### FREEZER FACTS

Here are tips on "how to get the most out of your home freezer." Featuring Dorothy Smith and Peg Lewis of the Home Economics Department of the Washington Water Power Company.

Your original freezer ideas and recipes are solicited for this column. Mail your suggestions to "Freezer Facts," Home Economics Dept., The Washington Water Power Co., P.O. Drawer 1445, Spokane, Wash.

As a general rule, avoid re-freezing foods. Refreezing almost always results in loss of texture and flavor. Partially thawed foods (except sea foods) can be frozen as long as they still contain ice crystals. Here is an exception to the rule; you can thaw uncooked food, cook it completely, then refreeze it.

Peg Lewis offers this "yummy"—Ice cream cake: bake cake in jelly-roll pan. Cut out "rounds" with cookie cutter. Using paper or plastic cups, drop in 1 scoop of ice cream, then a "round" of cake, another scoop of ice cream, and another "round" of cake—cover with favorite topping. Place foil over cup and fasten around cup with elastic band. Freeze.

Dorothy Smith cautions that fruits and vegetables lose up to 80% in nutrition, flavor, and quality within 72 hours after harvesting. Fresh fruits and vegetables frozen just a few hours after harvesting "locks in" all the valuable vitamins, minerals and flavor.

Here's a tip for freezing sauces and gravies — be sure to beat them until smooth. This helps prevent separation during freezing.

Butter can be frozen in the original waxed carton but to store longer than one month overwrap with sheet wrapping.

Freezing makes meats more tender through the formation of tiny ice crystals which expand and separate the fibers without loss of flavor or nutrition.

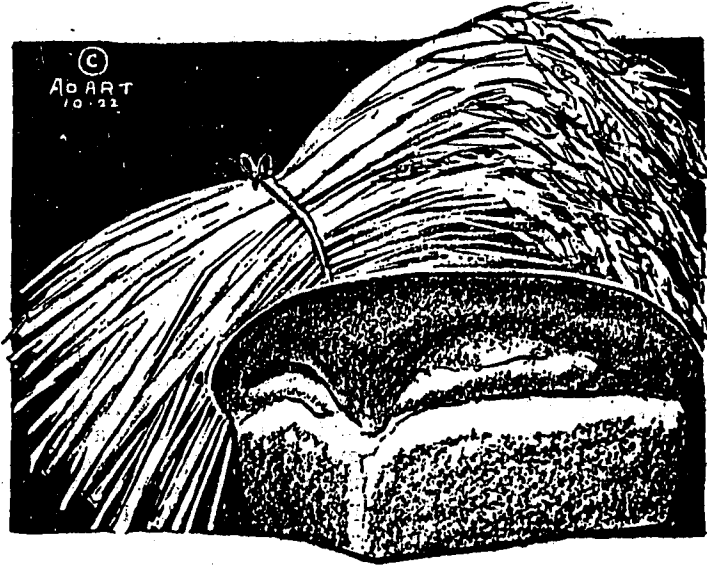

Persons presently drawing unemployment total 260 in Latah County. Last week the total was 292, and a year ago it was only 52.

At the present time there is employment available. For women, the following jobs are open. Stenographer, Secretaries, Nurses, Sales Clerks and housekeepers.

For Men: Watchman, Auto and Truck Mechanic, Dairyman, Janitor, Lab Technician and Trailer park manager.

As of the end of the week, there have been a total of 263 persons who have exhausted their regular claims for unemployment insurance, since the beginning of the benefit year, nearly a year ago. Of that number, 239 have filed claims for extended benefits under the Federally financed extension program. Of these who have thus extended their claims, 70 persons are still drawing these benefits. Of the others, 18 have used all their benefits without finding work, and the balance returned to work before exhausting their extended benefits.

Job openings and placements appear to be on the increase. This is due in part to better weather conditions in the area, coupled with the fact that several local persons were hired by Rosauer's Super Market, Inc to help staff their soon-to-be opened store here.

With continued good weather, and all appearances of better economic conditions in the area, jobs should be somewhat more plentiful in the near future, and claims for unemployment insurance should decrease accordingly.
