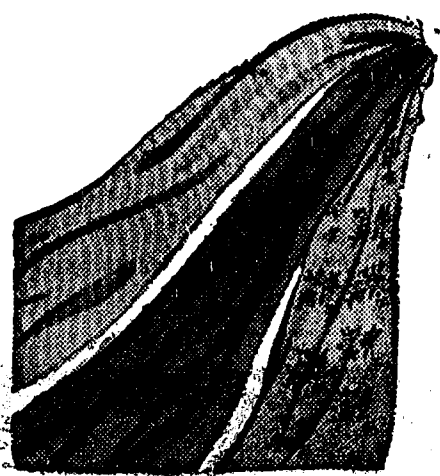

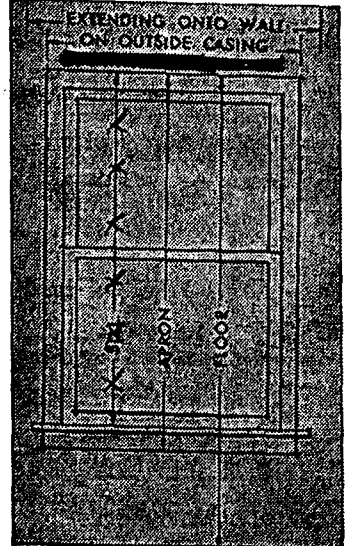

## BOOKMOBILE UNDER NEW SCHEDULE

The bookmobile which the Latah

County Free Library is now using  
will no longer be shared with Nez  
Perce County Free Library. They  
will be using a larger one and run-  
ning a bookmobile demonstration in

Lewis County next year. This means  
that we will no longer have a book-  
pool with Nez Perce. Nez Perce  
County Free Library will however,  
continue to serve Juliaetta and Ken-  
drick for Latah County and Latah  
County will serve the Nez Perce area  
around Genesee until further notice.  
The bookmobile has been sent to  
Rose for a new coat of paint inside  
and out and should be back in Latah  
County by November 20, in time for  
this months run. If it should be late  
in being delivered we will start our  
run on the day it arrives according  
to schedule and any day at the be-  
ginning that is missed will be added  
to the end of the run.

The schedule will continue as is  
for December, with the exception of  
the Adult Troy Run. On the appointed  
date we will be at the Big Meadow  
School in Troy from 1:00 to 2:00  
p. m. and downtown for adults from  
2:15 to 2:45 p. m. This will be for  
December only, as we do not expect  
the bookmobile until November 20.  
We will cancel the Troy run this  
month, so that we may have time  
to load the bookmobile for the Nov-  
ember run.

## WEATHER STAYS DRY AND CHILLY

Weather this past week has been  
almost a complete repetition of the  
week preceding - chilly and dry.  
The air, however, holds quite a per-  
centage of humidity, as clearly shown

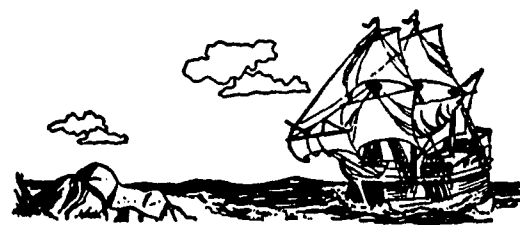

## Beer Came Over On The Mayflower. Too!

Although Columbus discovered the natives  
of Central America brewing a beverage  
"resembling English beer" in 1502, the Pil-  
grim fathers also brought it with them.

A diary of the Mayflower's voyage tells  
why the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock  
instead of proceeding farther south, as  
planned. An entry dated December 19, 1620,  
reads: "For we could not now take time for  
further search or consideration; our victuals  
being much spent, especially our beere..."  
A copy of the diary may be seen in the  
Library of Congress.

So had it not been for beer, some other  
rock on the Atlantic Coast might now be a  
tourist shrine. And, for that matter, some-  
one other than John Alden might have  
wooded Priscilla Mullins on behalf of Myles  
Standish. For John, a cooper by trade, was  
aboard the Mayflower in order to take care  
of the beer barrels.



### THE FIRST THANKSGIVING

When the fall of 1621 brought the Pil-  
grims a bountiful harvest, Governor Brad-  
ford proclaimed a day of Thanksgiving.  
The Pilgrims invited Massasoit, a friendly  
Indian, and his family. But Massasoit  
took a broad view of relationships and  
showed up with ninety Indians, so the first  
great Thanksgiving feast was attended by  
140 persons in all - and there were only  
five mature women to cook for this sizable  
group. They enjoyed turkey, as we do  
today, and it is almost certain that beer  
was on the table, too, for as one account of  
the time relates, "beer was all but the  
universal beverage."

The early Americans of New England  
and New Amsterdam brought with them a  
culture which regarded beer and ale as both  
beverage and food - a view shared by  
nutritionists today.

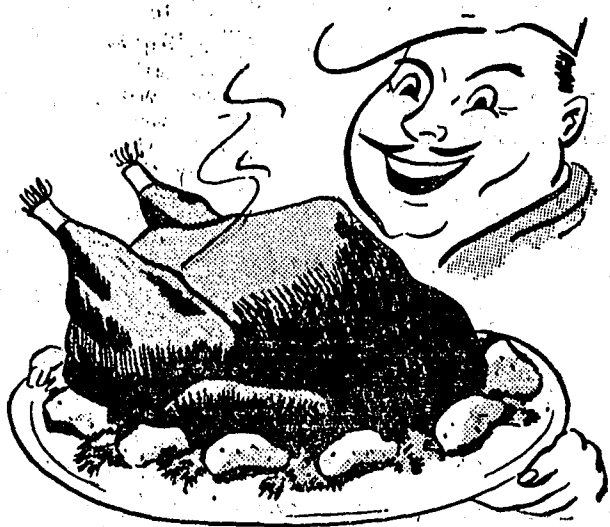



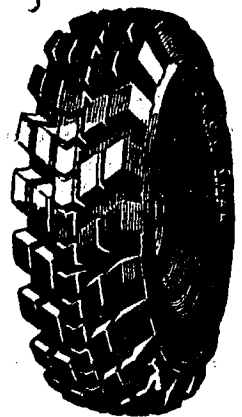
