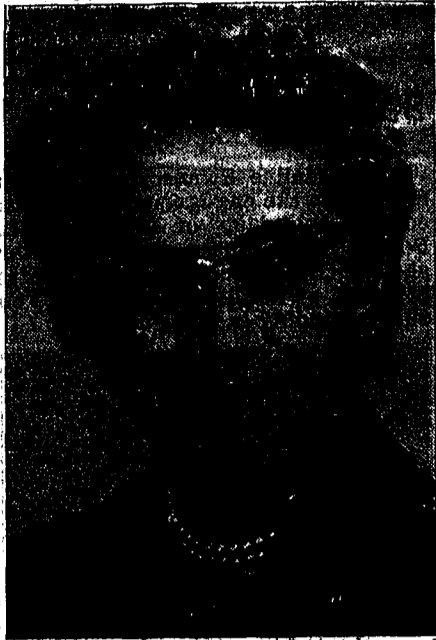


"Know Your Faculty"

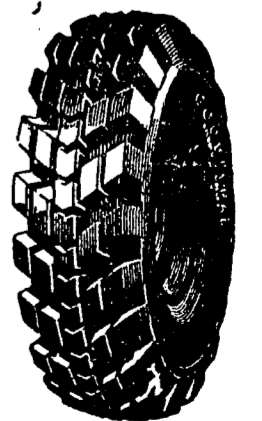
