be heated in the oven rather than thawed at room temperature. They will taste and smell more like fresh cakes when ready to use. Heat baked cakes in the original wrappings in a hot oven (375° to 400°) for about 10 to 15 minutes, depending on the size of cake.

Preserve the crispness and flavor of potato chips and caramel corn, by storing in the freezer. Ground spices will retain their flavor better when stored in the freezer. Be sure these foods are fresh when freezing, to retain maximum flavor.

Be sure to date and label all

freezer packages. A crayon may be used for marking. When sealing freezer bags, it is important to press air out of unfilled part of bag before freezing.

Dorothy Smith suggests the convenience of storing stuffed baked potatoes in your freezer. Prepare baked potatoes topped with melted cheese. Be sure to use No. 1 potatoes of mealy extra high quality. To reheat, spread them out in a shallow pan and place in a 400° F. oven for 15 minutes. When freezing, sliced cooked sweet potatoes dip them in lemon juice to prevent darkening.

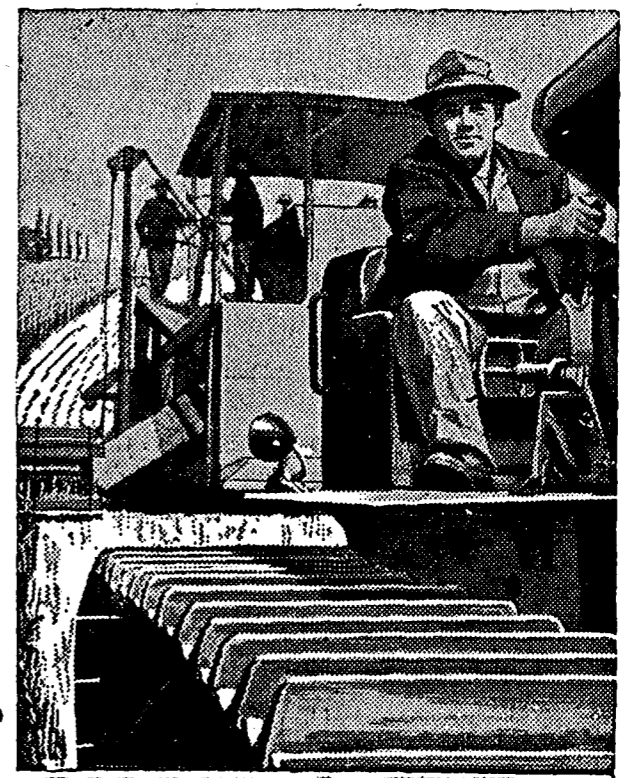
