## FIRE DESTROYS MEAD & HOWARD NEVA HILL MILL

The Mead & Howard Lumber Co. Sawmill at Neva Hill, midway between Elk River and Bovill, was destroyed by fire Thursday afternoon of last week.

Jack Mead, Juliaetta, co-owner of the firm, said replacement costs would be about \$50,000. The loss was partially covered by insurance. The cause of the blaze has not yet been determined.

The mill itself was leased by Charles Krogh, formerly of Juliaetta, and was known to many as the "Krogh Mill." Mr. and Mrs. Krogh, who live near the mill, were not at home at the time. The mill had been in a winter shut-down since mid-December. The mill apparently was almost destroyed before the fire was discovered.

H. C. St. Germain of 728 Warner Ave., Lewiston, a tool dealer, said he drove by the mill at 2:00 p. m. and saw no smoke. He reached there again at 4:00 p. m. and the mill was then virtually destroyed by the fast-moving blaze. Others who drove by at 2:30 p. m. also said they saw no smoke.

About 1,000,000 board feet of logs were decked in the mill area for the resumption of spring work. They were not damaged, nor were several houses on the ground or the shop building.

No information is yet available on plans of Mead & Howard regarding the mill.

Mr. Mead described the mill as a "medium-sized" operation. It had a daily output of 20,000 to 25,000 board feet. It was operated about nine months of the year, and employed eight to nine men.

The Mead & Howard firm, Jack Mead and Ray Howard, operate two other plants, a sawmill at Kendrick and a planing mill at Juliaetta. The Kendrick mill is currently on a two-shift basis.

## AREA SNOW COURSES SURVEYED

At the present there are five snow courses being measured in this area. Four of them are located on Moscow Mountain, the Sherwin course is between Bovill and Clarkia. The elevations of these courses are as follows: Moscow Mt., 4100 ft.; West Twin, 3950 ft. East Twin, 3800; Howard Creek, 3270; and Sherwin, 3200.

On March 30, 1962 the snow on the Sherwin course measured 47 in. with a water content of 17 in. Snow depth on the Moscow Mt. course measured 66 in. with 23 in. of water. This is an increase of 13 in. of snow as compared to the measurement two weeks ago. On March 31, West Twin measured 40 in. of snow, and East Twin 44 in. There is only a trace of snow on the lower Howard Creek course.

## FRED BAILEY, AREA PIONEER, DIES AT LEWISTON FRIDAY

Fred G. Bailey, 68, of The Dalles, Oregon, who came to Lewiston for the funeral of a brother, collapsed at the home of a sister at Lewiston on Friday, March 30, and was pronounced dead at 9:25 a. m., at the St. Joseph's Hospital.

Mr. Bailey had attended the funeral Thursday for his brother, David L. Bailey, 72, a retired Lewiston carpenter.

He was sitting at breakfast at the home of a sister, Mrs. H. M. Slocum, when he collapsed. He was taken by ambulance to the hospital about 9:00 a. m. Physicians and attendants applied external cardiac massage, but were never able to fully restore the heart beat.

He was a retired farmer of The Dalles, Oregon, and a former resident of the Texas ridge area near Kendrick.

Fred G. Bailey was born Feb. 18, 1894, at Comstock, Nebraska, and came with his family to Kendrick in 1903. He lived and farmed on Texas ridge until 1942, when he sold out here and moved to The Dalles to farm. He retired in 1954. Following his retirement the family spent the winters at The Dalles, and the summers at Lake Pend Oreille.

He was married to Gladys E. Head at Lewiston, Nov. 24, 1915. He was a member of the Elks Lodge at Heppner, Oregon.

Surviving besides his wife are a son, Jack E. Bailey, Condon, Ore.; a daughter, Mrs. Artille McMananace, Lakeview, Ore.; three brothers, Frank and Curtis of Los Angeles, and Clyde of Romana, Calif., and four grandchildren, and one great-grandchild. One son, Dudley, preceded him in death.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 2:00 in the Little Chapel of the Flowers, Lewiston, with the Rev. P. D. Unruh of the Lewiston Orchard Congregational Community Church officiating. Interment was in Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens, Lewiston.

Mr. Bailey was a truly friendly man, liked by all who knew him. At their summer residence on the lake or in the home at The Dalles, the "latch string" always hung out for friends. And there were many who visited with them. He will be truly missed, despite his moving from this area years ago.

## MALTING BARLEY MAY BE GOOD

Moscow — The Feed Grain program allows approved malting barley varieties to be seeded at 10 percent over a farmer's barley base. Varieties commonly grown in this area that are approved as malting barleys are: Heines Hanna, Halsa II, Hanna, White Winter and Idaho Club.

The Idaho Crop Improvement Association lists Heines Hanna and the White Winter Club as approved varieties for Latah county. Farmers are cautioned against seeding various other varieties as the mixing of varieties can seriously lower prices in an area.

Malsters must have pure varieties as the barleys are sprouted and each kernel should germinate at the same time, and the resulting sprout should have identical growth. Most malting barleys are processed by malsters for sale to beer and food manufacturers. These malts must meet very rigid specifications exacting for each use, and in some cases, brewmasters, who select the ingredients, have the reputations of being "prima donnas."

Barley tests at the University of Idaho show the two-row spring malting barley yield comparable to the six-row feed barleys. This makes the two-row a good bet because if it still makes a desirable feed barley.

Dr. Karl Klages, head of the Agronomy Department, University of Idaho, makes the following suggestions that may help farmers to upgrade their malting barley and have an opportunity for a premium price:

1. Seeding rate should be 60 lbs. per acre. Heavier rates give heavier foliage and increase the chance for small kernels.

2. Keep nitrogen application on the low to medium level. Excess nitrogen over-stimulates the plant which uses up the moisture resulting in shriveled kernels. About 4 pounds of nitrogen per acre on stubble in barley, if moderate amounts of straw were plowed under is a required, while the heavier amounts of stubble may require up to 6 lbs. of nitrogen. Heavier rates of nitrogen may increase the yield, but increases the chances for lower grades.

3. Use care in harvesting, especially wait until the barley is ripe. Then leave the low areas and lodged spots and harvest separately.

## SNOW SURVEY CONDUCTED

Results of the Washington Water Power company's annual snow survey conducted this month in the Bitter-root mountains of northern Idaho show an average water content of 27.6 inches in the watersheds feeding Coeur d'Alene lake, primary storage reservoir for the company's power generation plants in this section of its territory.

This is approximately 115 percent of the average figure for the past 37 years. The highest content of the Coeur d'Alene, St. Maries and St. Joe River basins that feed the lake was recorded in 1956 when the snow-pack contained 37.3 inches of water. Minimum was in 1941 with 10.6 inches.

For the first time in its 72 year history WWP employed helicopters in conducting the survey. In past years, on six-day trips, the surveyors trudged on snowshoes over scheduled courses to obtain snow depths measurements. The helicopter made it possible to do the job in three days and, according to Marshall Blair, vice president in charge of Power Supply for WWP, it can be done in two days in the future.

According to Blair this year's snow storage will amount to about 3,660,000 acre feet of water run-off over the Post Falls dam between the period starting March 15 and ending September 30. He has estimated the peak discharge in the Spokane river will be about 29,000 cubic feet per second and that peak elevation at Coeur d'Alene lake will probably be about 2133.0 on about May 5.

"Weather and spring rains will determine actual distribution of run off," Blair said, "and if those two factors remain normal, there is no danger of excessive floods and there will be an ample supply of water for power generation."

Greatest snow depth was measured on the Lookout Pass and Roland courses on the divide between Idaho and Montana.



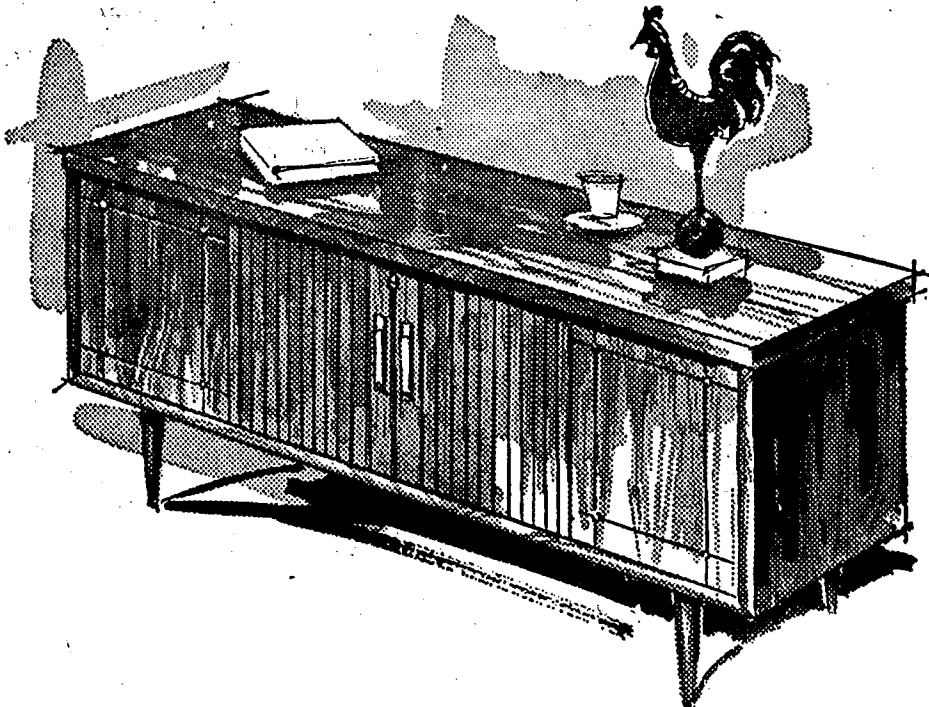

into the soil. Nitrogen is the kind of fertilizer lawns usually need most. There are several compounds and mixtures to do the job. If you choose ammonium nitrate you can figure two-thirds of a cup to 100 square feet. Put on one application in the early spring and give two more feedings during the growing season. Livestock manure is beneficial, but may contain weed seeds. About 10 pounds of dried, ground manure are recommended for 100 square feet. Poultry manure is more concentrated. About half that amount will be enough.

Commercial fertilizers can be mixed with soil to make them spread more evenly. Such thinning is useful if the area is small and only a few pounds are put on.

If compost is made of spring rakings, it is a good idea to mix ten cups of fertilizer with every bushel of compost. Spread soil over each six-inch layer. Manure also increases the value of compost.

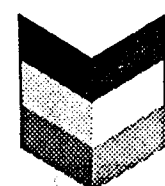

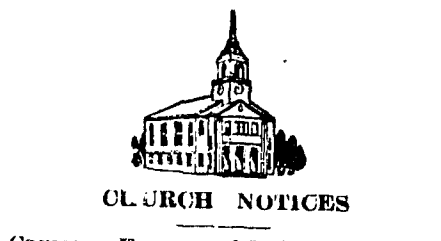

VETS CAN CHANGE INSURANCE

More than two-and-a-half million World War II veterans who have not converted their term insurance to permanent plan policies may use an easy stage method of making the change. Ira L. Hinthorne, Contact Representative, VA Hospital, Spokane, pointed out today.

Both the law and VA regulations permit these term policyholders to convert as little as \$1,000 to a plan with fixed premium amounts, in order to avoid the periodic increases in the cost of the term insurance.

By converting \$1,000 a year for the next ten years, the full amount of a \$10,000 policy will be in permanent plan insurance within a decade.

Hinthorne pointed out that annual dividends may be used in the process to reduce the cash outlay.

Permanent plan policies available to World War II term policyholders are ordinary life, 20-payment life, 20-year endowment, endowment at age 60 and endowment at age 65.

Permanent plans have certain values which term policies do not have, including loan value, cash surrender value, and extended insurance value. Hinthorne stated that a VA Representative at the Bismarck Security Office, Moscow, Idaho, every Wednesday afternoon, 2:00 to 3:00 p.m.

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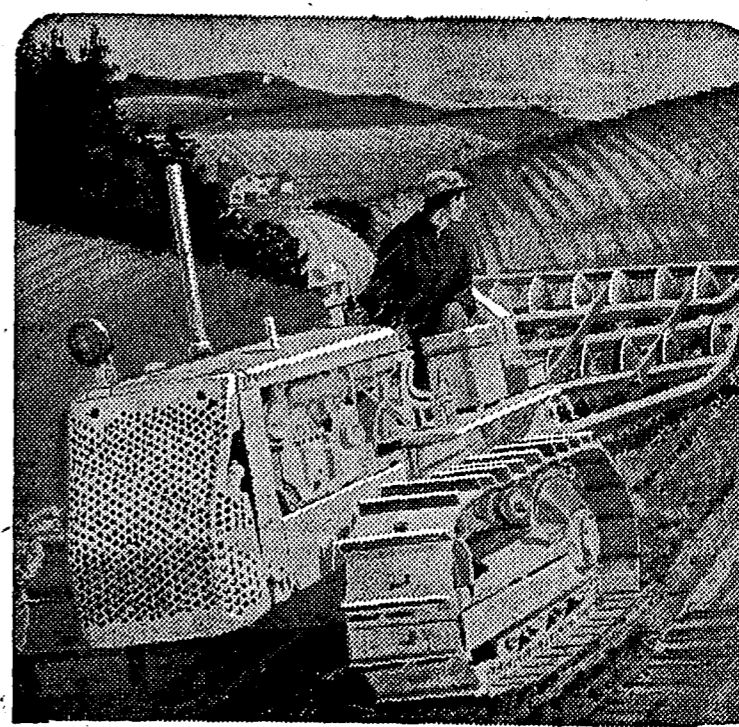
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
