AARON WELLS IN PICKUP CRASH MON:

Aaron Wells, Southwick, school district mechanic and bus driver for the Kendrick school district, had a narrow escape from serious injury and possible death Monday shortly

after noon. Mr. Wells was driving the school district half-ton pickup, and was returning to Kendrick from Lewiston, where he had gone to get a transmission for one of the school busses.

Just after crossing the bridge at the mouth of Catholic Creek, just west of Arrow Junction, the vehicle hit an extremely slick spot in the pavement, veered to the right, struck the guard rail, tearing out three posts, and then crashed to the bottom of the steep embankment, stopping on the railroad tracks below.

The Kendrick Auto Freight truck driven by Wm. Johnson was the first to arrive on the scene following the accident. Mr. Johnson noticed the guard posts missing, peered over the embankment and saw the pickup. He immediately stopped, set his flasher warning lights and descended to the wreck. He found Mr. Wells leaning against the side of the pickup, in a dazed condition. Approaching from

the east could be heard a train. The train, the "Orofino Logger" was moving very slowly, and stopped. The train crew and Mr. Johnson rolled the pickup onto its side so that the tracks were clear. It was decided to put Mr. Wells on a bunk in the caboose rather than attempt the long carry necessary to get him to the road and an ambulance.

Mr. Wells is at the St. Joseph's Hospital, where he has been under observation for injuries. It is reported that he has some bruised verterbrae, and a badly bruised and sprained ankle, but otherwise is in good shape — considering the tumble he took.
