## REEVE FAMILY IN AUTO CRASH SAT., SERIOUSLY INJURED

The Rev. and Mrs. William Reeve of Kendrick and their 15-year-old son, Kenneth, were all seriously injured Saturday when the car in which they were riding skidded off Highway 42, near the Raleigh Albright farm, between Juliaetta and Arrow Junction, and struck a large pine tree, about 11:00 o'clock that morning.

All three were taken by ambulance to the St. Joseph's Hospital at Lewiston, where their conditions were reported as "satisfactory" Sunday afternoon.

Their son, Kenneth, was in surgery almost four hours, while a long, jagged wound on his left cheek and temple was being closed. All were in shock when they arrived at the hospital, but responded satisfactorily to treatment.

Rev. Reeve, 52, pastor of the Assembly of God Church here, suffered a broken right thigh and severe cuts on his right wrist and right temple. Mrs. Reeve, 51, suffered a fractured vertebra, several broken ribs, lacerations, and an ankle injury.

The son suffered a broken right thigh and a broken right arm, as well as other injuries, including the loss of front teeth.

The accident was investigated by State Patrolmen W. Gordon Jones and A. R. Humphreys, Lewiston. They said the Reeve family was proceeding in the direction of Lewiston, with Kenneth driving, and his parents in the front seat beside him. The car had just passed two trucks loaded with cattle, also bound for Lewiston, when he lost control of the 1961 Comet sedan.

The car swerved when two wheels went off onto the soft shoulder on the left side of the road, then skidded back across the pavement in front of the lead truck and off the right side, where it struck a large pine tree. The car spun around again as it hit the tree, and came to rest on its wheels, facing back toward Juliaetta.

An unidentified motorist gave first aid, using a kit from the Reeve car. The state patrolmen said the car was damaged beyond all practical repair.

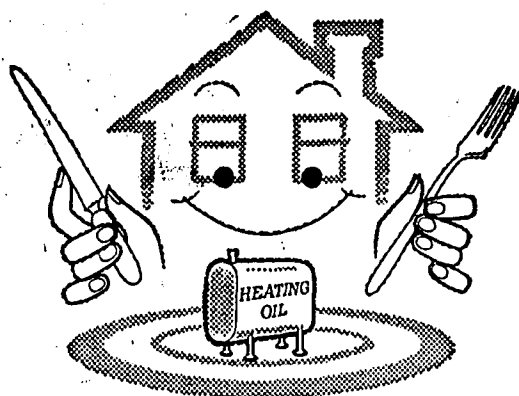

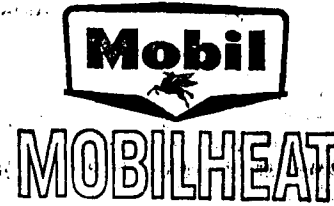

- If table lamp is used bottom rim of shade should be at least 15" from reading surface. Top of shade should be open to allow flare out of light, adding to the total room lighting. Two pin-up lamps spaced 30" to centers, using 100 watt bulbs make excellent even lighting for the study desk.
- If ceiling fixtures are used all lights must be shaded or diffused to prevent any direct glare in the eyes.
- If room has any reflective surfaces be sure fixtures are properly placed to prevent any bounce-off of light or distracting "hot spots."
- If the light in the room seems dim check the bulb sizes. Make sure the bulbs or fluorescent tubes are of adequate size. All fixtures should be properly spaced to give adequate all-over lighting.

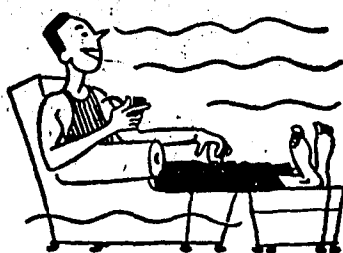

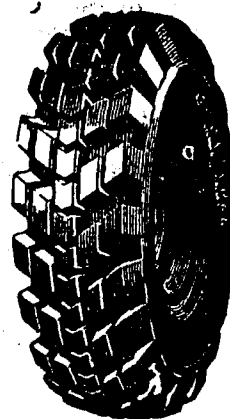

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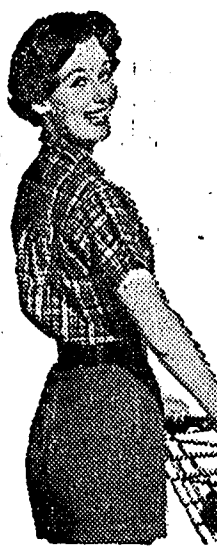
