Worst Blaze In More Than 30 Years Strikes Central Business Block In Kendrick

Wednesday morning at 2:30 o'clock panked a large shipment of spring Kendrick's fire siren sounded, and dragges and other merchandise the Volunteer Fire Department found dresses and other merchandise. the Western Auto Supply Store, owned and operated by Oscar Medalen, a sheet of flame — and the fight to put down the blaze and save adjoin-

The building, located between the Kendrick Table Supply, in the Fraternal Temple building, and Maios' Department Store will be known to many as the Thomas Hardware Co. building and the Kendrick Co-operative Creamery building. As a result of this latter category it contained a large locker-box section, the walls of which were ten inches thick and filled with sawdust for insula- COURSE PLANNED tion. The locker boxes and adjoining freezing room had not been in use for about three years — and as a result they were tinder dry.

The fire apparently began in the tire room at the rear of the Western Auto Supply Store, and why, the Art. 


