MRS. RAY HOWARD DIES AT SEATTLE FRIDAY, JULY 28

Mrs. Ray Howard, 56, prominent Juliaetta resident, died Friday, July 28, at Seattle, after an illness of some two months. She was the wife of Ray Howard, a partner in the Mead & Howard Lumber Co., Inc., at Juliaetta and Kendrick.

Mr. and Mrs. Howard had been Juliaetta residents for some ten years. Preceding that they made their home at Lewiston.

She was born Jan. 5, 1905, in Missouri, and lived in that state until 1913. She lived at Post Angeles, Wash., from 1913 to 1916, and in North Dakota from 1916 to 1921. From 1921 to 1950 she lived at Post Falls before coming to Lewiston.

She was a member of the First Church of Christ, Scientist.

Surviving besides her husband, are two daughters, Mrs. Betty Weaver, Edmonds, Wash., and Mrs. Polly McKeever, Nampa, and five grandchildren. Ivan French, Lewiston, who died Monday of last week, was Mrs. Howard's only brother.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 11:00 a. m. at the English Funeral Home in Coeur d'Alene, with a Christian Science reader officiating. Interment was at Forest Cemetery at Coeur d'Alene.

Mrs. Brackett Passes at 86
Mrs. Mary Grace Brackett, 86, a resident of north central Idaho for more than 50 years, died at 7:30 p. m. Saturday at the home of her son, Charles Brackett, Reubens, Idaho. She was the mother of a former Nez Perce County legislator, Mrs. Raleigh Albright of Juliaetta.

She was born May 7, 1875, at Howard Lake, Minn. She attended high school and normal school at Minneapolis and taught school at Ogilvie, Minn. She was married to James Ira Brackett at Ground House, Minn., on June 17, 1897.

The Bracketts moved to the Look-out community near Reubens in 1905, then returned in 1907 to Minnesota. They returned to this area in 1909 and Mr. Brackett operated a farm until his death in 1935. Mrs. Brackett had made her home with her son since her husband's death.

She was a member of the Presbyterian Church, Reubens Grange (a life member), Alice Whitman Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution, Clearwater Colony of National Mayflower Assn., and the Reubens Community Club.

Survivors include five daughters, Mrs. Raleigh Albright of Juliaetta; Mrs. Ralph Berry of Boise; Mrs. Ruth Mehl of Seattle; Mrs. Joyce Edwards of Kalama, Wash.; Mrs. Hinkle W. Cox of Jerome; three sons, James Brackett of Azusa, Calif.; Charles Brackett of Reubens, and Howard Brackett of Cos Cob, Conn.; 23 grandchildren, 45 great-grandchildren and one great-great grandchild.

Funeral services were held at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday at the Reubens Community Presbyterian Church. The Rev. Henry Sugden of Lapwai officiated. Interment was at the Look-out Cemetery near Reubens.

VILLAGE TRUSTEES ENACT NEW PEDESTRIAN LAW

The Kendrick Village Trustees Tuesday evening put into effect a new Ordinance which gives pedestrians the right-of-way within painted cross walks and marked intersections. The ordinance will not be effective until the cross walks can be painted and ordinance signs obtained and erected.

The ordinance was patterned after that of Troy's, which has been in force for some time, and has proven quite effective in providing safety routes for pedestrians.

This ordinance gives the complete right-of-way to the pedestrian at all times within the marked cross walks and intersections.

The primary reason for its drafting was to provide some type of protection for children and adults at the park and playground area in down town Kendrick, and to provide safe crossings for persons at the crest of the little rise at the foot of the "old Schoolhouse Hill."

Many complaints were received by the board from parents and older folk on the rate of speed traffic was permitted in the down town areas — and this ordinance seems to provide the legal answer, as it is simple, workable and effective, yet meets with all state legal requirements.

It is suggested that everyone read this ordinance, which appears in this week's issue of the Gazette — and pass the word along — for the Village Trustees intend to enforce it!

ORDINANCE NO. 508
 AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING MOTOR VEHICLES AND VEHICLES TO YIELD THE RIGHT-OF-WAY TO PEDESTRIANS IN DESIGNATED STREET CROSSING AREAS; REQUIRING DRIVERS TO HALT MOTOR VEHICLES OR VEHICLES WHEN DESIGNATED STREET CROSSING AREAS ARE OCCUPIED BY PEDESTRIANS, DEFINING TERMS USED IN THE ORDINANCE; PROHIBITING THE OVERTAKING AND PASSING OF A MOTOR VEHICLE OR VEHICLES STOPPED TO YIELD RIGHT-OF-WAY TO PEDESTRIAN IN CROSSING AREA; PROVIDING FOR PUNISHMENT FOR VIOLATIONS; PROVIDING FOR EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho:
 Section 1. The following words and phrases when used in this ordinance shall, for the purpose of this ordinance, have the meaning hereby ascribed to them unless the context in which they appear clearly indicates differently and they shall be construed in accordance with the following:
 (a) "Vehicle" shall be construed to mean every device in, upon or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a street or highway, except devices moved by human power or used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks.
 (b) "Motor Vehicle" shall be construed to mean every vehicle which is self-propelled and every vehicle which is propelled by electric power obtained from overhead power lines, but not operated on rails.
 (c) "Cross Walk" shall be construed to mean that street crossing area located on the street and highway bounded by parallel yellow lines marked on the surface of the street between which there are diagonal lines marked with white or yellow paint.
 (d) "Crossing at street intersections" shall be construed to mean those pedestrian crossing areas at street intersections bounded by parallel yellow lines marked on the surface of the street.
 (e) "Person" shall be construed to mean natural persons, associations, co-partnerships and corporations whether acting by themselves or by servant, agent or employee.
 (f) "Street Intersection" shall be construed to mean that place where one street joins another at an angle regardless of whether or not one or the other of said streets crosses the other.

Section 2. That every pedestrian shall have the right-of-way at all marked cross walks and at all pedestrian crossings at street intersections, and it shall be unlawful for the driver of a motor vehicle or any vehicle of every kind or nature to fail to yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian or pedestrians in the crossing areas aforesaid.
 Section 3. That it shall be unlawful for any person to drive a motor vehicle or a vehicle through a pedestrian cross walk or pedestrian crossing at a street intersection when said crossing area is occupied by one or more pedestrians, and it shall be the duty of any person driving a motor vehicle or a vehicle to halt the same at said crossing area when the same is occupied by one or more pedestrians.
 Section 4. Whenever any motor vehicle or vehicle is stopped at a cross walk or at a pedestrian crossing at a street intersection to permit a pedestrian to cross the street, it shall be unlawful for the driver of any other motor vehicle or vehicles approaching said stopped motor vehicle or vehicles from the rear to overtake and pass said stopped motor vehicle or vehicle.
 Section 5. Any person violating or failing to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance, or any person who shall counsel, aid or abet any such violation or failure to comply shall upon conviction be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00.
 Section 6. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, approval and publication.
