In the fall of 1937 Mrs. Deobald returned to teaching. Ms. Deobald has done all of her teaching in either Nez Perce or Latah County or which we now call Joint District No. 283. She is now teaching in the Kendrick High School, the subjects of English, Typing and Bookkeeping. She is also one of the Junior Class advisors. At the present she is the Secretary Treasurer of the local I.E.A. and is also advisor to the school annual staff.

Since Mrs. Deobald's first college, she has returned to the college doors and has attended Northern Idaho College of Education, University of Idaho, Northwestern Business College of Spokane, Washington and Washington State University. Mrs. Deobald received her Bachelors of Arts Degree from Northern Idaho College of Education, plus two teaching certificates, The Standard High School Certificate and the standard Elementary Certificate. Her major in college was in Business Education and her minors were in Home Economics and English.

Mrs. Deobald belongs to a number of Civic organizations; Parent-Teacher Association, National Education Association, Idaho Education Association, Delta Kappa Gamma, Idaho Business Teachers Association, Classroom teachers, Women's International Bowling Congress and the City and State Association.

One of Mrs. Deobald's main and interesting hobbies in bowling. Besides bowling she takes pride in gardening, especially the growing of roses.

Mrs. Deobald is an excellent teacher and a credit to the profession. In the winter of 1961 the Mason Lodge awarded Mrs. Deobald their Certificate of appreciation to her 26 years of teaching.


Due to increases in nursery operation costs the price on all seedlings has been advanced to \$21 per thousand, at Moscow.

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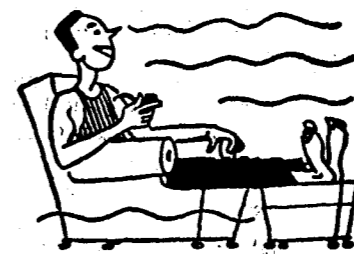
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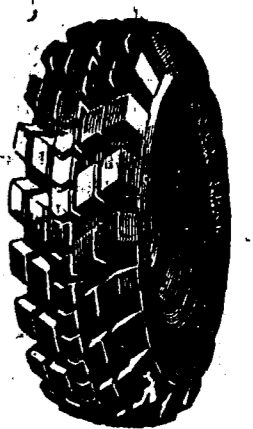


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
