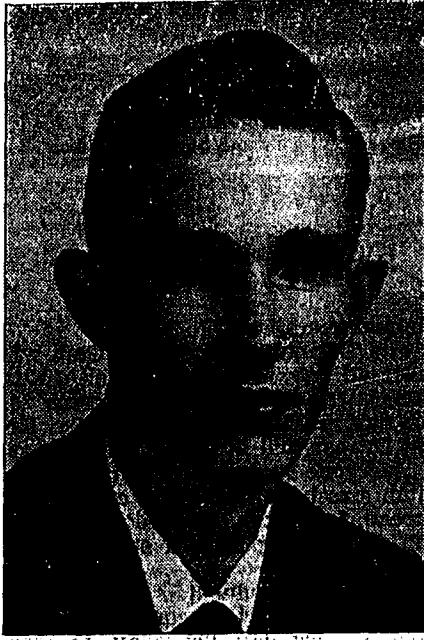


"Know Your Faculty"

MEET THE TEACHERS OF JOINT DISTRICT 283

EDITORS NOTE: The following article is the eighth in a series which is designed to acquaint the people of Joint School District No. 283 with the teachers of the district, in a brief resume of their work and their educational qualifications. Mr. Manfull is truly a dedicated school teacher and is doing a remarkable job as a teacher and an administrator. He is a credit to the teaching profession.

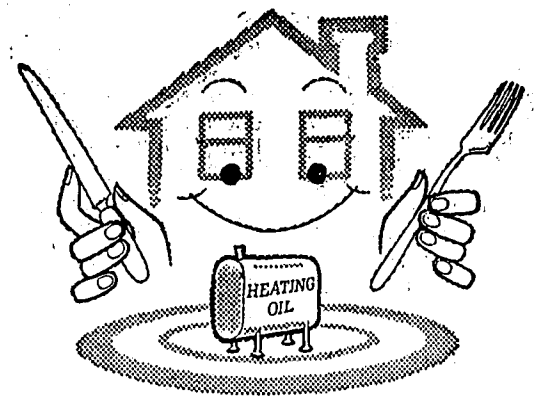

WONDERFUL WINTER WEATHER

The past couple of weeks there certainly has been no reason for anyone to "go south" for a better winter climate — for, according to the Government Weather Bureau at Lewiston, three new "heat records" have been set in the area during that time.

Days have been mostly sunshiny and balmy, with daytime temperatures hitting into the high 40's and low 50's. Just as a sample, Sunday the high reading was 54 degrees!

Daffodils and tulips are poking through the ground, some being as much as an inch and a half! Lilacs have huge buds, and in a few cases green leaves are beginning to show their edges.

Sunday morning a brief rain storm hit, stopping yard work — of which there was considerable underway. It was the first rain for quite a number of days.

71 YEARS AGO It was 71 years ago Sunday that the first train arrived in Kendrick. The Northern Pacific built the Spokane and Palouse branch in 1887 and 1888 from Spokane to Rosalia, Oakesdale, Garfield, Palouse, Pullman, Uniontown and Genesee.

In 1890-91 a rail line was pushed from Pullman to Moscow, down the Potlatch Creek to Kendrick and Juliaetta. The latter town remained the end of the line for almost two years before being pushed on to Lewiston.

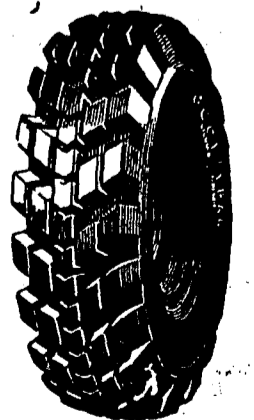
