BURNING INDEX NEARS CRITICAL POINT IN DISTRICT

The burning index reached a high of 62 in the Kendrick Fire Protective district by Monday afternoon of this week. Seventy is considered to be critical, and 50 is rated as high.

Norman Lewis, District Fire Warden, said that the burning conditions are extremely hazardous due to the recent heat wave, and people are urged to be careful about throwing anything combustible from vehicles or leaving their camp fires without making sure they are dead.

"Cheat grass growth is quite heavy due to the wet and long spring," Lewis said, "and it is nearly impossible to put it out once it is burning. The heat is so intense from the heavy growth that it is hard to fight the fires by hand."

Deputy Warden Gerald Bateman said that it was recently determined that some man made fires may be caused by persons throwing pop or beer bottles from cars. He said that when the bottle breaks and the glass shatters, the broken pieces often times form a type of magnifying glass which concentrates the sun's rays and sets fires in this way. He urged people not to throw any type of trash from cars.

Only two fires have been reported in the district since last Wednesday. One fire, July 19, called firemen from Kendrick to extinguish a burning truck in a field two miles east of the Clearwater dam near Lewiston. Some 40 acres were burned off in that blaze.

The second fire erupted late Sunday afternoon, calling a crew from Kendrick about 7 p. m. The fire burned some 50 acres on the spiral highway, north of Lewiston. It burned to within a few yards of the crest of the hill, all in grass.

No timber fires have been reported to the district this year. A total of five fires have been reported in the district.

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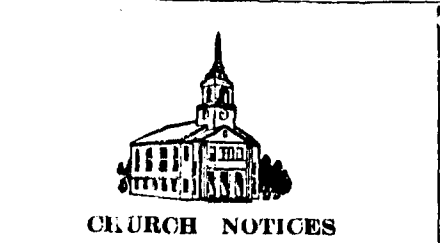

IDAHO LOSSES FAMED HORTICULTURIST

U. of I., Moscow — One of the most respected scientists in the country in his field, Dr. Leif Verner, 62, professor of horticulture at the University of Idaho, died Saturday, July 14, at Moscow, two days after becoming seriously ill. He had suffered from a heart ailment.

Dr. Verner was widely known for the varieties of fruit he had developed, including the Idared apple; for his development of an instrument which determines when and how much water to apply to fruit trees, and for a method for training young fruit trees to assure wide-angled branches which would carry a heavy load of fruit without breaking. He also was responsible for some of the original work and perfection of methods for thinning fruits in use today.

He was head of the department of horticulture at the University from 1934 to 1948, when he asked to be allowed to spend his full time doing research and teaching. He retained his position as professor of horticulture and horticulturist.

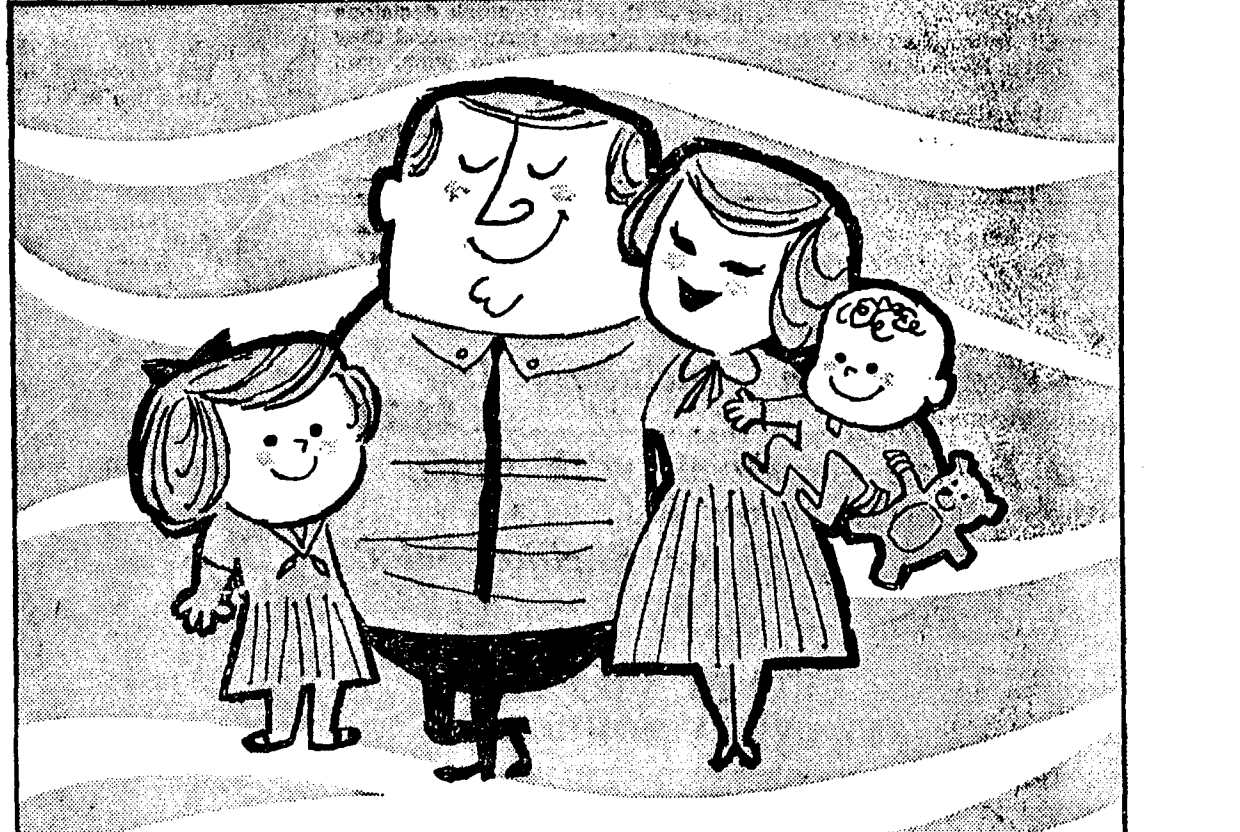
Dr. James E. Kraus, dean of the college of agriculture and a former associate of Dr. Verner in the horticulture department, said that: "He was one of the most respected scientists and fruit men in the country, and was known internationally. His death is a great loss to the University and the people of Idaho."

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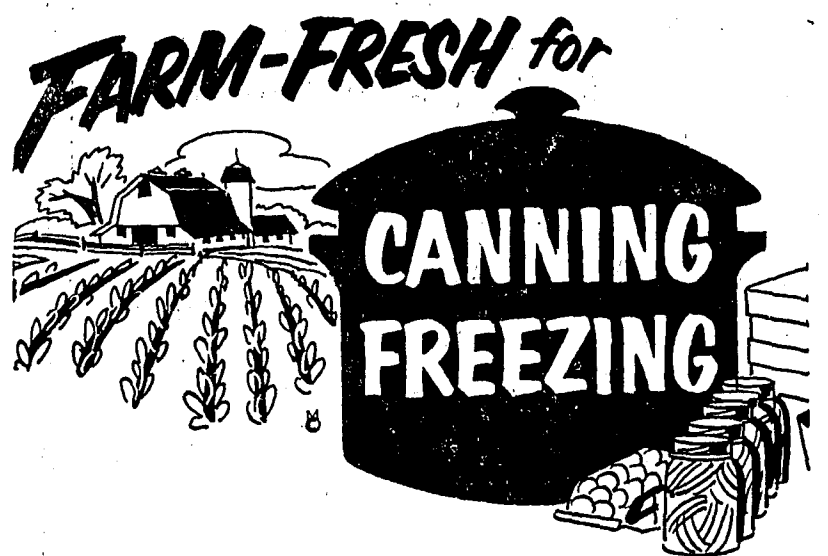

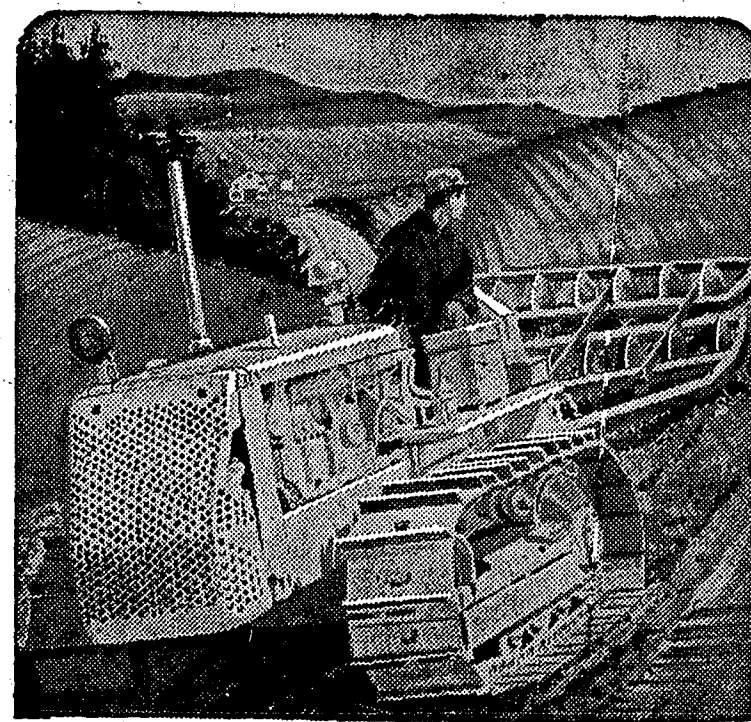
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
