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D. F. SENTER DIES AT AGE 64

Yakima — Stricken with a sudden illness at his home, Day F. Senter, 64, Yakima refrigeration and electrical contractor, was rushed to Yakima Valley Memorial Hospital at 1:00 a. m., Friday, Dec. 1, and died there at 2:55.

Mr. Senter, whose home was 315 N. 27th Ave., was born at Athena, Oregon. As a young man he lived at Kendrick, Idaho. He moved to the state of Washington in 1915, and was electrical inspector for the city of Bremerton for several years. He moved to Yakima in 1947 and established his own business.

An ardent sportsman, Mr. Senter was especially interested in hunting and fishing. He participated in the work of the Yakima County Humane Society.

He was a 32nd Degree Mason, a member of the Bremerton Masonic Lodge; a member of Bremerton Odd Fellows Lodge No. 145, being a member of that organization for 45 years. He was also a member of the Colonial Groves, the Affie Shrine and the Rose Croix in Yakima; a member of the Mother Church of Christian Science in Boston, Mass., and the Washington State Heart Association.

Survivors include his wife, Rebecca Fowler Senter (she being a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Fowler, pioneer Kendrick residents); two sons, Eugene, Bremerton, and Howard L. of San Diego, Calif.; a daughter, Mrs. Helen Nickell, Mission, Kan.; three grandchildren and five sisters.

COOK BOOKS FOR CHRISTMAS

Last Friday evening, just in time for Christmas giving — the Gazette completed and delivered to the Peck P-T. O. 1,000 cookbooks — containing 329 tried and proven recipes.

The books are somewhat novel in that they are of the "loose-leaf" type. Recipes may be removed from the book by the simple process of un-spanning the rings, and the particular recipe desired then put in a table holder or perhaps on the range ledge, for quick, easy reference. The book contains 84 pages and is completely indexed.

Some figures on the project might prove interesting: It required 640 pounds of paper, 3 1/2 pounds of ink and 2,000 bindery rings to complete the books.

Late Monday night about a half inch of wet snow fell here, followed by a pouring rain, and by daylight the snow was all but gone, and a sea of slush and soup remained.

Santa Claus, Indiana, Got Famous Name Christmas Eve, 1882

Although many towns have names directly or indirectly associated with Christmas, there is but one town named Santa Claus — in Indiana. Except for a lucky break, the town would have had another name and hence would not have enjoyed the annual fame that it gathers around the Yuletide season. The original intention to name the town Santa Fe, fell through when the officials at Washington suggested that the town be named something else, since there was already a Santa Fe in New Mexico. On Christmas Eve, in 1882, the citizens held a mass meeting to select another name, but every one proposed was discarded for one reason or another. The meeting was

about to break up when Santa Claus, making his yearly visit to children in the neighborhood, strode in to get warm. He was in costume, and his arrival put one name in every mind. And so the town was named Santa Claus!

CHRISTMAS CAROLS HERALD SEASON

For centuries Christmas carols have heralded the Yuletide season around the Christian world. Many of them, slightly altered by changing times and customs, or perhaps in translations from a foreign language, have been handed down from one generation to the other. A great number probably have been lost because they were popular in generations not adequately covered by a written history. Christmas Carols are of two main types — religious and convivial. The

religious offer praise to the newborn and celebrate the birth of the Christ. The convivial exalts mirth and the traditional feasting. The latter is almost certainly an invention of our modern civilization, and few "popular" Yuletide songs manage to return year after year. "Jingle Bells" and "White Christmas" seem to be the notable exceptions. "Silent Night," "It Came Upon the Midnight Clear" and "O, Come All Ye Faithful" seem destined to last forever.

CHRISTMAS CARDS

The sending of Christmas cards seems to have originated in England about the middle of the last century. Queen Anne commissioned famous artists to decorate their missives of holiday greetings. One of the first Christmas greetings, as we now know them, was prepared for Queen Victoria by Dobson, one of the queen's favorite painters.

HOLLY WREATHS

Most popular of decorations is the Holly or evergreen wreath — symbolic of the thorns which were placed on the brow of Christ at the Crucifixion.

"SILENT NIGHT" IS BEST LOVED CAROL

Of all the songs that return to bring warmth to the Yuletide season, no carol is so universally known as "Silent Night." Certainly no other is as loved and sung as this single German song.

For years its origin was not known except that it supposedly dated back for many centuries. Recent investigations, however, disclosed that it was produced in 1818. The poem was originally written by Joseph Mohr, an assistant priest in Obendorf in south Germany. The melody was composed by a schoolmaster, Franz Gruber.

Both the poet and the composer were part of the choir that sang

the now famous carol that Christmas Eve in the Obendorf church. The beloved song was first sung to the accompaniment of a guitar, for the church organ was out of order that Eve in 1818.

It has since been sung to the tune of almost every musical instrument in the world — and in the language of many races

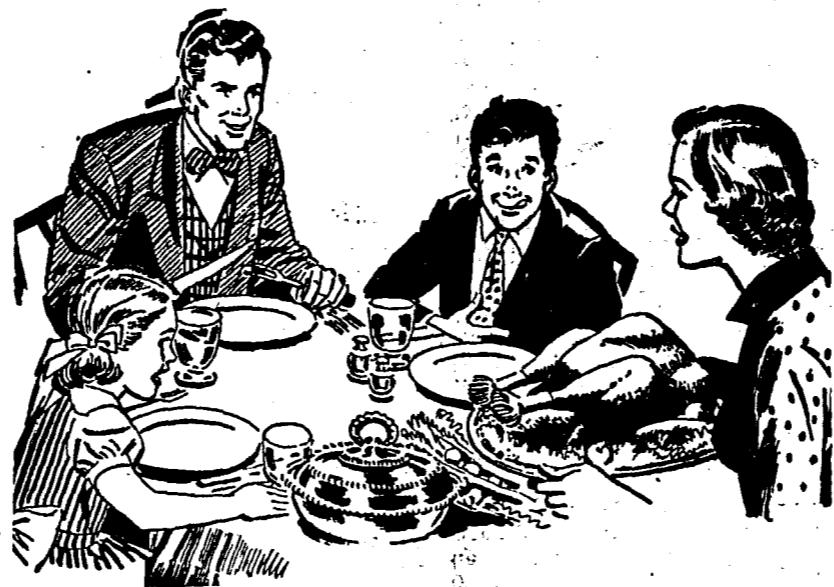
