
SAM GRUELL, 94, JULIAETTA PIONEER, DIES MONDAY

Samuel Gruell, 94, retired Juliaetta farmer and a resident there for half a century, died Monday at 10:10 a. m. at the St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston of an intestinal obstruction. He had been a patient at the hospital since the preceding Wednesday. Mr. Gruell was born Sept. 15, 1867, at Rushville, Indiana, and lived there in that state until 1899.

He farmed in the Peola area west of Clarkston from 1899 until 1909, and in the Pomeroy area from 1909 to 1912. He moved to Juliaetta in that year and had ben a resident of the area since.

He was married April 6, 1898, at Rushville, Indiana, to Lela Belle Thompson. She died March 24,


