1. File proper application and \$1 fee with the vendor who sold the original license whenever possible. He should have triplicate license stubs

and thus verify original sale. 2. When application can not be filed with the vendor who sold the original license, the new vendor naturally will not have the triplicate license stubs. Therefore the number of the original license is essential to get the application started.

Unless the purchaser has the original serial number, or vendor can produce it from his records, a search must be made by the department. This takes time.

It is possible to purchase a new license at the regular fee. But this becomes expensive for non-residents, who pay \$75 for fishing-hunting licenses combinations.

Missoula, Mont. — In announcing that holiday visitors will be welcome in National Forests, Boyd L. Rassmussen, regional forester, urged all alert to the danger of starting a forest fire.

Rasmussen also reminded parents, who may have their children with them, to be careful that children do not play in the fire, or do not have access to matches.


