GRASSHOPPER CONTROL SET UP

Area farmers set up a grasshopper control organization at Kendrick last week, after a meeting with Keith Evans, Idaho, administrator of the Federal Pest Control administration. Evans, at a meeting November 27, with farmers in the Kendrick City Hall, congratulated them on their cooperation in the 1958 grasshopper control program, which covered 10,000 acres.

A change in control chemicals is necessary and the new chemical called "Sevin" will be used because it is safe. Tests show that "Sevin" is safe to be sprayed on pastures and foliage consumed by milk cows.

"Sevin" has one bad feature, Evans pointed out, and that is its danger to bees. Bees will need to be moved out of the area sprayed.

The costs to the farmer for this federal-state control program is about 40c an acre for range land,

and \$1.20 per acre for crop lands. Federal and state help to this program come about because grasshoppers are more than an individual problem, because they migrate over large areas.

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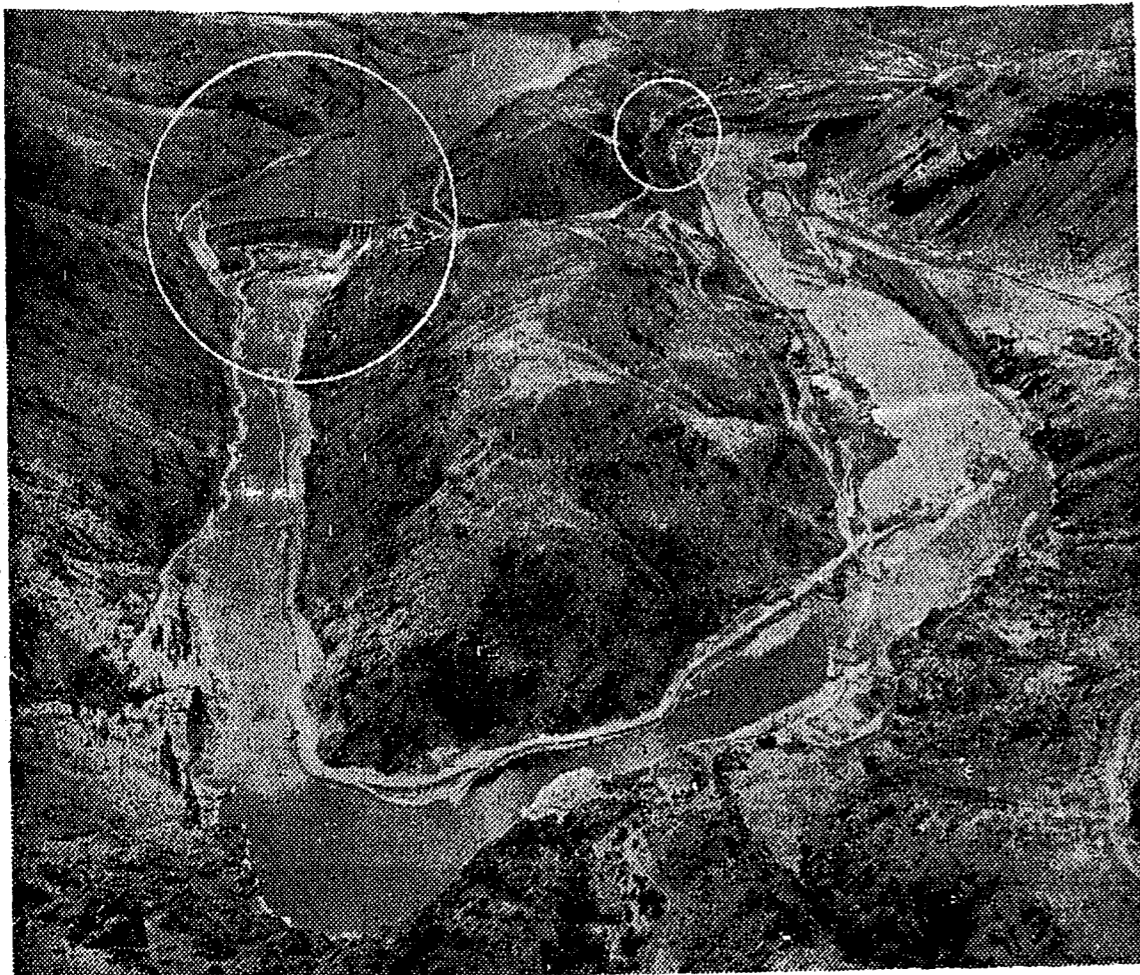
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DAM NOW COMPLETE

Unrivaled for uniqueness is this site in the famed Hells Canyon reach of the Snake river, where Idaho Power Company's big Oxbow hydroelectric project was completed on Tuesday, Nov. 28, to tame North America's deepest gorge a second time.

Here the Snake flows between towering mountains around the "ox-

bow" — named after the early-day yoke used to team oxen — before entering the mile-deep Hells Canyon.

Idaho Power harnessed the unique horseshoe bend with a rockfill dam (left circle) on one side of the bow. Water from the reservoir flows through twin tunnels in the mountain at center to spin four initial generators in the powerhouse (right

circle) on the opposite side. Oxbow's completion, which came with the start-up of the fourth generator, makes Idaho Power's new three-dam development of the Hells Canyon reach two-thirds complete, with only the already-started Hells Canyon Dam remaining.

Brownlee Dam was completed in January of 1959, as the development's first unit.

WATCH THOSE BEEF HEIFERS

Moscow — If a beef heifer fails to produce a calf as a three-year-old, the chances are one in three she will not calve the next year, either. The department of agriculture arrived at that conclusion after studying 30-year calving records at the livestock experiment station at Miles City, Montana. The records showed that of every 100 bred heifers that did not calve in their third year, 29 missed the next year, too.

A recommendation to be drawn from this, according to county agent Homer Futter, is to cull heifers as

soon as possible after their failure to calve is determined.

Cows having their first calves at four years, averaged 83 percent in lifetime crop, the study showed. Cows that had calves in their third year had a record slightly higher.

The effect that inbreeding has on sterility was also studied. Calving rates were 85 percent for cows with less than 10 percent inbreeding. In cases where inbreeding was greater, the crop was slightly less than 79 percent.

Cows having bull calves produced about five percent fewer offspring, another study revealed. Although the reasons are unknown, the theory is advanced by researchers that bull calves are usually larger and put

greater nutritional demands on the cows.

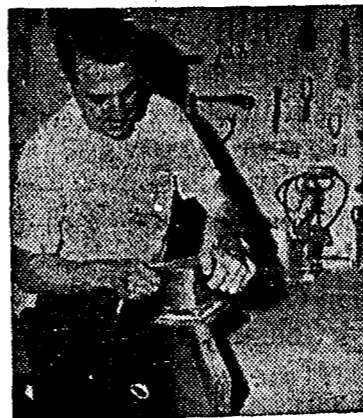

Sand storm windows before applying new coat of paint.

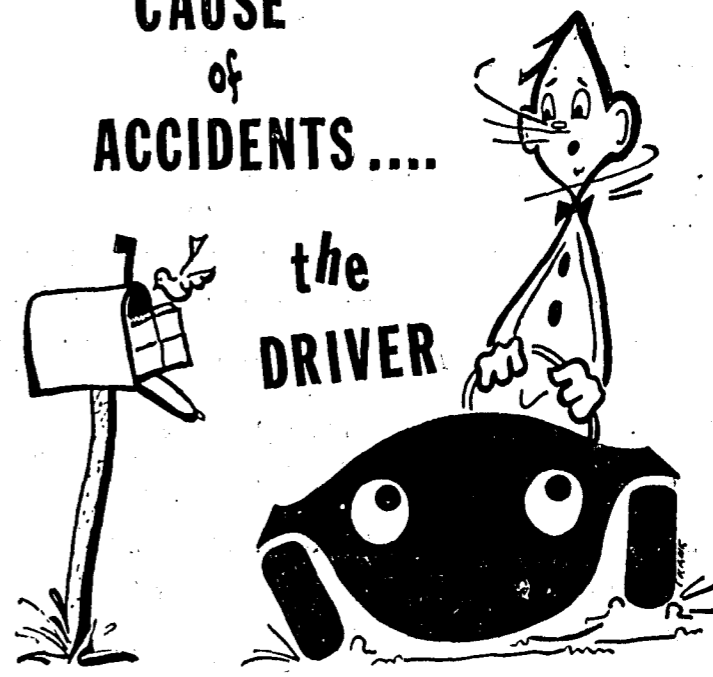

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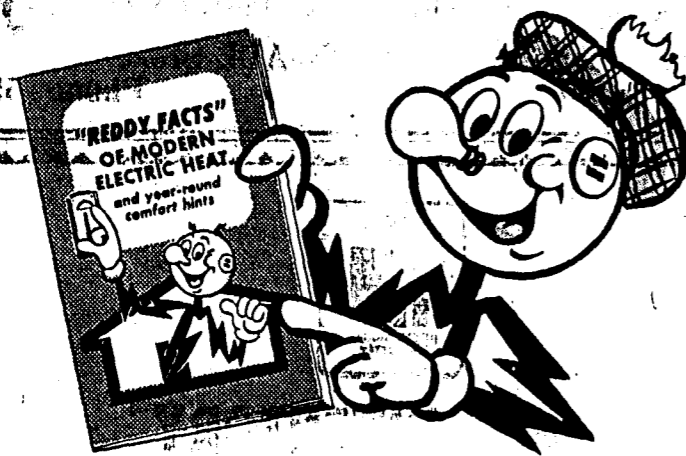

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**TRAVEL LITERATURE
GOING OUT**

Boise — The Department of Commerce and Development this week started mailing out bulk quantities of Idaho promotional material to 1,800 travel agencies, automobile clubs, chambers of commerce and motels and hotels throughout the United States and Canada.

Louise Shaddock, secretary, says 14 tons of literature will be mailed by the time the project is completed next March. She says the mailing is spread over the winter months because some recipients want the material in November and December — others want it several weeks later.

Most of the individual packages weigh between 10 and 20 pounds, she says. Each one contains several Idaho maps, the Department's four-color vacation brochure, a guide to Idaho motels, a leaflet on the state's campgrounds, an Idaho water fun leaflet, a hunting and fishing leaflet and a calendar of events.

"Before we mail anything we drop each agency or club a letter. We ask them how many of each publication they can really use. Then we mail them the quantity they ask for," she says. Miss Shaddock says a lot of waste is avoided by finding out in advance how much Idaho material each one can use.

The list of bulk mail recipients grows every year, Miss Shaddock notes. "We had about 150 letters this year asking to be put on our bulk mailing list," she says.

How is the Idaho material used? Travel agencies, of course, display the material in their show rooms and hand it out to clients. Automobile clubs use it to suggest routes and places for members' planning trips in the Northwest. Idaho chambers of commerce use it to publicize their own areas and boost the rest of the state. Motels and hotels in other parts of the country display it, too.

Many tourists say they rely very heavily on a state's promotional material in planning vacations, Miss Shaddock points out.

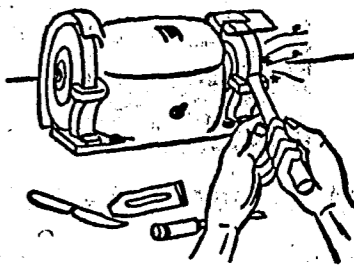

Ask a handyman what's the most useful power tool in his workshop. If he's standing next to a drill, he'll probably nominate that tool. If he happens to be working with a power saw, that might get the nod. So it goes with the man who chooses his tools carefully and uses them correctly. They all become "indispensable."

One tool definitely in this category is the bench grinder. While most tools, in general, perform actual work on projects, the grinder is used mainly to keep other tools in shape.

Chisels, knives, drill and plane bits, screwdrivers—these are just a few of the tools normally sharpened and shaped on a bench grinder.



Bench grinder a definite must for any shop.

Two questions bring up important things about bench grinder use:

Q—"What causes work to jam between the grinding wheel and the tool rest? This has happened several times lately, but never occurred when the grinder was new."

A.—Using the grinder causes the wheel to wear down gradually. This is normal. But as the wheel wears, the gap grows between wheel and tool rest. This makes it easier for the rotary motion to jam work into the enlarged gap if you momentarily relax a firm grip on the work. To correct this situation, adjust the tool rest forward so that it just clears the wheel.

Q—"I'm planning to replace well-worn grinding wheels. I've heard that some new wheels disintegrate when first used. Is that true?"

A.—It can happen if you don't observe a basic rule. Always select grinding wheels with an r.p.m. rating (marked on its label) that is higher than the speed marked on your

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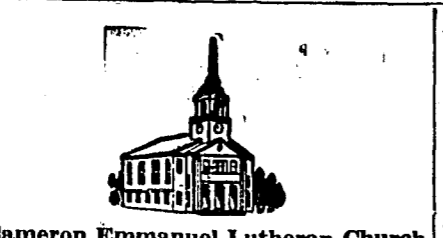

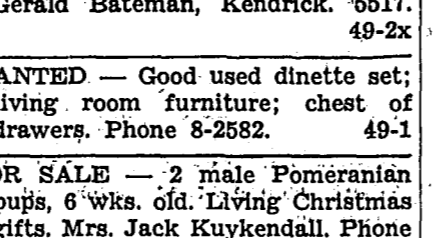

 Decorating your property for Christmas will contribute to the atmosphere of this happy season — and for the home handyman, it is a chance to show some imagination.
 If he has a portable electric jig saw, he's especially "in business," because this tool can be used to shape intricate designs and cut shapes of Santa Claus, his reindeer, the traditional candle, an elf and other symbolic things, right in the home workshop.



Templates for the above figures can be used right on the spot to trace patterns on duolux panels.
 He need not be an artist, either. You can actually transfer the design you wish to enlarge from a sketch or newspaper photograph by using what is called the grid system. This is a series of squares locating the position of each part of the subject in proper proportion.
 By projecting the grid squares to a scale the size he wishes to make a Santa Claus, for instance, the home handyman simply draws the same number of squares on the plywood or hardboard to be used in the project. He then draws the character on the board one square at a time, in exactly the same boxes this symbol occupied on the paper gridwork.
 Once the lines have been transferred to the wood, it will be easy work to follow it with a jig saw — and later a paint brush — once this preliminary job is finished.
 These handyman products can be made large, to display outdoors, or petite, to adorn a table or mantelpiece. If the subject will reside outdoors, be sure it is made of exterior-grade material. It also is wise to prime paint each object before giving it a final coat.

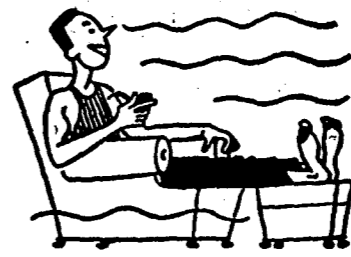

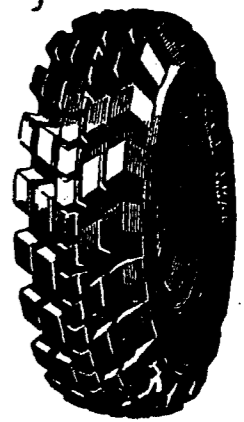
