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## SWIM REGISTRATION NEAR 100 MARK AT MEMORIAL POOL

Nearly 100 "students" had signed up for swimming lessons at the Area Living War Memorial Pool in Kendrick by the close of registrations Tuesday morning.

Miss Bertella Burke, Water Safety Instruction instructor at the pool, said that the registrations were down somewhat from last year. She said that the reason for the smaller registration was probably due to the colder weather this season.

Registrations are as follows: Junior and Senior Life Saving, 12; Advanced Swimmers, 3; Swimmers, 11; Intermediates, 23; Advanced Beginners, 48; and Beginners, 23.

Although the weather has undoubtedly held back total attendance, Miss Burke said that on the few hot days, the one-day total had far surpassed any one-day total for last year.

Swimming lessons are to run for a period of two weeks this year, with the possibility of a second session later in the season.

Persons who are interested in an Adult Beginners class should contact Miss Burke as soon as possible, as she has said that if there is enough interest shown, she would make an effort to have a class available in the evenings for adults only. This class has been held for several preceding years.

Miss Burke added this note: Persons who are participating in swimming lessons or who have children enrolled, are reminded that pets are not allowed in the pool, and should not be brought or allowed to follow the children to the pool.

An incident involving several dogs Tuesday morning caused some concern and difficulty with lesson procedure.

From now on, persons who have pets at the pool will be expelled until the animal is removed from the premises.

## TWO FIRES ERUPT IN KENDRICK DIST.

The first two fires of the season were reported to the Kendrick Fire Protective District on Monday of this week. Both fires were put out by crews from Kendrick and Orofino.

At 7:00 o'clock Monday morning a report of a lightning-set fire sent eight men from Kendrick and six from Orofino to a one-half acre blaze above Bruce's Eddy, on the North Fork of the Clearwater. The fire was in timber land owned by the Riverside Lumber Co. of Orofino. Almost no damage was caused in this burn. Crews stayed until evening to completely extinguish the blaze.

The second fire was reported on the Ed. Ramsdale property on American ridge. This blaze was set by sparks from a downed power line, possibly caused by a low-flying spray plane. The fire consumed about two acres of grass and a fence line. Little damage was done.

Norman Lewis, Deputy State Fire Warden, said the two blazes Monday were the first reported in the district this year.

## NEW BRIDGE NOW IN SERVICE

A new bridge was recently completed, crossing Bear Creek at the foot of the Little Bear Ridge grade, just northeast of Kendrick. The 45-foot span has steel decking and a black-top surface, with steel side guides for traffic. It is 21 feet wide—ample for any combine.

Construction of the bridge, purchased "knocked down" by the Kendrick Highway District, was entirely a local effort, with Charles and Ted Fey, Max Dammarell and Lloyd Farrington working toward its completion. Total cost of the bridge, (including everything) came to a little under \$5,000.00, said Roy Glenn, member of the Highway Board.

The improvement has been an apparent need for some time, and travelers on the road are heartily welcoming the shiny new structure.

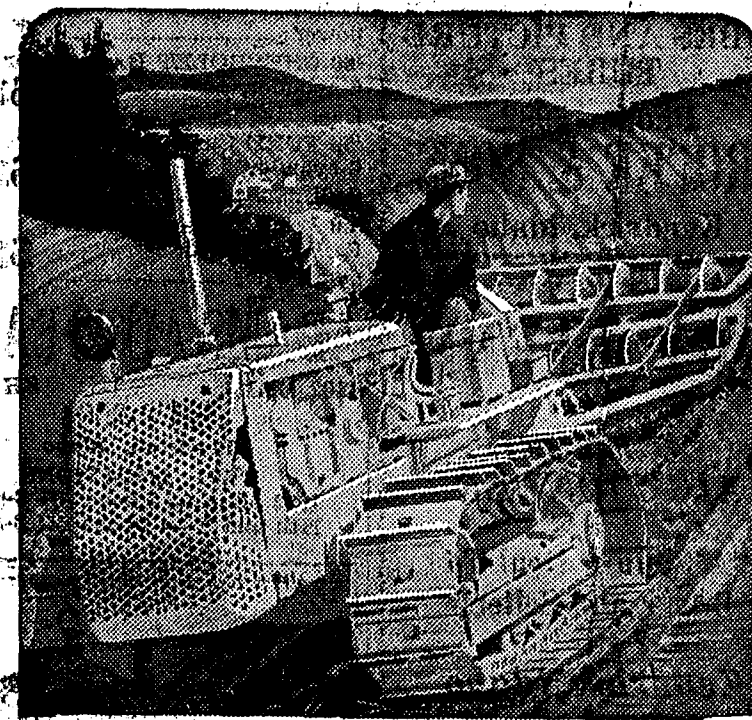
