6,620 ACRES ARE REVEGETATED

During the past 12 years, 6,629 acres of big game rangeland have been planted in new browse vegetation in a statewide program that began in 1950 and peaked up about three years ago. The bulk of the plantation has been bitterbrush since 1959. Revegetation is needed on range land that has lost most of its desirable browse plants because of fire, insects and over-use.

Oftentimes the factor that created the necessity for range revegetation work — an overabundance of game or domestic livestock — or both — is the very thing that prevents the success of revegetation work. Browse reestablishment work is slow and costly. A cheaper and more desirable method is to adjust range use and range capacity. Occasionally, reduced use for several years will result in range recovery.

Duplicate Fishing Licenses
Sportsmen who lose or deface licenses will have easier times replacing them if they write down the serial numbers in a safe place for future reference. The procedure is as follows:

1. File proper application and \$1 fee with the vendor who sold the original license whenever possible. He should have triplicate license stubs and thus verify original sale.

2. When application can not be filed with the vendor who sold the original license, the new vendor naturally will not have the triplicate license stubs. Therefore the number of the original license is essential to get the application started.

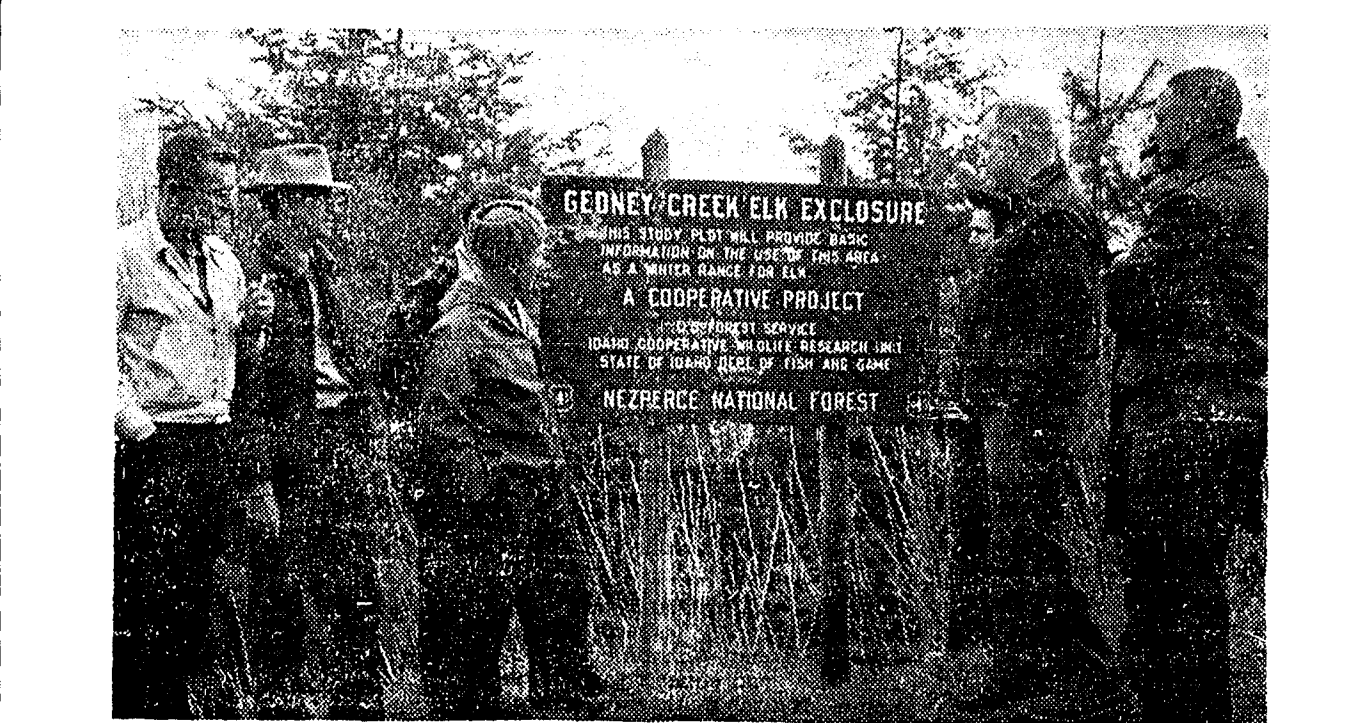
Unless the purchaser has the original serial number, or vendor can produce it from his records, a search must be made by the department. This takes time.

It is possible to purchase a new license at the regular fee. But this becomes expensive for non-residents, who pay \$75 for fishing-hunting licenses combinations.

No provision was written into the law for the issuance of duplicate licenses until the 36th session of the state legislature made the change about one and one-half years ago.

Controlled Hunt Rules
While applications and other controlled hunt materials and information will be available through license vendors around the state and the Boise office of the department in the next couple of weeks, following is a gist of some of the rules:

moose, antelope, bighorn sheep and mountain goat must be received in the Boise office by 5 p. m. July 20, or postmarked by midnight the same day.

Applications for controlled hunt permits on elk and deer must be received in the Boise office not later than 5 p. m. August 10, or post marked by midnight the same day.

Controlled hunt fees are as follows: Deer — \$3; elk — \$5; antelope — \$3; moose — \$25; bighorn sheep — \$25; mountain goat — \$5. These

fees do not include tags.

Moose, bighorn sheep and mountain goat tags are \$10 each and the cost of these tags must be included with the controlled hunt fees. Antelope tags are \$1 and this also is included with the application. Elk and deer tags may be bought from license vendors — \$2 for elk and \$1 for deer.

Fresh and cured meats of all kinds are obtainable at Blewett's Market in Kendrick.

CARE URGED IN USE OF NATIONAL FORESTS

Missoula, Mont. — In announcing that holiday visitors will be welcome in National Forests, Boyd L. Rasmussen, regional forester, urged all visitors to be cautious with fires and alert to the danger of starting a forest fire.

Rasmussen also reminded parents, who may have their children with them, to be careful that children do not play in the fire, or do not have access to matches.

"Several small fires have, in the past week, been detected and brought under control," he said. "The first week of July marks the start of this area's fire season. From now until the latter part of September, the forests will be most vulnerable to fire."

"Holiday visitors are welcome to enjoy the outdoor recreation provided by the streams, lakes, trails, and the more than 300 picnic and camping sites maintained on National Forests of the Northern Region, Rasmussen said.

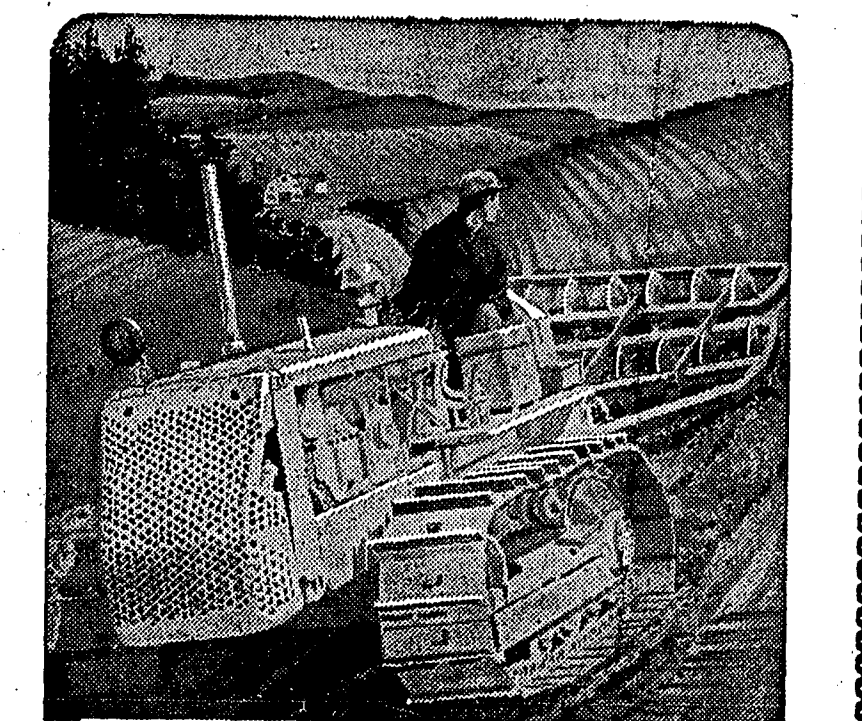
