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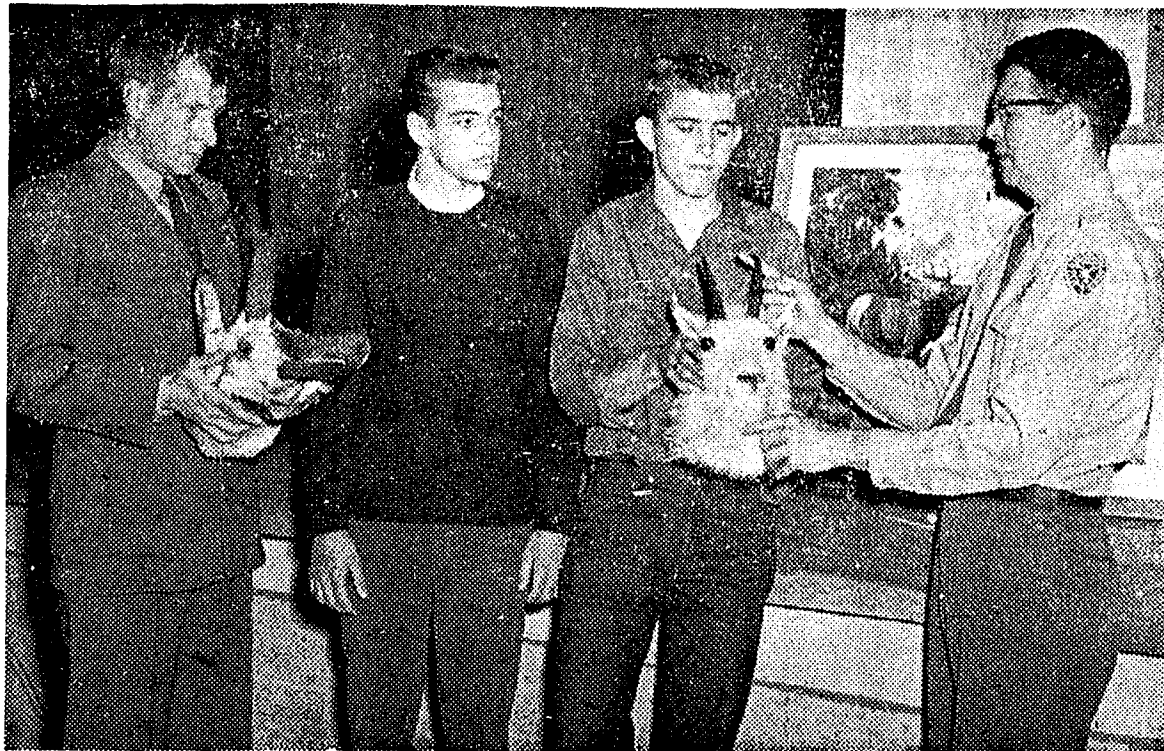

**YOUTH CAMP STILL HAS OPENINGS**

Boise — Many opportunities still exist for Idaho youths aged 14 to 17 to attend the State Conservation Camp in Priest Lake State Forest this coming summer, according to Roger L. Guernsey, state forester. Fifty-nine boys will be selected by drawings to attend Camp Pioneer No. 2. The plan is to take the same number of boys from each county as that county has Representatives in the state legislature at the present time.

Mr. Guernsey emphasized that the Youth Camp affords a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. He said the boys are taught how to work and live together in one of the most inspiring workshops in this country — a beautiful land of forests and lakes in north Idaho. The boys will be clearing forest trails, planting and thinning trees, clearing brush, learning how to handle tools, and learning about forests and forest management. For off-duty periods there are exceptional opportunities for outdoor recreation. Guernsey said that boys who attended Camp Pioneer No. 1 were highly enthusiastic, and some even said they would return without pay, if only it were permitted.

The Youth Camp will be held between June 18 and August 19. The boys who win in the county drawings will receive transportation to and from camp, food and lodging, a pair of logger boots and socks, medical care, and \$30.00 per month.

Mr. Guernsey said that applications have been received from only 17 counties to date, so the chances for a boy going to camp are still

excellent in most counties. He urged all interested boys, or their parents, to request application blanks from any state forestry office (Norman Lewis, State Forestry Dept., Kendrick) or from their state representative (George F. Brocke, Sr., Kendrick). Drawings will be held in mid-May.

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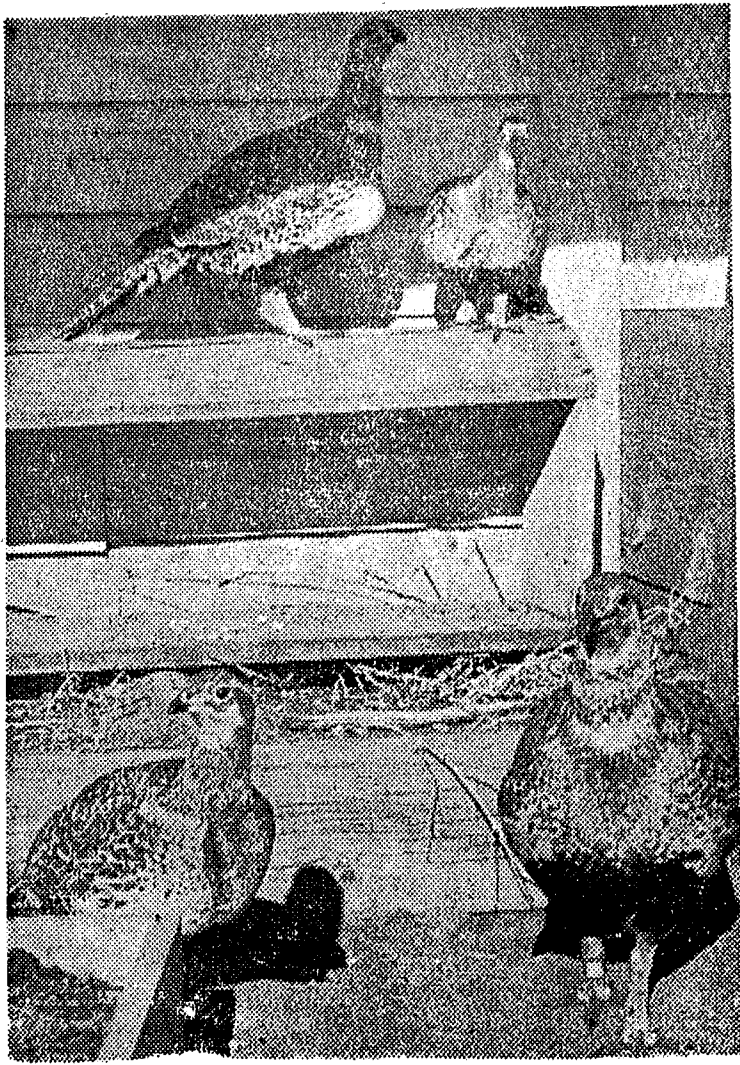
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**RAISE SAGE GROUSE**

**SCS SAYS SOIL LOSS IS MODERATE**

Kendrick — Soil erosion losses during the past winter and spring season can best be classed as "moderate," on a county-wide bases, says Manning Onstott of the SCS. There are several fields that have severe soil washing, and these have lost as much as 80 to 110 tons per acre of soil. The soil one inch deep on an acre weighs about 160 tons.

The majority of the fields that are noticeably eroded this spring have losses of about 30 to 50 tons per acre. These are mostly those that have small rills, such as steep north coves and north slopes.

As in other years, the fields taking the brunt of the washing are the clean cultivated fallow. In some cases black pea green manure ground has washed quite badly.

In most communities of the county the total erosion is slightly under that of the past few years.

Some weather factors have aided in reducing soil erosion, some have increased it. There has been less the last two years, partly because of the two dry fall seasons, and the soil was able to retain much of the winter's precipitation. The frozen soil late this winter aggravated erosion when it thawed for two or three inches, but remained frozen underneath for several weeks.

Several conservation practices have helped to reduce erosion this past season, some singly, and some in combination:

1. A fairly long history of good crop rotation with regular use of grasses and legumes.
2. A cloddy seedbed for the winter grain last fall.
3. Contour strip cropping on the field. A great many such winter grain fields have no signs of erosion, even though steep.

A dangerous sign has appeared in a few cases, that is, soil washing on fall plowed wheat stubble. This is probably a sign that the land is badly in need of organic matter, which can best be provided by alfalfa and grass for a number of years.

Small draws have been cut unusually hard this year, probably due to the frost in the ground. Numerous small rills cut on hillsides have made for more than the usual amount of silt and clay out-wash onto the flats below.

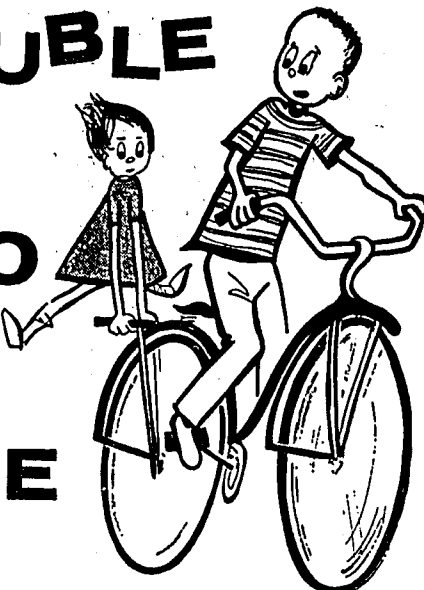
Personnel from the Latah Soil Conservation District made some field measurements of soil losses to appraise erosion situations for the year.

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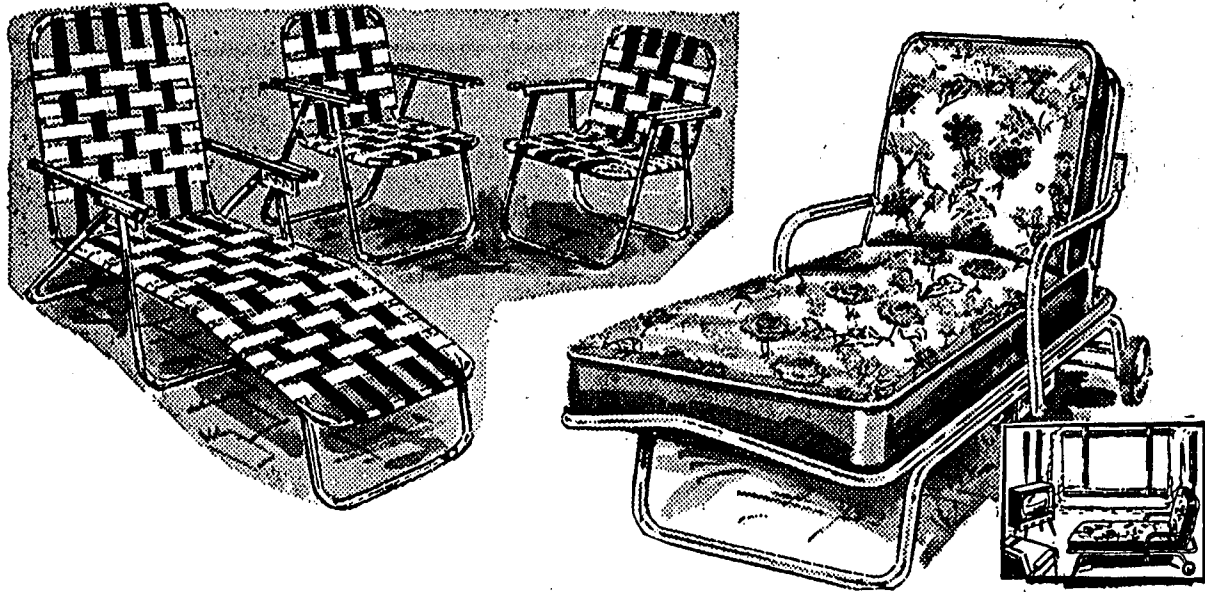
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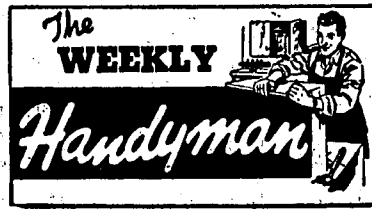
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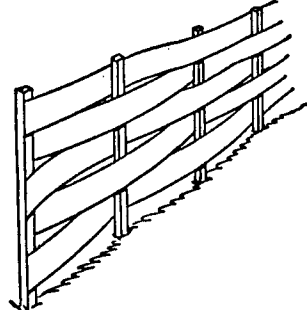
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A reader who wants to enclose an area around his home for recreation and gardening has asked for plans for a distinctive fence, which also serves as a wind-break. Our plans suggested four fence designs and because they are both handsome and practical we believe other readers will be interested in them, too.

A "woven" fence was one of those suggested. Twelve-foot lengths of 1/4-inch exterior tempered hardboard are bowed among strategically placed 4x4 posts to effect the woven appearance. Height of this fence is determined by the number of hardboard panels used, but the most desirable height suggested is 5 feet 6 inches.



Free plans are available for four handsome, yet practical fences.

This size is achieved by horizontally weaving five 12-inch panels among the posts, placing the bottom panel two inches above the ground and adding the other panels at 1/2-inch intervals. The 4x4 posts protrude 2 inches above the top of the panels. Planting these 4x4s 2 feet into the earth presents the only labor problem, because any trimming required by the hardboard and posts can be accomplished quickly with a portable electric saw. The hardboard is fastened to the 4x4s with 5-penny galvanized siding or galvanized box nails.

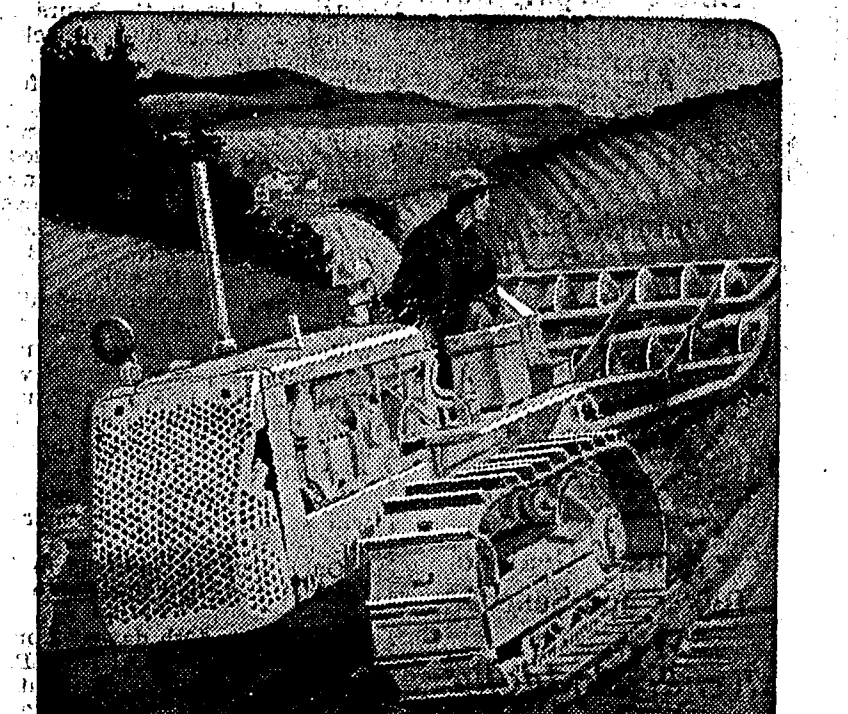
