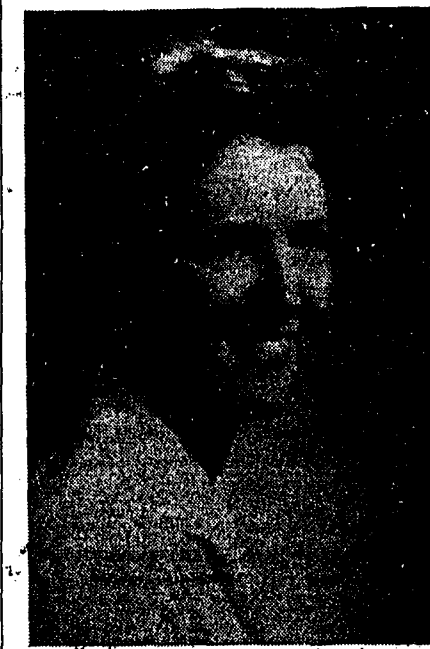

There were 3,500 girls in attendance.

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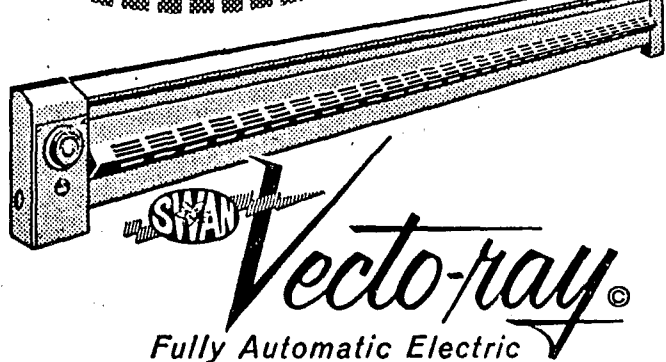
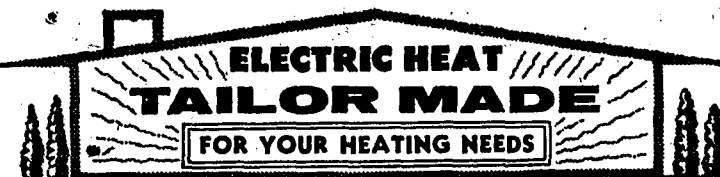

SEDATIVE USED TO CAPTURE ANIMALS

Fish and Game department fieldmen say that a new sedative treatment program soon may outmode present methods of capturing and handling wild animals.

The experimental project uses gunse firing small syringes loaded with drugs instead of lead projectiles. Similar methods are used in other parts of the world to handle animals of nearly all sizes, including elephants — and a king-sized syringe is being developed to capture whales. The dosage needed in

various animals varies a great deal. The black bear shown above with Ray Rogers, biologist, required a larger dosage than a moose, for example. Shortly after being immobilized, examined and ear-tagged, bruin wobbled to his feet and lumbered off "over the mountain."

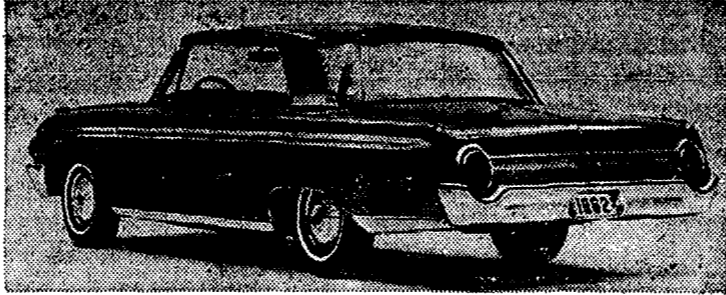
