



**INTERESTING BITS OF IDAHO HISTORY**

Nathaniel Wyeth, on his second expedition across Idaho, stopped to build Fort Hall (near Pocatello) during July and August of 1834. The

Fort was sold to the Hudson Bay Company in 1838.

Henry Harmon Spalding located the Lapwai Mission among the Nez Perce Indians, October 12, 1836. In 1839, Spalding set up a printing press, the first in Idaho, and printed an eight-page publication.

Robert Newell, William Craig and Joe Meek left Fort Hall, Sept. 27, 1840, and took a wagon west from Fort Boise over the Blue Mountains, thus showing that the Oregon Trail was a possible wagon route.

Moved to a new site at what was later to become Cataldo, the Coeur d'Alene Mission of the Sacred Heart reopened April 9, just in time for Easter, April 12, 1846.

James Marshall's discovery of gold in California, Jan. 24, 1848, led to a great rush on the California trail through southeastern Idaho, and 12 years later, to the discovery of important gold deposits in Idaho.

**ENROLLMENT UP AT U. OF I.**

Enrollment at the University of Idaho has zoomed past the expected 4,200 students to establish a new all-time record high number of students each time another registers.

Last year's total and previous high — 4,031 — toppled on the second day of registration when a young married couple from Boise, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Rank, signed up for classes. Rank is a finance major and his wife, Kay, an elementary education student.

Registrar D. D. DuSault and Admissions Director Frank Young predicted the final enrollment figure to be above 4,300.

All student housing facilities at the university have been pressed into service to meet the demand.

"Women's dormitories are full," said Robert F. Greene, director of dormitories. "Men's dormitories are also full with some students sleeping in temporary quarters until permanent rooms are available."

A new dormitory complex capable of housing up to 1,000 students in the preliminary planning stage to house the growing enrollment. The complex is planned to comprise four dormitories and a central cafeteria. It is hoped that the first unit, housing 200 men, can be constructed for use by the fall of 1963.

**RHEUMATIC FEVER ALWAYS PROBLEM**

Repeat attacks of rheumatic fever, often considered primarily a disease of childhood or adolescence, pose a serious life-long threat to susceptible adults, points out the Idaho Heart Association.

The disease most often strikes first following a streptococcal infection (such as a strep sore throat) suffered in childhood. The difference between rheumatic fever and most other childhood infections, however, is that one attack does not confer immunity. Instead it makes individuals more susceptible to repeat attacks, each of which increases the risk of heart damage.

A new booklet entitled "Rheumatic Fever and Rheumatic Heart Disease in Adults", points out that when rheumatic fever damages the heart, one or several of the heart valves may be left roughened or deformed. Deformed valves impede the normal flow of blood through the heart.

Because rheumatic fever has a tendency to recur, the booklet explains the importance of protection as well as preventive procedures. For a free copy, drop a post card with your

Potato growers sold 20 percent more potatoes to processing plants in 1960 than they did the year before. The volume sold for table use remained about the same.

Japan has replaced the United Kingdom as the number one foreign market for U.S. farm products. Exports to Japan increased to \$553 million in 1960-1961 from \$441 million the previous fiscal year. The United Kingdom took \$446 million.

A national program to eradicate hog cholera has been launched this fall. The disease has been under control for many years but the control is expensive. Because the disease is at a low point, officials believe this is the time to stamp it out entirely. There has been no case of hog cholera in Idaho for many months.

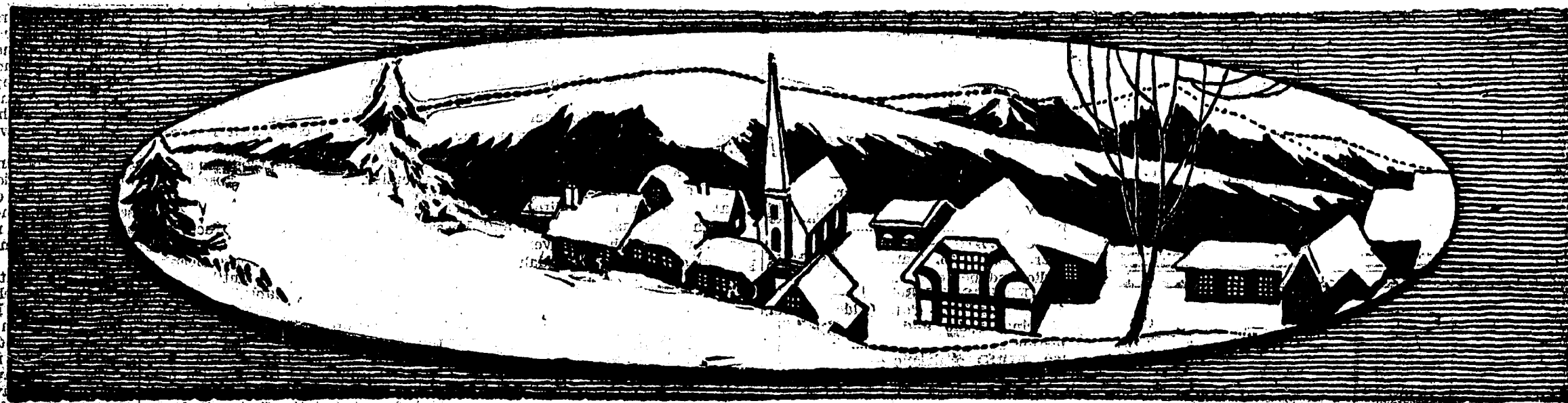

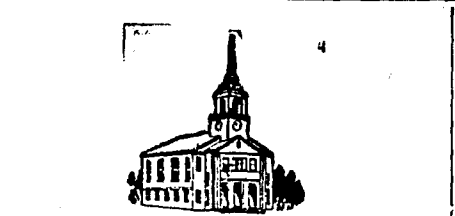
