## TOM LONG, AREA PIONEER, DIES AT HOME HERE FRIDAY

E. T. (Tom) Long, 73, retired farmer, businessman and civic worker, died at his home here Friday afternoon at 1:15 o'clock. He had been in ill health the last five years, suffering from a heart ailment.

Mr. Long had lived in this area, Leland and Kendrick, since 1889, when he moved as a tot with his family, the late Mr. and Mrs. N. B. Long, from North Carolina. He was born in Macon county in that state, October 17, 1888.

As a young man he moved to Kendrick in 1908, being associated with his father in the N. B. Long & Sons store. Just prior to World War I, in which he served, he took up a homestead in Montana, selling it when called into the service. He saw action in France during that conflict, and remained in Germany in the Army of Occupation for several months.

At the conclusion of the war he returned to Kendrick. On October 17, 1925, he was united in marriage to Anna Lien, at Spokane. She survives at the family home.

Mr. Long had served for many years on the Board of the Kendrick Highway District. He had also served on the Latah County Nursing Home Board, and the Latah County Planning Commission. He served for several terms on the Board of Village Trustees and was Mayor in 1925. He was also a member of the School Board for several years, and a leader in activities of the Kendrick Commercial Club. He was a member of the Kendrick Masonic Lodge, the Elks Lodge, Modern Woodmen of the World, and of Baker-Lind Post No. 3913, V. F. W. at Kendrick.

Mr. Long was a lover of the great outdoors, and loved to hunt and fish. For many years a big game hunt was a part of every year's activities, as well as fishing. He was a good horseman, and always kept a saddle horse.

Also surviving are a daughter, Miss Patricia Long of Portland, Ore.; two sons, E. T. Long, Jr., of Clarkston, and Maurice R. Long of Opportunity, Wash.; a sister, Mrs. J. E. (Beulah) Key of Spokane; a brother, F. M. (Marvin) Long of Kendrick, and four grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon, Feb. 19, at 2:00 o'clock in the Brower-Wann Funeral Home at Lewiston — and those paying their last respects filled the auditorium to capacity — a number standing. Officiating was the Rev. David Braun of the Kendrick Community Church, who was assisted by the Rev. William K. Killian, D. D., of Portland, Oregon, an 85-year-old uncle of the deceased. Organist was Mrs. Herman Schupfer. Soloists were Mrs. Burton Souders, Jr., and Mrs. Jack Lohman, who sang "The Lord's Prayer."

Active pallbearers were E. A. Deobald, Nora Callison, Gerald Ingle, Lester Crocker, Darwin Tarry and Frank Abrams. Honorary bearers were George F. 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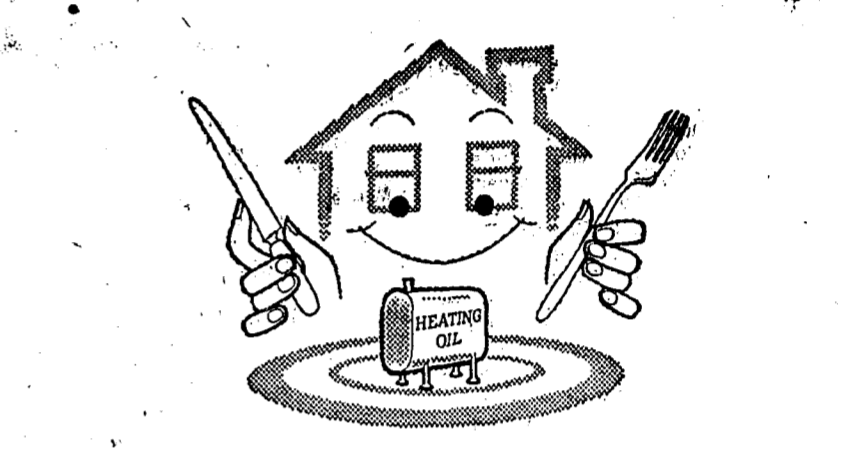

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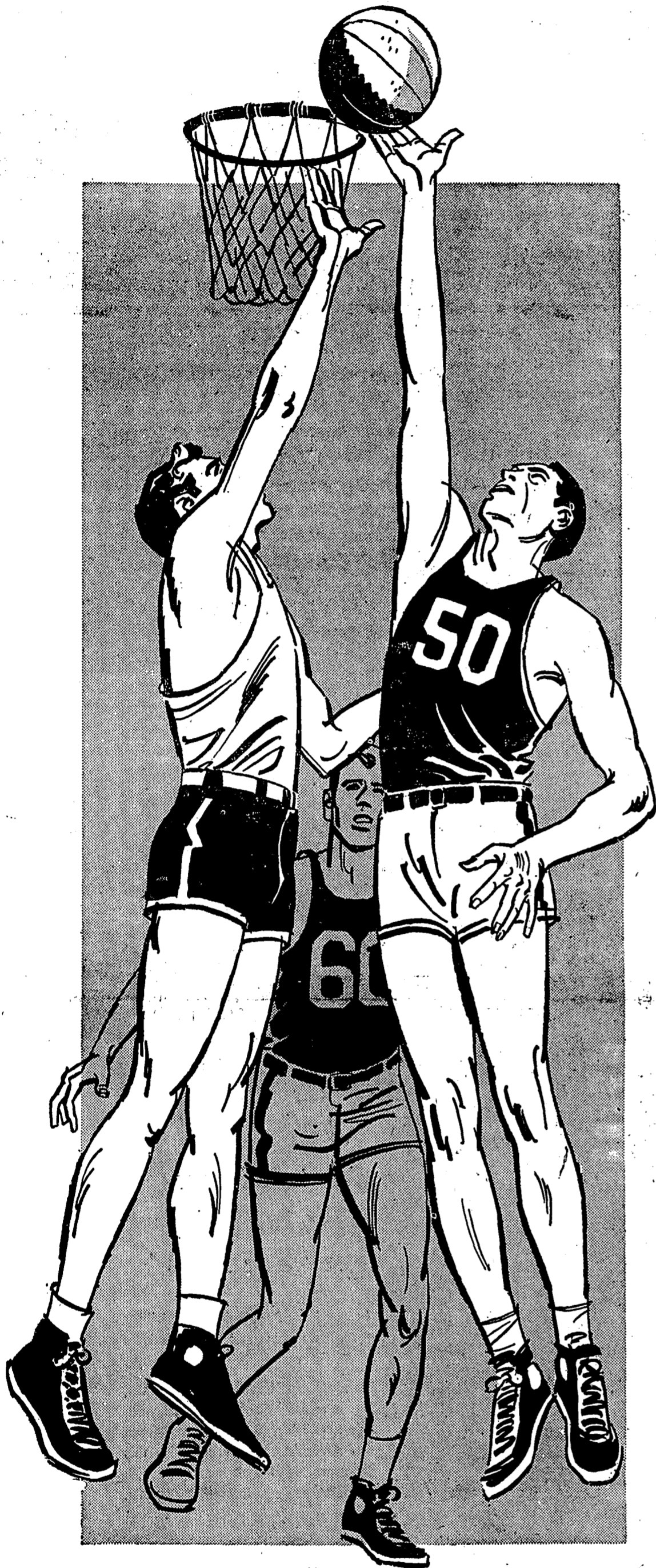

**J. EDGAR HOOVER SPEAKS OUT ON LAW ENFORCEMENT**

Wash., D. C. — In the eyes of all responsible law enforcement officers, corruption is an evil and vile menace to our society. When found permeating the framework of our profession, it becomes a personal enemy of every red-blooded officer.

A more despicable person does not exist than the law enforcement officer who breaches his oath of office and violates the public trust. He is an unscrupulous hypocrite and a disgrace to the service. Each time an officer commits a criminal act, each time he accepts a bribe or pay-off, he invites ridicule and disrespect for his department, community and state. He opens the door to shame and ostracism for himself and his loved ones.

Few professions are subjected to a closer public scrutiny than law enforcement. This is as it should be. The basic concept of our responsibility deals with individual liberties. Accordingly, the public has a right to expect our operations to be

above reproach and our performance of duties to be unsullied. Without the respect and confidence of the public, our cause is hopeless.

Recent degrading reports of scandal and criminality by some officers have placed a heavy burden on law enforcement. We know the overwhelming majority of officers are devoted, conscientious public servants. Diligent and dedicated men have given the best years of their lives to perpetuate and promote law enforcement to a professional status. Nevertheless, all members suffer public disfavor because of the actions of a few traitors. We should not, of course, let this discourage us. Neither should we stand passively by and ignore the problem. These weaklings must be sought out, removed from service, and dealt with forcefully.

Agencies racked with corruption are not always entirely responsible for their plight. Before local citizens and civic leaders would absolve themselves of any blame, they might well re-examine their own positions. Corruption breeds on public apathy and slipshod administration. — J. Edgar Hoover, Director F. B. I.

**IDAHO TO GET TRAVEL PUBLICITY**

Boise — Idaho's vacation attractions will be publicized at nine major sports and travel shows between now and the middle of May.

Secretary Louise Shaddock of the Department of Commerce and Development says the state will be represented at shows in Chicago, Cincinnati, Dallas, Kansas City, Los Angeles, Minneapolis, Oakland and San Francisco.

Idaho will be part of a regional display at seven of the shows through the department's membership in the Pacific Northwest Travel Association. The association allows travel groups and agencies throughout the northwest to pool their resources and enter travel shows with displays that can compete effectively with those entered from other areas of the country.

Four association directors from Idaho, including Dudley Creed, will staff shows at Cincinnati, Dallas, Los Angeles and Oakland. Creed will staff the Ohio Valley Boat, All Sport, Vacation and Travel Show at Cincinnati.

Through its membership in the Yellowstone National Park Advisory Council, the department is taking part in the Kansas City Boat, Sports and Travel Show.

Carl Kitchen, Concord, Calif., who operates a summer camp for boys east of Stibnite, will pass out Idaho material at the San Francisco Sport and Boat Show.

Tillman McCurdy, an Idaho outfitter and guide, will also be at San Francisco to publicize pack trips into the state's wild areas.

**NEW CROPS HAVE BEEN CERTIFIED**

Moscow — Several new varieties of crops have been approved for certification by the Idaho Crop Improvement Association, Homer Futter, county agricultural agent, reported this week on the basis of a report by Howard Roylance, University of Idaho extension agronomist.

They are: Idae 59, Lemhi 62 and Gaines, all wheat varieties; DuPuits, Talent and Cayuga, all alfalfas.

Idae 59 is a beardless white wheat with short, stiff straw. It matures early. Most suitable growing areas are northern Idaho and certain drylands of southern Idaho.

Lemhi 62 is a common white wheat nearly identical with Lemhi 53 in yield, strength of straw, maturity, and milling and baking qualities. It has resistance to more kinds of stem rust than Lemhi 53. Both Lemhi 62 and Lemhi 53 are susceptible to leaf rust, stripe rust and smut.

Gaines is a semi-dwarf, common, soft white winter variety of wheat, particularly adapted to northern Idaho.

All three new varieties of alfalfa were approved for certification primarily for seed production for export to other states. DuPuits is a fairly winter hardy variety which starts growth early in the spring, and continues until late fall. It recovers rapidly after harvest. It is resistant to several leaf diseases.

Talent has been grown for several years in Oregon. It is similar to DuPuits, but less hardy. It grows vigorously and recovers rapidly after cutting. It is moderately resistant to stem nematode, but is susceptible to bacterial wilt.

Cayuga, developed at Cornell University, was first produced in Idaho in 1960. A small amount of seed is being tried in the Boise valley. Yields of Cayuga compare favorably with varieties such as Ranger.

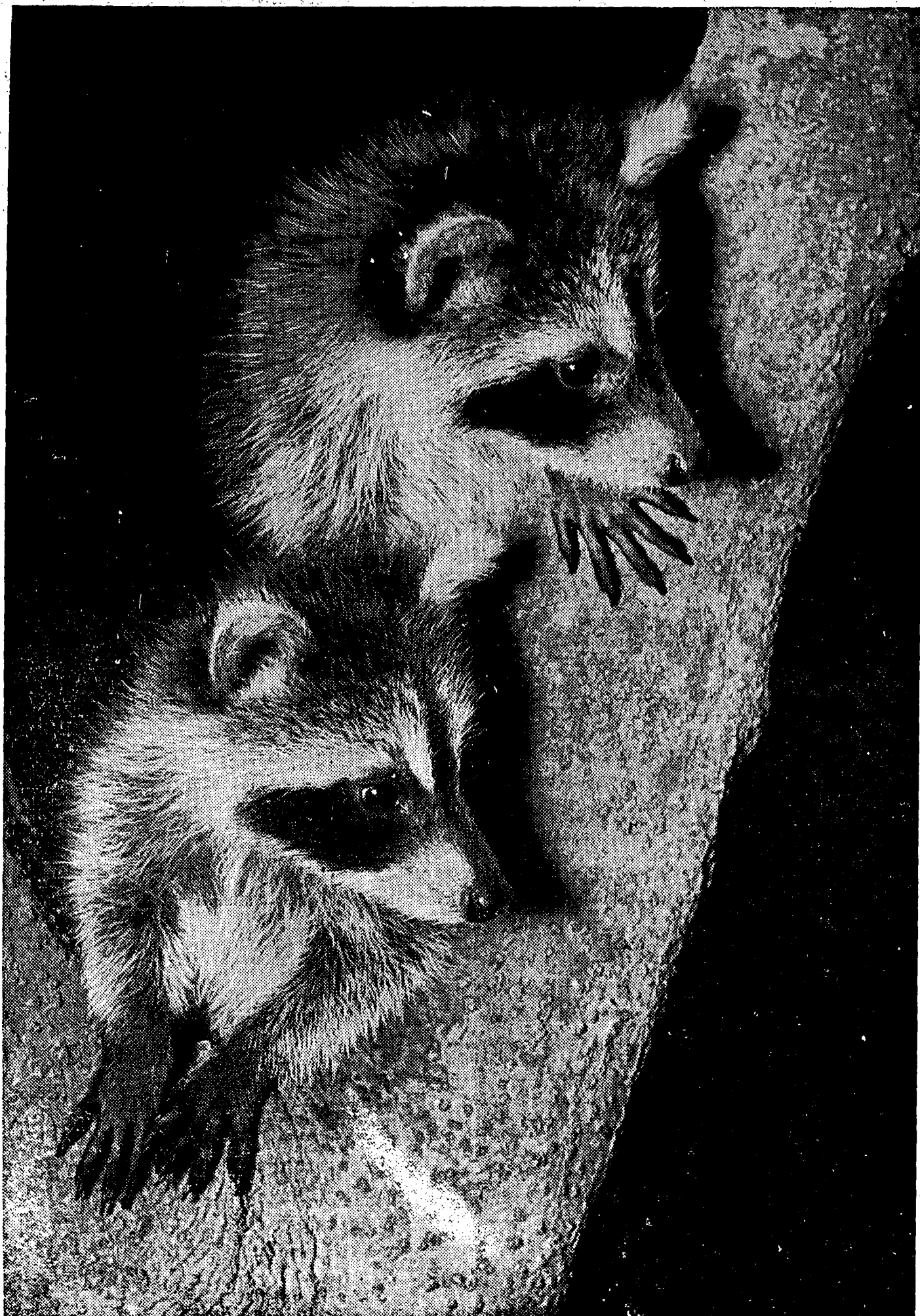

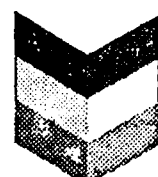

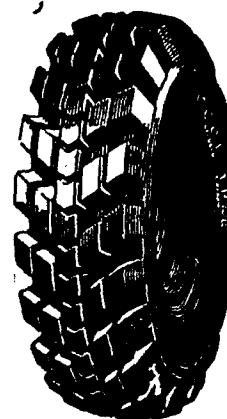
