AT LONG-LAST, A JULIAETTA TO **KENDRICK HIGHWAY**

Yes — although fit for Ripley's "Believe It or Not", official word on a highway link between Juliaetta and Kendrick has been received, following some 32 years of waiting - a phone call having been received from Philip Marsh, district director of Highways at Lewiston last Thursday, following publication of the paper telling of the call for bids. This was followed Saturday by the official notification, which reads as follows:

Lewiston --- "Bids to be opened on January 9, 1962.

"Project: Work consists of constructing the roadway, drainage structures and a bituminous surface treatment on 2.082 miles of State Highway 42, Juliaetta-Kendrick, to be known as Idaho Federal Aid Project No. S-4769(7) in Latah county. "Completion of the work will be

required as follows: "The entire projet, with the exception of seeding an incidental items,

shall be required within one hundred and sixty (160) days. Seeding and incidental items between the months of September and November, 1962."

most useful power tool in his workshop. If he's standing next to a drill, he'll probably nomi-nate that tool. If he happens to be working with a power saw, that might get the nod, So it goes with the man who chooses his tools carefully and uses them correctly. They all become "indispensable.

A.—Using the grinder causes, the wheel to wear down gradually. This is 'normal. But as the wheel wears, the gap grows between wheel and tool rest. This makes it easier for the rotary motion to jam work into the enlarged gap if you momentarily relax a firm grip on the work. To correct this situation, adjust the tool rest forward so that it just clears the


