PICKUP CRASH KILLS SPOKANE MAN FRIDAY NIGHT

One Spokane man was killed and another injured critically when the pickup truck in which they were riding, left State Highway No. 42 near Juliaetta early Friday morning, plunged down an embankment and came to rest on its top.

Jacob James Kayto, 26, was tossed from the 1958 Chevrolet $\frac{1}{2}$ -ton pickup and apparently was killed instantly. Eugene N. Neilson, 24, was pinned in the cab of the wrecked vehicle. It took the wrecker crew, officers and volunteers almost two hours to free him, using hack saws, hammers and chisels.

Neilson was taken by ambulance to St. Joseph's Hospital where his condition was listed as "very critical." He suffered head injuries, including severe concussion, a fractured left leg, possible pelvic fractures, internal injuries and an injury to his right wrist.

State Patrolman Joe Mach, Lewiston, said Neilson was believed to be the driver, because he was on the left side of the pickup when it came to rest. The accident occurred about 1:25 a. m., one mile east of Juliaetta, on the curve just east of the Leon Branscum home. This curve has been the scene of many crashes in recent years, but this is believed to be the first fatal accident.

The two men, both employed by Neilson's father, L. E. Neilson of Spokane, on a construction project near Kendrick, were driving toward Kendrick. They had dynamite and explosive caps, plus barrels of diesel fuel in the pickup. Mach, who was assisted by Sheriff Bud Huddlestone of Lewiston and Constable E. M. White of Kendrick, said the truck started around the curve with the right front wheel on the shoulder, then plunged down the 10-foot bank. The truck bounced twice before coming to rest in a slough. The body of Cayko, who has a child a week old, was found just beyond the wreck.

Mach said the front wheel of the pickup was on the shoulder a distance of 219 feet. The truck then went down the bank and traveled another 70 feet before stopping. The doors of the truck were open but Neilson was pinned against the top of the up-side-down vehicle by the seat and steering wheel. A cutting torch was ruled out because of spilled gasoline and possible dynamite danger. Two hours were required to free him.

The Kendrick Welding & Machine Shop wrecker responded to the call, righted the truck and towed it to Kendrick. The dynamite and caps were taken by State Police.

Arthur Johns, who assisted in the work of freeing Neilson said: "Had that dynamite been set off by the caps or just exploded — there would have been fire all over the canyon side. I guess it was just pure luck it didn't go off."

ROAD RIGHT-OF-WAY ALL BUT PURCHASED

The Idaho Department of Highways reported on Monday of this week that only a small portion of the necessary right-of-way between Kendrick and Juliaetta is yet to be purchased.

Agreements have been reached with all but two persons on the land purchase, a member of the department told the Gazette. He said that he believed all major obstacles had been crossed, and now it was only a matter of time to settle with the others.

It was also noted that if a settlement is made with the remaining land owners, the project is slated for immediate construction, and that work would commence this fall. If a settlement can not be reached, and it is necessary for the state to take the land matter to court for condemnation proceedings, the road would not be available for construction this year.

With the two most recent accidents on this stretch of crooked, narrow road, one of which took the life of a 26-year-old Spokane man, it is evident to residents of this area that the rebuilding of this road is needed now more than ever before.

REIL IMPROVING FROM 2ND SURGERY

Henry Reil, injured in a tractor upset accident on June 14, underwent his second surgery for correction of injuries, on Monday, Aug. 7, and is reported slightly improved and now seeing a few visitors from time to time.

Mrs. Reil reports that it is not known at this time when her husband will be home from the hospital, as he is still convalescing and weak from the second surgery. He is sitting up, however, and is reported taking needed nourishment.

Mrs. Reil also stated that the Lewiston Blood Bank has requested that the blood administered to Mr. Reil be replaced and put in reserve. Mr. Reil had seven pints the first surgery and four on the Aug. 7th operation.

The first blood administered was replaced, but the supply needs to be kept up, a hospital representative stated. Mrs. Reil said that if persons are planning to give blood, it would be appreciated if it could be at the Lewiston Blood Bank. Blood can be given on Thursday evenings between 7 and 8, at the hospital.

ANDREWS FAMILY ESCAPE DEATH

Ernest Andrews, American ridge farmer, suffered a compound fracture of the right forearm and severed ligaments, and his wife Rena, severe left arm bruises when their 1959 Ford sport coupe left State Highway 42 just east of Juliaetta, plunged down a bank and overturned about 4:30 a. m., Sunday.

The Andrews were driving toward Kendrick, and the accident occurred at the first hill out of town. State Police Sgt. Kenneth DeYoung of Lewiston said Mrs. Andrews, who was driving, apparently dozed. The car went down a 10-foot bank and came to rest on its top on the Northern Pacific Railway tracks. Sgt. DeYoung said the car was damaged beyond feasible repair.

Mr. Andrews was able to kick the glass from a window, helped his wife out and they walked to the Ericl Woody home on the east edge of Juliaetta. They called their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Dave Crocker of Gifford, who were visiting at the Lester Crocker home in Kendrick. The Crockers drove them to the Lewiston hospital.

The Andrews and Mr. and Mrs. Crocker had attended a family reunion in Lewiston, and the Crockers, preceding the Andrews car, were unaware of an accident until the phone call was received.

Mrs. Andrews was released from the hospital Monday. She suffered cuts, bruises and shock. Mr. Andrews will be a patient there for a few days, having undergone surgery to set his broken arm and for repair of the severed tendons. He also has multiple bruises and deep scratches.

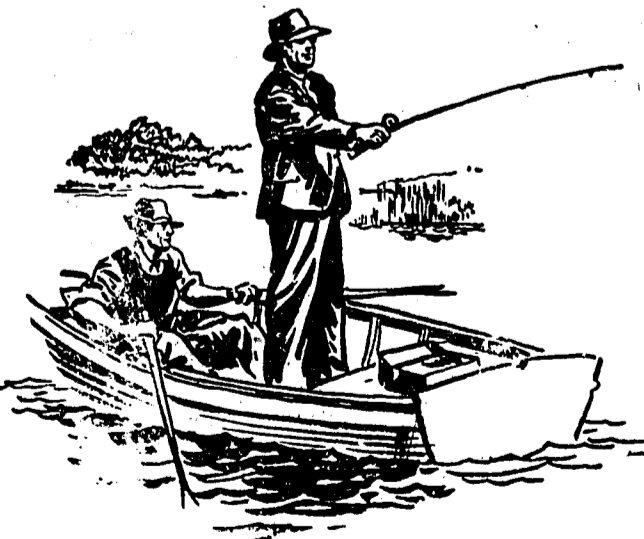

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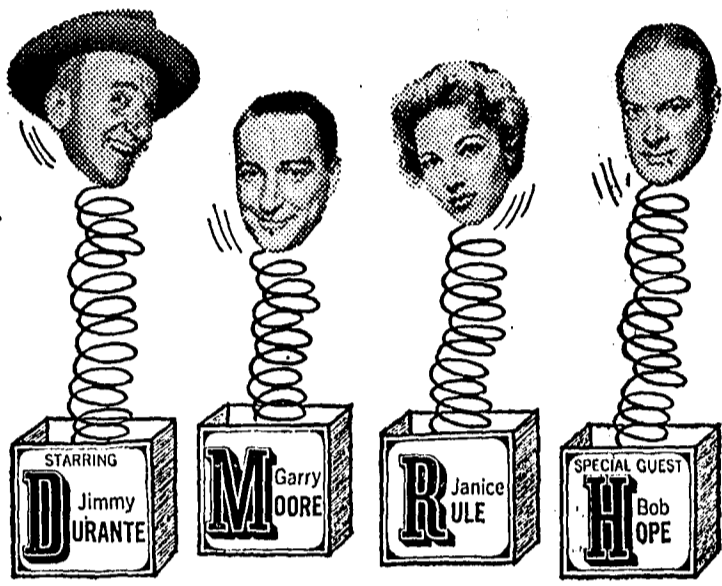
