BRAIN HEMORRHAGE CAUSES DEATH OF GARY GERTJE, 22

Kendrick and the surrounding area found it difficult to believe news received in Kendrick Wednesday afternoon — news of the death of Gary Gertje, 22, a member of a State Highway Department surveying crew. Mr. Gertje met death at about 1:00 p. m. while the crew was making a preliminary survey on the Whitebird Hill, for the proposed re-routing of U. S. 95 in that area. No other member of the four-man survey team witnessed the fall, which was at first believed to be the cause of death.

Members of the crew told highway officials at Lewiston that they were climbing the north side of the hill overlooking the Camas Prairie when they looked back and saw Gertje lying on the ground. They carried him up the hill and took him to the Grangeville General Hospital, but he was reported dead on arrival.

Other members of the crew were Wayne Wilson of Lewiston, crew chief; Richard Seay, Jr., of Grangeville, and Jack C. Brown of Clarkston. Wilson said they thought Gertje may have struck his head on a rock when he fell.

Brown was ahead of Gertje climbing the hill, and looked over his shoulder to find the man on the ground.

Gertje had been employed by the Lewiston District of the highway staff for about four years, and was carrying a distance measuring device at the time he fell. E. E. Montgomery of Lewiston, location engineer on the project, said Mr. Gertje had recently been appointed transit or instrument man for the crew.

The group had been working on the Whitebird project for some weeks, surveying the entire area for the proposed re-location of the road.

Dr. William H. Cone, Idaho County coroner said Friday that the death of Mr. Gertje was due to a defect in a brain artery which he had had since birth, and to a spontaneous rupture of that artery.

Dr. Cone said the artery undoubtedly ruptured before Gertje fell, and that "the fall, from a medical standpoint, would have nothing to do with his death." He added that no sign of a skull fracture was found.

Mr. Gertje was born Sept. 4, 1939, at Orofino, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Gertje of Southwick.

Mr. Gertje, a graduate of Kendrick High School was united in marriage to Shirley Kaye Weyen at Leland, Sept. 7, 1957. They made their home at Lewiston until 1960, when they returned to the Kendrick area, and at the present time were making their home with her grandfather, W. H. Weyen, at Kendrick.

Survivors include his wife, two sons, Ricki, three years old, and Brett, six months old. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Gertje and one brother, David, all of Southwick, and his grandmothers, Mrs. Ed. Gertje and Mrs. Stella McIver, both also of Southwick.

Funeral services were held Saturday morning at 11:00 in the Brower-Wann Chapel at Lewiston, with the Rev. Fred C. Schmidt of Kendrick officiating. Mrs. Jack Lohman and Mrs. Burton Souders, Jr., sang, accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Robert Puckett.

Pallbearers were Charles Cuddy, William Wood, Clifford Ragsdale, Wayne Harris, Ronald Craig and Ray Lockett. Interment was at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens, Lewiston.

Mr. Gertje was held in high esteem by all who knew him. This was evidenced by the filled auditorium, and the profusion of floral offerings. Out-of-town relatives here to attend the services were Mr. and Mrs. Harry Flaig and Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Parks, all of The Dalles, Oregon; Miss Carol Weyen and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Davis, all of Spokane, and Mrs. Lawrence Rosenfeld of Walla Walla, Wash.

WEATHER? COLD! TEMP. HITS ZERO

The weather the past few days has been anything but tropical — in fact, we have had our coldest weather for some years — weather that has made fuel dealers and loggers smile with delight!

Last Wednesday and Thursday were typical winter "gray" days, with temperatures hovering around the freezing mark. However, on Friday the temperature began to drop as skies cleared, and Friday night a low of 7 above was recorded on the "official" thermometer.

Saturday was a day of bright sunshine, but the air had the sharp bite of winter, and Saturday night the mercury column plunged to a neat zero on the "official" thermometer. Other instruments about town recorded as low as 4 below, some a degree or so warmer.

Sunday the temperature began a slow upward climb, it reading 10 above Monday morning, and 15 above on Tuesday morning.

Tuesday night a light "skiff" of powdery dry snow fell, just enough to coat bare places with white.

Farmers, despite extremely slick roads, welcomed the cold, dry weather as it will help to get rid of pests — and fields are generally snow covered.

Loggers, too, welcomed the cold — it firmed up logging roads and permitted the resumption of work in the woods.

Some residents reported frozen water pipes — but most were prepared for winter's coming.

TIGERS DROP 3RD TO KAMIAH 57-46

A fourth quarter surge enabled the Kamiah Kubs to defeat the Kendrick Tigers 57 to 46 in a high school basketball game last Friday night at Kendrick.

A nine-point scoring spurge by Bill LaMunyan during the fourth quarter broke a 36-36 deadlock at the end of the third quarter. Half-time score was 23-19 for Kamiah.

Bob Whitefield was high for Kamiah with 18, LaMunyan had 13. Ross Magnuson was high for the Tigers with 13 counters. Kamiah also won the "B" squad preliminary by a score of 36 to 23. POSTMASTER TEST DATE IS SET

An examination for the position of postmaster at Kendrick will be given, and applications will be accepted until January 2, the U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced from Washington, D. C.

Robert E. Magnuson, who has been acting postmaster since April 14th, when Fred Stedman, postmaster, transferred to a rural mail carrier route, said he expects to take the examination.

The commission said application forms must be filed with it at Washington, D. C., and must be received or postmarked not later than Jan. 2. The commission said the written examination will be given at Moscow, but did not list the date.

The salary for postmaster at the third class post office is \$5,370 per year.

The commission said information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the Kendrick post office.

"Know Your Faculty"

MEET THE TEACHERS OF JOINT DISTRICT 283

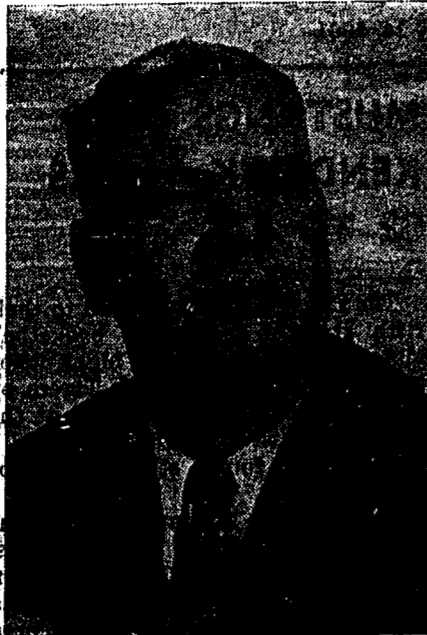

Ask a handyman what's the most useful power tool in his workshop. If he's standing next to a drill, he'll probably nominate that tool. If he happens to be working with a power saw, that might get the nod. So it goes with the man who chooses his tools carefully and uses them correctly. They all become "indispensable."

One tool definitely in this category is the bench grinder. While most tools, in general, perform actual work on projects, the grinder is used mainly to keep other tools in shape.

Chisels, knives, drill and plane bits, screwdrivers—these are just a few of the tools normally sharpened and shaped on a bench grinder.



Two questions bring up important things about bench grinder use:

Q.—"What causes work to jam between the grinding wheel and the tool rest? This has happened several times lately, but never occurred when the grinder was new."

A.—Using the grinder causes the wheel to wear down gradually. This is normal. But as the wheel wears, the gap grows between wheel and tool rest. This makes it easier for the rotary motion to jam work into the enlarged gap if you momentarily relax a firm grip on the work. To correct this situation, adjust the tool rest forward so that it just clears the wheel.

Q.—"I'm planning to replace well-worn grinding wheels. I've heard that some new wheels disintegrate when first used. Is that true?"

A.—It can happen if you don't observe a basic rule. Always select grinding wheels with an r.p.m. rating (marked on the label) that is higher than the rating marked on your grinder.

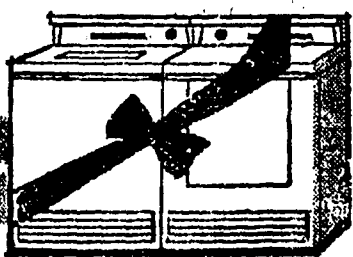

The National Lumber Manufacturers Association estimates that shipments of lumber should equal or exceed the 1960 level of 33.6 billion board feet, which would mean an increase of about 5 percent over the anticipated volume for this year.

This estimate is predicted on a moderate increase in new home starts next year, which is generally considered likely. Lumber consumption is tied closely to home building activity, since this market takes more than one in every three board feet of lumber produced.

There has been a gradual increase in the vacancy rate of rental housing units. Accordingly, it is expected that single-family home starts will increase more, percentage-wise, than home building volume as a whole. Single-family residences use considerably more wood per unit than do apartment buildings.

The lumber industry has been engaged in an extensive sales promotion program during the past two years, an effort that is now beginning to bear fruit, and which should help to push the sales curve upward.

Thanks partly to the promotion campaign, known as the "National Wood Promotion Program," more and more home builders are buying pre-fabricated components made of wood or pre-fabricating their own.

In Indianapolis, for example, builder Robert V. Welch has been able to cut his unit costs 30 to 40 percent by having a local lumber yard assemble floor framing in sections and then ship it to the site. This floor system utilizes a conventional design and meets all FHA requirements.
