## The 10 Commandments of Safety

- 1 Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of safety.
- 2 Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded, and taken down or have actions open; guns always should be carried in cases to the shooting area.
- 3 Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from chamber before firing.
- 4 Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.
- 5 Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.
- 6 Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while handling a gun.
- 7 Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.
- 8 Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
- 9 Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice, be sure your backstop is adequate.
- 10 Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

## SCIENCE PROGRAM BE CONTINUED

U. of I., Moscow — The Idaho Academy of Science Visiting Science program, initiated in Idaho last year to stimulate the study and teaching of science, will be continued this year, according to E. K. Raunio, professor of chemistry at the University of Idaho and director of the program.

The sponsoring organization, the National Science Foundation, has granted \$15,000 to support visitations to Idaho high schools this year by scientific personnel in education and industry. Eighty-two speakers have been approved by the Idaho Academy of Science to make visits, Raunio reported. More scientists are expected to be added before the lectures begin in November.

Speakers making 154 visits last year to 91 schools were from the faculty of Idaho's university and six colleges, three U. S. government departments, and four private industries.

Raunio said a list of available scientists, a brochure describing the program, and an application blank will be sent to every high school principal and teacher of science and mathematics in the state of Idaho.

"Day-long visits by scientists generally consist of a lecture or series of lectures on a subject agreed upon by the speaker and the high school teacher," said Raunio. "Discussions with teachers indicate that some of the scientists showed remarkable versatility last year. For example, a chemical engineer gave five different lectures in one day — two to beginning and advanced algebra classes, respectively; one in nuclear engineering, one in physics and one in chemistry. Each was called for on the spot and each was directly keyed to the specific class being addressed."

## RULES OF ROAD MEAN SAFETY

Boise — Traffic signs, especially the regulatory group such as Stop, Yield Right of Way, and Speed Limit are much like the laws which make them possible. They are based on rules of the road. They are to protect the driving public and not to restrict their freedom of movement.

Even though violation of the signs is a misdemeanor, the driver is not expected to mentally recite, "If I go through this stop sign I will be subject to a fine of \$100 and 10 days in jail." Actually the Stop sign is saying, "This is an intersection. Any intersection can be dangerous. Other vehicles are traveling on the road which is at right angles to my vehicle."

When such signs are posted, whether by the department of highways, county commissioners, local road district or cities, it is not necessary to post a law enforcement officer at each sign to make certain the law is being observed. The sign's purpose is not to make additional arrests and levy more fines. Their chief purpose is to help prevent accidents which are continuing to take their toll of lives, leave innocent people hopeless cripples, and bring Idaho property losses to an annual total of more than \$40 million.

Traffic signs and painted stripes alone cannot reduce accidents any more than can law enforcement officers be effective without laws to enforce and the courts to make unbiased decisions fair to both the accused and the accuser. Appeals to the public to drive carefully are worthless unless the appeal can actually be sold to every person who gets behind the wheel of a car.


The three E's of traffic safety — Enforcement, Education and Engineering — are as important now as they ever were. No one of them can succeed without the other two.

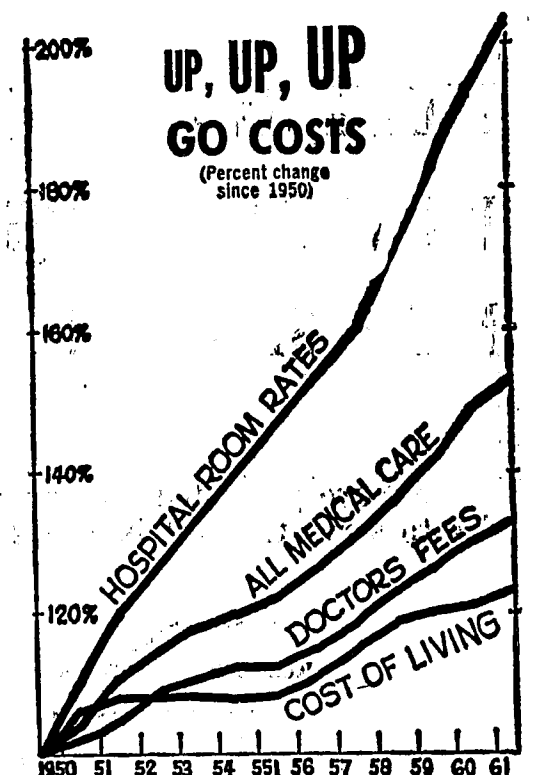

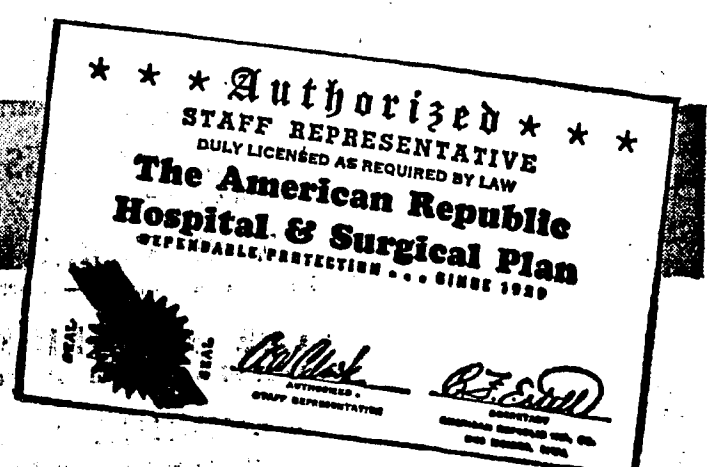

FISH AND GAME department spokesmen say nearly 70 rough fish eradication projects have been completed in Idaho since the program began in 1948. Here Dale Turnipseed, Craigmont conservation officer, and Jim Keating, fisheries biologist, Lewiston, examine trash fish killed in the Orofino Creek rehabilitation project last summer. The rehabilitated waters will be restocked with game fish.

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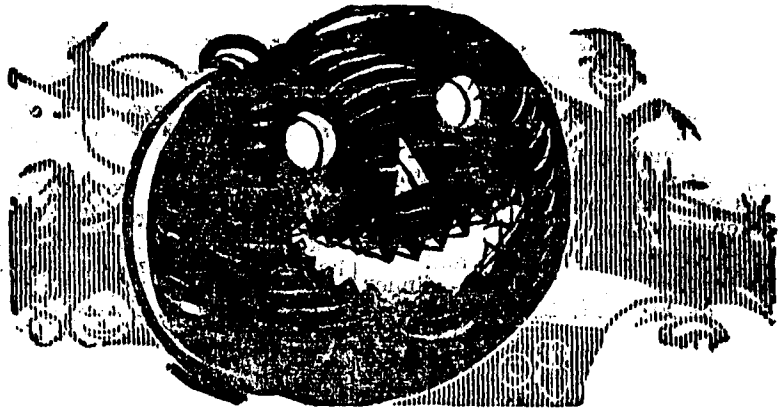
