Mrs. Guy (Grace) Wicks of Moscow, has filed for the nomination for County Commissioner, Second District, on the Republican ticket. She seeks the office vacated by Orville Snow, also of Moscow.

Mrs. Wicks is a life-time resident of Latah county, having been born and reared at Genesee.

She holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Idaho, and since her marriage has been a resident of Moscow.

Mrs. Wicks engaged in the real estate business for 14 years, and since 1935 has been a broker for a Mutual Fund investment company.

Mr. Wicks is the Associate Dean of Student Affairs at the University of Idaho.

In announcing her candidacy Mrs. Wicks said she was the first woman ever to file for county commissioner in Latah county, and she is also believed the first in the State of Idaho.

She states she believes her business training and her education make her well qualified for the position.

She is also a life-time member of the P.-T. A., and was very active in the fight for the Latah County Nursing Home.

Remember, April 30th, Kendrick and a majority of the surrounding area will be going on Daylight Saving Time. SCHOOL FORESTRY TOUR SCHEDULED

Moscow - Seven schools and 340 students will participate in the Latah County School Forestry Tour scheduled for Tuesday, April 24th. Weather permitting, the school busses from all corners of the county will assemble at the Palouse Valley Tree Farm Demonstration Area from 9:00 to 10:00 a. m. Radio station KRPL will announce between 6:30 a. m. and 8:00 a. m. whether the tour will be held or postponed to the following day, April 25th.

The demonstration area was established by Potlatch Forests, Inc., in 1957, to show the results of woodlot management practices. The attractions of the area include a pine planting, four thinning and pruning plots and a timber management area. Three stations of the twelve-station tour will deal with these topics.

The Foresters presenting these topics will be Gary Ringold, Phil Kline and Wilson Kille, all of Potlatch Forests, Inc.

The U. S. Forest Service will manage the following stations: Recreation, range management, fire prevention and multiple use. The Foresters concerned will be Jerry Moore, Ed. Laven, Atley Wernerman and Del Jaquish. Kenneth Rieragard, soil conservationist, will man the station on Forest Soils. Ray Johnston, a sawmill operator from Deary, will handle the station on wood products. Phil Wooline, College of Forestry, at the University of Idaho, will show examples of important forest insects and diseases. John Hunt, also of the College of Forestry, will assist Jerry Moore on the recreation station.

Hale Ebling, Conservation officer of Deary, will lead the discussion on wildlife management. Gene Farmer, woodland forester, Troy, will show important points in tree and shrub identification.

This tour promises to be an important experience in learning for all seventh graders.

To help in evaluation, the Daily Idahoian at Moscow will again sponsor an essay contest which will be open to all students participating in the tour.

Norm Berg, chairman of the Latah County Farm Forestry Advisory committee, will act as official greeter as the busses arrive.

Winthrop Shattuck of Potlatch will assist directing students to their stations.

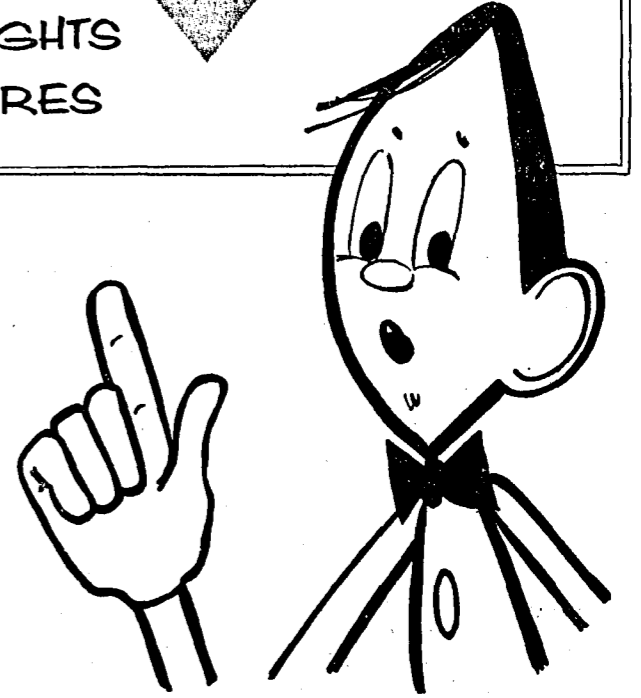

ADVENTURES IN SCIENCE TO APPEAR AT K. H. S. MAY 4

"Adventures in Science," the General Electric traveling show, will be presented at the Kendrick High School on Friday, May 4, under the sponsorship of the Washington Water Power Co., according to Dean Hollenbeck, local company representative.

As the successor to the world-famous "House of Magic," the present show is designed to alert students to the challenges of the Space Age. Two lecturers from the New York offices of General Electric are traveling with the show, presenting it to more than 40 secondary schools in the Inland Empire.

Hollenbeck said the program consists of a series of demonstrations showing some of man's progress in science and engineering. Included are glowing chemicals, lamps which light without wires, rocket fuels, space satellite demonstrations, and the use of atomic energy to produce electricity. The show emphasizes the ways in which today's students can take advantage of their educational opportunities in order to make similar progress in any field. It is meant to supplement the work of teachers, guidance counselors and parents in the over-all effort to stimulate and encourage young people to plan for their own careers.

"Adventures in Science," Hollenbeck said, "is a part of a continuing program on the part of the W. W. P.

Co. and General Electric to alert students to the importance of thinking about their future.

For more than 29 years, G. E. has been presenting scientific demonstrations to millions of people all over the world. The present show is the successor to the "House of Magic" which was first presented in 1933 at the Chicago Century of Progress Exposition. RAISE SAGE GROUSE

Fish and Game department workers at the Jerome (Idaho) game farm have raised sage grouse for the first time, anywhere, from eggs to mature birds.

These were in sufficient numbers to yield scientific data on molt, growth and breeding phenology. It is expected that this study will gradually be carried into the field phase involving analysis of the quality and quantity of sage grouse range. This is expected to establish procedures for arresting the present decline.

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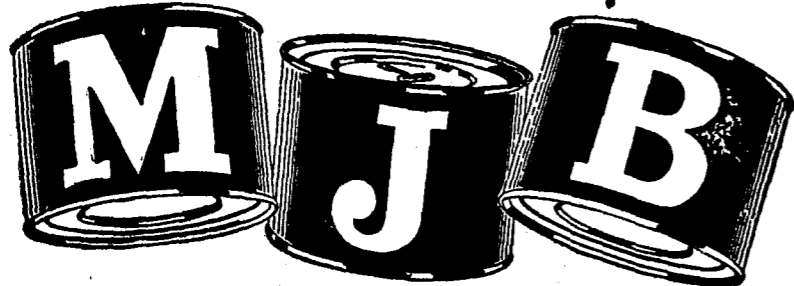
