STORM STRIKES TUESDAY NIGHT, DAMAGE TERRIFIC

Tuesday night of last week snow began falling in this area, and continued intermittently until Saturday evening, when the leaden skies began to clear a little.

The snow, with temperatures just about the freezing mark, was of the soggy, wet variety that stuck to everything on which it fell, including telephone and electric light lines, trees and shrubs.

Electric light and telephone lines became as big around as a man's arm, and the terrific weight broke many of them, tipped over poles and pulled lines to the ground or brought them into contact with trees, where they shorted out. It also broke the TV cable serving Kendrick.

Otto and Herman Schupfer, managers of the local telephone company, said that as many as 70 circuits were out at one time — and as of press day (Wednesday) all have not yet been restored. The two men worked long hours, but a shortage of help over the holiday season also delayed repairs.

There was a power outage on the W. W. P. electric system of about a half hour, and Dean Hollenbeck, local agent for the company, said they counted themselves very lucky that repairs could be made and service restored within that time.

Trees, particularly evergreen, and shrubs were literally bent to the ground with the weight of wet snow accumulated. On Main Street one large old locust tree had two big limbs severely twisted, but luckily they fell toward the sidewalk rather than toward parked cars.

On the schoolhouse hill the big oak tree in the Ben P. Cook front yard (which retains its leaves) had accumulated so much of the wet, soggy stuff, that the limb tips could easily be reached from the ground. Being oak, however, no limbs broke.

When the storm finally ceased the snow on the ground in Kendrick measured from eight to 11½ inches in depth, depending, apparently, on the ground condition. On top the ridges it measured from 12 to 18 inches — again apparently depending on ground conditions.

It is beyond a doubt, the worst storm to hit this area since the winter of 1948-1949.

Local snow plows were operating on a "round the clock basis" and kept all main highways open to travel. By Monday all side roads were also plowed out, and snow rapidly thinning on the ground.

A great deal of worry and excitement reached an end Monday shortly after noon with the arrival in Kendrick of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Brocke, who had been snowbound in the Mallory Creek area for several days, while on a hunting trip. They were safe, sound, and in good health when reached and brought out.

Mr. and Mrs. Brocke had gone to the area about a week ago on a big game hunt. They established a camp at what is known as the "Clear cabin" on Mallory creek, and no apprehension was felt for their safety until the big storm struck Tuesday night, and continued through much of Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

When no word was received from them a couple of search parties were sent into the area, but they failed to locate the Brockes.

The sheriff's office was notified of their absence Sunday, and Monday morning a plane took off from the Moscow-Pullman airport and flew over the area. The Brocke's station wagon was spotted parked at the cabin, and a ground party composed of Norman Lewis, Kendrick, deputy state forester, and Ed. Pearson, deputy sheriff, Moscow left for the area immediately. They were able to drive up the East Fork of the Potlatch and up Mallory Creek to within about a mile and a half of the cabin — completing the trip on snowshoes.

Mr. and Mrs. Brocke then donned snowshoes and accompanied them back to their vehicle, which returned them to Kendrick. A bulldozer was sent in on Tuesday to rescue the Brocke station wagon and their camp equipment.

Mr. Brocke said they had ample food for several days, having gone out to Bovill the preceding Tuesday and replenished their supplies — they had a chain saw and could obtain plenty of fuel, so they decided to "stay put" rather than attempt to come out — the snow being 22 inches in depth at the cabin.

BOISE — The Department of Commerce and Development will unveil in Arco Friday another of its new promotional motion pictures.

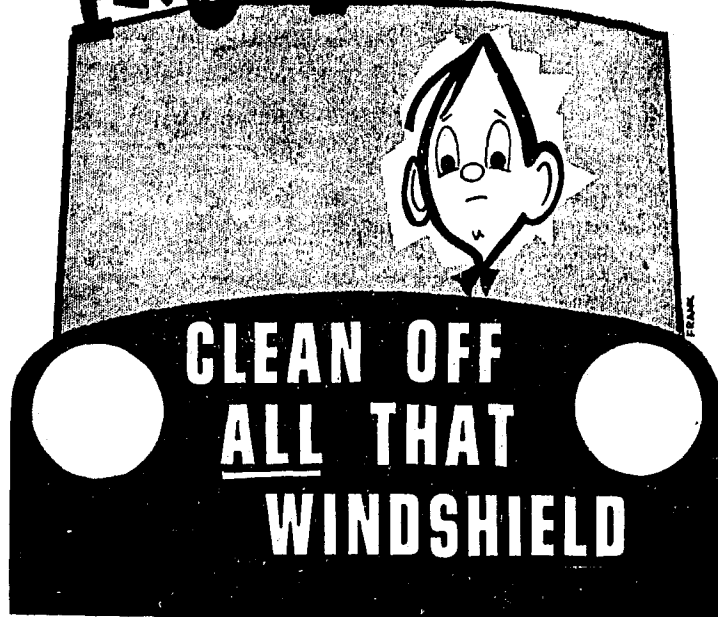

Idaho's films are mailed throughout the country to television stations, clubs, conventions, travel agencies, schools and other places, Miss Shaddock says. "We believe our film program is one of the most practical means Idaho has of advertising its scenic and recreational attractions," she says.

The aim of the department's film program, she says, is to eventually prepare enough films to publicize every area of the state on a nationwide basis.

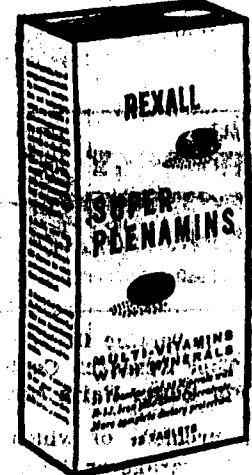

Teen-Agers Add Lively Lift To New March of Dimes Drive

Slave auctions in this Civil War Centennial Year? It can—and does—happen here, with the flower of American youth on the block.

But in this century, there's a difference. Now it's all in a good cause. Members of the New March of Dimes Teen Age Program (TAP) auction their services to the highest bidder among local merchants. The money goes to support the National Foundation - March of Dimes attack on birth defects, arthritis and polio.

It's all part of TAP members' lively approach to volunteer community service. They also sponsor walkathons (shades of the Thirties!) in which teams from rival schools move toward the finish line as dimes are counted. They dance for dimes at casual sock hops and formal balls, man concessions at school sports events, and hold community car washes.

Through such ingenious fun-for-funds projects, TAPs raised nearly three-quarters of a million dollars during the 1961 March of Dimes.

For the 1962 New March of Dimes in January, tens of thousands of the youthful volunteers are literally "on TAP." In more than 75 per cent of the National Foundation's 3,100 local county chapters, active TAP committees are determined to hit new highs in fun as well as funds.

Adult advisors who work with TAPs point out that underlying the outward frivolity of the "teenagers' projects is a deep awareness of the need for increased research and progress in the fight against crippling birth defects, arthritis and polio. During the year, many youngsters assist in local patient services by reading to disabled children, writing letters for severely crippled arthritics or working as hospital aides.

A prime year-round responsibility of TAP members is distribution of information about National Foundation Health Scholarships to students in high schools and colleges. Each year, more than 500 four-year scholarships with a full value of \$2,000 apiece are offered for study in medicine, nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy, and medical social work. TAP members know the desperate need to reduce the shortage of manpower in the health professions by encour-

aging students to undertake careers in these fields.

Leader of the Teen Age Program for the 1962 New March of Dimes is national chairman Katherine Anne Keith, 18, of Columbia, Mo. Blonde, brainy and born to be busy, Katie will handle her major responsibilities as top TAP while she pursues an ambitious freshman schedule at the University of Missouri.

On the basis of past performance, juggling scholarship and volunteer service won't intimidate Katie. She was 1961 Missouri state TAP chairman during her strenuous senior year in high school. Under her leadership, Missouri TAPs showed record gains in membership, services to chapters and funds raised for the March of Dimes.

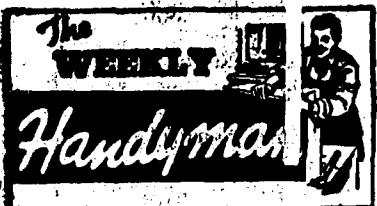
At the same time, Katie maintained grades that ranked her third in her graduating class of almost 300 students. She was a National Merit Scholarship finalist and received the Kiwanis Good Citizenship

award. She was business manager—and occasional sports-writer—for the school paper, treasurer of the National Honor Society, queen of the major social function of the school year, had a lead role in the school play, "Teahouse of the August Moon," and actively participated in math, history, English and French clubs.

She also teaches a Sunday School class at Missouri Methodist Church in Columbia.

After a summer in Europe, including study at the Sorbonne in Paris, the energetic Katie began to plan for a banner year of TAP activity for the March of Dimes.

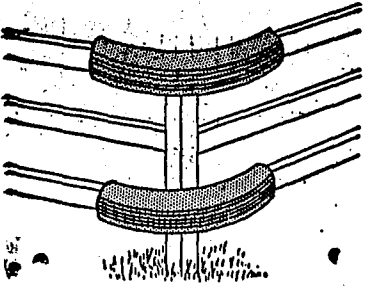
"Teenagers who are looking for a sense of satisfaction along with fun and friendship are missing a bet if they don't check TAP activities in their local March of Dimes chapters," she said. "A TAP committee isn't just another youth organization—it's not merely a club to serve youth. Instead, it gives us an opportunity to serve our communities."



A Service Of The Ther Research Center For Better Farm Living

The problem of which comes first, the garage or the driveway, perplexed one of our readers who planned to do this project himself. "It seemed to me the best thing to do would be to pour the drive and foundation together, then build the garage, but my neighbor says don't pour the driveway until the garage is built. Will it really make any difference?"

Usually the garage construction should be completed, and the concrete floor and apron laid, before starting the driveway. By doing these jobs first, equipment can be moved right up to the construction site without damaging the driveway, something a fully-loaded truck might do to a concrete driveway.

A few suggestions regarding the construction: If fill is needed under the garage floor slab, fill sand or gravel is the best material to use. Ordinary soil will settle away from the slab, causing cracking, because it compacts gradually. Elevate the garage enough to provide a gentle slope of the driveway, thus preventing water accumulation near or in the garage.

Another reader sends in a suggestion we think is good enough to pass along. It seems his cattle were occasionally suffering injuries from bumping against sharp fence corners until he hit upon the following solution:

Nail two or three short sections of old tire casings (about a quarter of an automobile tire, for instance) around the corners of the fence, and you'll have an excellent cattle protector. We might add that you'll find old tire sections good bumpers for the corners of carts and hayracks to prevent damage to them or farm buildings from possible bumps.

IDAHO TO BE ON CALIFORNIA TV

Boise — Two motion pictures showing portions of Idaho's rugged scenery will be shown to television viewers in the Los Angeles area very shortly, says Louise Shaddock, department of commerce and development secretary.

"We wrote back and told them about the films we had in our growing film library," Miss Shaddock said. "After pre-viewing them, they decided to use them on their program," she explains.

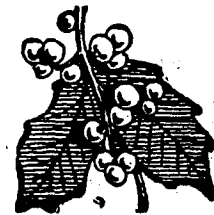
