MRS. JOHN DARBY, AREA PIONEER, DIES AT SEATTLE

Mrs. John (Myrtle) Darby of Kendrick, died Wednesday, October 4, 1961, at Seattle, at the age of 65. She had been in ill health for about a year. Mr. and Mrs. Darby had gone to Seattle for a visit in the home of her sister, Mrs. Grace Thomas, and also with a brother, Lyle Hammond.

Mrs. Darby was born March 23, 1896, at Kelseyville, Calif. She moved to Moscow in 1898, living there for some years, then moved to Troy, Idaho, later moving to Spokane.

She was united in marriage to John Darby at Spokane, April 26, 1922, and since that time had lived in the Linden-Crescent-Southwick area, and, following Mr. Darby's retirement some years ago, at Kendrick.

She taught school at Gold Hill for a time prior to their marriage, and later, during World War II, at Southwick. She was also the postmistress at Crescent for eight years. Mrs. Darby took a very active part in church work prior to her illness. She taught Sunday School at the Kendrick Community Church and held several offices in the W. S. C. S. of that church. She was a member of the First Church of Christ, Scientist.

Surviving besides her husband, at the family home, are three daughters, Mrs. Harold Pressnall and Mrs. Cecil Brammer of Lenore, and Mrs. Lloyd Farrington of Kendrick; four sisters, Mrs. Alma Drury of Spokane, Mrs. Ethel Bounds of Ojai, Calif., Mrs. Grace Thomas of Seattle, and Mrs. Erma Rudolph of LaCrosse, and a brother, Lyle Hammond of Seattle. Ten grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock in the Brower-Wann Chapel at Lewiston, with Hazel R. Spengler reading a Christian Science service. Music was by Margaret Peterson.

Palbearers were Arthur Foster, Clarence Weaver, Jack Mustoe, Everett Fey, Melvin Garner and Clem Lyons. Honorary bearers were Marvin Long, E. A. Deobald, Arnie Cuddy, Arley Allen, Darwin Tarry and Homer Betts, all friends of many years. Burial was in Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens at Lewiston.

Mrs. Darby counted her friends by her acquaintances — all who knew her loved her, and she will be truly missed throughout the entire area.

School Break-In

Sometime between 10:00 o'clock Monday evening and 7:00 o'clock Tuesday morning a thief, or thieves, broke into the Juliaetta Elementary school, reports James V. Muscat, Joint District superintendent.

Entrance was gained through the back door, prying it part way open and then cutting the lock. In their progress through the building the thieves broke several other locks, winding up with the one on the office door. With entrance gained here, they proceeded to punch (drill) the safe, and reaped a reward of \$9.25 for their trouble. This was all the cash it contained. A number of checks were left untouched.

Damage to the building and to the safe are estimated at \$75.00 to \$100. The sheriff's office at Moscow was called, and investigated. No finger prints were found, or leads obtained.

It is believed that whoever entered the building was unfamiliar with the layout, otherwise they would not have broken into the storage rooms, as only food was in them. Everything else seemed to be in order, so it does not appear to be the work of vandals.

IDAHO BUSINESS DUE TO CLIMB

A favorable outlook for general business in 1962 indicates a stronger demand for farm products than has been true in 1960 and 1961, the University of Idaho extension service said today in the current issue of "Economic Facts for Idaho Farm Families."

"The general level of business activity is expected to increase through out the year," the summary said, "perhaps reaching boom proportions by the end of the year. Inflationary pressures will be strong and the level of unemployment will be reduced only gradually. Prospects of further inflation and higher prices for industrial goods suggest a further increase in farm production costs, particularly for manufactured items."

The observations were made by R. Wayne Robinson, Robert Wilcox, and Virgil Kennedy, economists.

Cash receipts from Idaho livestock during the rest of the current year, the report said will likely equal or exceed a year earlier, and receipts from dairying will be a little larger. Increased production — except for wheat, oats and dry beans — coupled with higher prices should increase the financial returns from grain crops during this period. The availability of surplus grain in drought areas may limit increases in feed-grain prices.

A disturbing factor in the dairy industry, the summary said, is declining per capita consumption of dairy products. Consumption of fluid milk and cream went down from 324 pounds per person in 1960 to 316 pounds this year. Government stocks of butter and cheese at the end of August were larger than a year ago, despite an increase in per capita consumption of cheese.

"Dairy outlook for 1962 is relatively favorable," the economists said, "but is somewhat overshadowed by the implications of the decline in consumption of fluid milk and cream. In fact, figures show that if milk consumption continues to decline and production per cow continues to increase, we will need fewer cows in the next decade, despite the increase in total U.S. population."

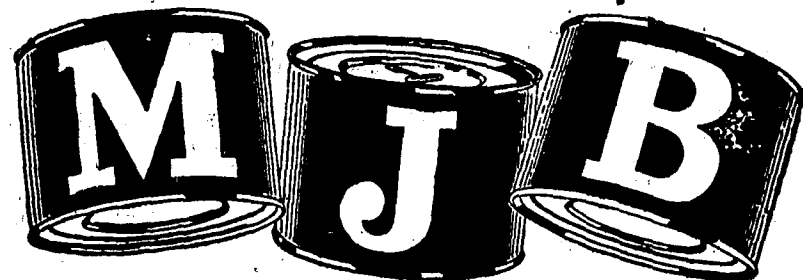

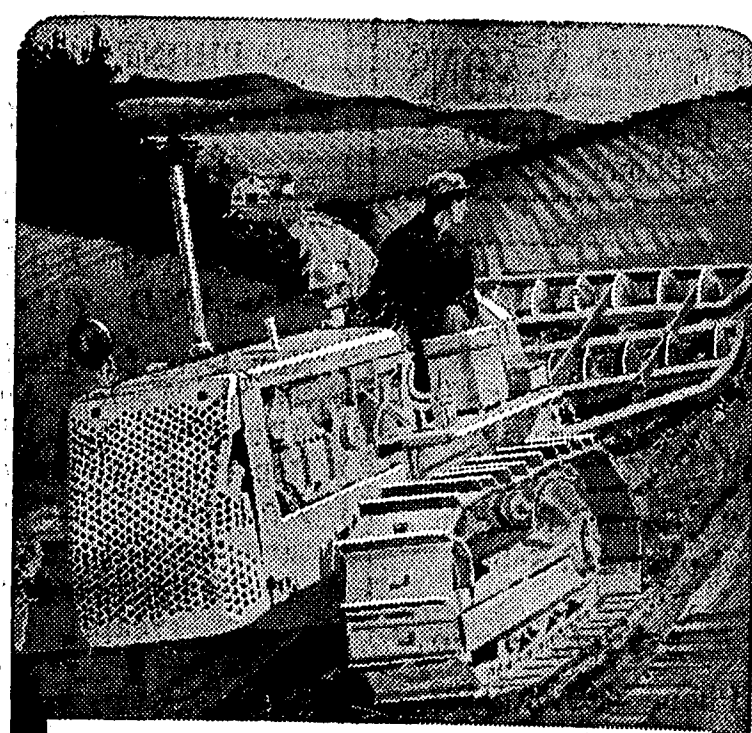
