WEIPPE CAPTURES CAGE TITLE

The Gorillas of Weippe won the Dist. 2 Class A high school basketball championship crown for the second year in a row Saturday night, with a driving attack that dropped the tired Elk River Bobcats 61 to 44. Both teams will go to the state tournament at Lewiston today (Thursday).

The Gorillas, who are also defending state champions, grabbed the lead at the beginning of the contest and kept it all the way. They controlled the backboards for most of the game, and then played "keepaway" with the ball during the final quarter.

The Elk River Bobcats rallied at the close of the second quarter, when a 30-foot shot by John Monroe brought them within six points of Weippe, but they could get no closer.

Weippe played it safe, their five starters staying on the floor until the last two minutes of the game, when Weippe had a comfortable 55-38 lead. Then reserves protected the margin.

It was the sixth tournament game in six days for the weary Bobcats, who, despite all this, gave the Gorillas a good contest However, despite the loss, the Bobcats go to the state tourney at Lewiston — their first.

The Gorillas had little trouble in penetrating the Elk River defense for lay-in shots. Both teams showed strength on the backboards.

Howard Judd of Weippe was high point man for the game and his team with 19. Marvin Watts, who hit five field goals for Weippe in the first half was second high with 17 points. In the last half of the final quarter Weippe played keep-away with the

ball, trying only for sure shots, the quarter count being 14.


