A reader who wants to enclose an area around his home for recreation and gardening has asked for plans for a distinctive fence, which also serves as a windbreak. Our plans suggested four fence designs and because they are both handsome and practical we believe other readers will be interested in them, too.

A "woven" fence was one of those suggested. Twelve-foot lengths of 1/4-inch exterior tempered hardboard are bowed among strategically placed 4x4 posts to effect the woven appearance. Height of this fence is determined by the number of hardboard panels used, but the most desirable height suggested is 5



Free plans are available for four handsome, yet practical fences.

This size is achieved by horizontally weaving five 12-inch panels among the posts, placing the bottom panel two inches above the ground and adding the other panels at 1/2-inch intervals. The 4x4 posts protrude 2 inches above the top of the panels.

Planting these 4x4s 2 feet into the earth presents the only labor problem, because any trimming required by the hardboard and posts can be accomplished quickly with a portable electric saw. The hardboard is fastened to the 4x4s with 5-penny galvanized siding or galvanized box nails.

SCS SAYS SOIL LOSS IS MODERATE

Kendrick — Soil erosion during the past winter and spring season can best be classes as "moderate," on a county-wide bases, says Manning Onstott of the SCS. There are several fields that have severe soil washing, and these have lost as much as 80 to 110 tons per acre of soil. The soil one inch deep on an acre weighs about 160 tons.

The majority of the fields that are noticeably eroded this spring have losses of about 30 to 50 tons per acre. These are mostly those that have small rills, such as steep north coves and north slopes.

As in other years, the fields taking the brunt of the washing are the clean cultivated fallow. In some cases black pea green manure ground has washed quite badly.

In most communities of the county the total erosion is slightly under that of the past few years.

Some weather factors have aided in reducing soil erosion, some have increased it. There has been less the last two years, partly because of the two dry fall seasons, and the soil was able to retain much of the winter's precipitation. 


