## CIVIL DEFENSE ALERT SLATED FOR NOV. 28 IN ALL DIST. 283 SCHOOLS

On Wednesday, November 28, the schools within district 283 will participate in an actual Civil Defense Test, complete with evacuation of all schools.

James Muscat, Superintendent of District 283 Schools announced this week that all pupils within District 283 will be evacuated from the school buildings and sent to their homes, in an effort to test the effectiveness of an outlined route of evacuation for the schools, should an actual run become necessary.

Mr. Muscat has requested that all parents make arrangements on that day to be at home to receive their children when they are returned to their homes. The time for the alert has not been revealed, and will not be until the actual alert has begun. This means that the alert may take place any time during the day, either in the morning or afternoon of the day of November 28.

When the alert has been called, all students living in Juliaetta will return to their homes. The two busses presently in Juliaetta will bring the remainder of the students to Kendrick, to be unloaded at two points — one at the City Park and the other at the high school building.

Emergency drivers have been assigned to enable the runs to be made when the regular drivers are not available.

Ellis W. Magnuson, 74, father of Ralph and Robert Magnuson of Kendrick, died Thursday night at 11:40 at the St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston.

Mr. Magnuson, a retired farmer, who had been making his home at Opportunity, Wash., had moved to Kendrick with his wife, Ida C. Magnuson, two weeks ago, because of ill health and to be near the sons here.

Mr. Magnuson was born in Sweden, Aug. 10, 1887. He came to this country when a lad of 14. He had farmed most of his life at Worley, Idaho, selling the ranch in 1945, and moving to Opportunity. He was semi-retired there, but operated a service station at Spokane for a few years.

Surviving besides his wife and two sons here are three other sons, U. S. Congressman Don Magnuson of Seattle; Howard Magnuson of Olympia, Wash.; Roger Magnuson of Fuyallup, Wash.; and one daughter, Mrs. James Smith of Great Falls, Mont.; 19 grandchildren, a brother, Harold Magnuson, Boston, Mass., and a number of relatives in Sweden.

He was a member of the Spokane Valley Methodist Church and the Neighborhood Grange No. 891.

Funeral services were held Monday, Nov. 20, at 11:00 a. m., in the Colonial Chapel of the Hazen & Jaeger Spokane Valley Funeral Home, with Dr. David Alman officiating. Burial was in Pines Cemetery, Opportunity, Wash.

Latah county farmers are making plans to control the expected hordes of grasshoppers next summer.

Farmers will meet at the City Hall in Kendrick, Monday evening, November 27th at 7:30 with Keith Evans, Supervisor of the Federal Pest Control Division to make plans for the summer of 1962 if the grasshopper numbers increase.

Homer Futter, Latah county agent, reported that the control program instituted in 1958 met with success and farmers in the southern part of Latah county are anxious to get the same program set up in case the grasshopper numbers increase.

**INFORMATION ON IDAHO IN DEMAND**  
 BOISE — A Wisconsin schoolboy who sends out printed postcards to state officials was one of hundreds who got Idaho information last month from the Department of Commerce and Development.  
 Department Secretary Louise Shadduck says nine-year-old John Lindstadt of Milwaukee mailed a printed postcard to Gov. Robert E. Smylie. The youth asked for the Governor's signature, a copy of Idaho's Great Seal and "all other information available." Smylie routed the card to Miss Shadduck.  
 "Usually our requests for facts about Idaho don't arrive in such an unusual form," Miss Shadduck says. Holding up a stack of letters and postcards that came in during October Miss Shadduck says, "We received a total of 2,495 individual requests last month. Some of those were from colleges and libraries. Others were from television and radio stations. Many came from industries and chambers of commerce."  
 Magazine readers sent in 528 coupons which they had clipped off the bottom of Idaho advertisements. Since the Department first placed national ads in 1956, it has received 143,969 coupons from magazine readers, she says.  
 The Department took care of 1,346 requests for Idaho information received by other state governmental agencies and chambers of commerce

around the state. It also mailed out 16,281 pieces of miscellaneous literature during October, bringing to 782,070 the total pieces of miscellaneous literature mailed since 1955.  
 All in all during October the Department dispatched 27,412 pieces of Idaho literature. "That means," Miss Shadduck says, "that we have mailed out 2,418,198 pieces of literature since the Department was set up six years ago."

## MANY ACCIDENTS INVOLVE 'TEEN ERS

Children and Teen-agers made up more than one-fourth of the Idaho traffic fatalities the first 10 months of this year. This age group included those from infants through 20 years old — the latter being listed with teen-agers.

A breakdown of traffic dead revealed 26 percent listed as minors, 15 percent were tabulated as elderly, 66 years and older, and the remaining 59 percent were from 21 through 65 years of age.

In the group of children who have been killed, 26 were less than 13 years of age and another 21 were 13 to 18 years of age. Eight of this total of 47 were pedestrians. There were 11 victims in the 19 and 20 year old age group.

Eight of the 11 fatalities in the 19 and 20 year age group were drivers of the cars in which they were killed. Other teen-age driver deaths include one 14-year-old, two 15, one 16, one 17 and three 18 years of age.

The tentative tabulation was prepared during youth appreciation week. So much attention is constantly focused on teen-age drivers, it should be noted that more than half of all the 58 children and youth victims died in accidents in which adult drivers were involved. Most of the 26 children and several of the teen-agers who died, met death in crashes in which no driver under 21 years old were involved.

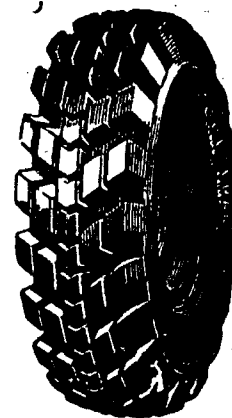

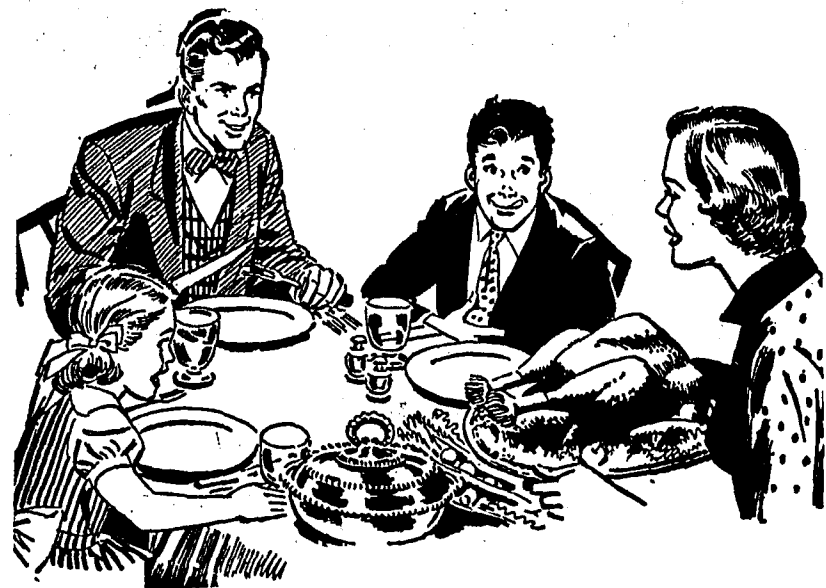
