HARVEST SWINGS INTO HIGH GEAR, FALL BARLEY IN

Farmers in and around this area began hauling in the first of the fall barley crop about the middle of last week — hurried by a little bit by the hot, dry weather of the past two weeks.

Fall peas began coming into the warehouses early this week, but the spring crops probably will not be ready for some time.

Yield are reported good, with the exception of the fall crops that were damaged by the freeze early this spring.

One warehouseman reported the barley as being the "itchiest" that he could ever remember.

Bean growers say that a rain would be most welcome at this time, but if it does not turn too hot, the bean crops should be "better than average."

HOOVER BELIEVES STRICTER LAWS ARE NEEDED

The rights of society in many legal jurisdictions today are being trampled in the administration of justice involving habitual criminals. Suspended sentences, paroles and probation are meted out to murderers, rapists and depraved thugs as though they were badges of merit. This "criminal feedback" — the maladministration of rehabilitation procedures — is definitely a contributing factor in the alarming rise of criminality.

Incorrigibles and known repeaters, who have been favored by some form of leniency, flout the laws of the land and make a mockery of our judicial processes in some areas. Many are barely beyond the confines of prison walls before returning to their bizarre activities. They prey again on the unsuspecting public, and again, law enforcement must ferret them out. Thus, the vicious cycle continues.

There is no intent here to question or criticize the valid principles of rehabilitation systems. They are an integral and necessary part of our form of government. Certainly, the dedicated and conscientious parole and probation officers, faced with increasing caseloads and outmoded clemency regulations in many localities cannot be blamed. The grave fault lies with those who permit such conditions to exist.

"It is difficult to follow the reasoning of some authorities who seem bent on changing our whole judicial structure to mollify the criminal element. Disinterested prosecutors and overly protective courts tilt the very scales of justice in favor of the lawless, and experimentations by some parole officers in prematurely releasing habitual criminals defy comprehension.

Since the inception of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives" program in March of 1950, 187 criminals have been on the list. Of this number, 140 received some form of leniency. More than 21,000 parole and probation violators are listed in the "fugitive stop notices" maintained by the FBI for local police.

Criminal reaction to lenient practices is axiomatic. Such treatment is considered an invitation by the gleaming hoodlum to renew his life of crime. As though this were not enough, scores of other persons who witness this "soft justice" swing confidently into illegal operations.

A distinguished Federal judge with almost 40 years experience on the bench has advised me it is his belief that countless potential offenders are drawn into crime with the hope that they will not have to face strictly the consequences of their unlawful acts. He feels these individuals gamble on the sporting chance that because others have been very lightly dealt with, they will have the same chance of escape. It is indeed unfortunate that more jurists and administrators do not share his insight.

The administration of justice goes hand in hand with the fight against criminality. We shall see no abatement in the scourge of lawlessness as long as "soft justice" is the vogue. Our legal machinery in some areas has long since departed from its primary purpose — the protection of society. It remains to be seen how long the people of the nation will tolerate this injustice.

NORMAL SCHOOL PALS REUNITED AFTER 53 YEARS

Many people make lasting acquaintances at college and C. C. Lame of Lewiston is no exception. His college roommate, Dr. Ernest G. Bashor of Los Angeles, dropped in for a visit Wed., July 25 — 53 years after the two, students at Lewis-Clark Normal School, parted company. Bashor and Lame had not met since the day in 1909, when Dr. Bashor moved to California.

Lame recalls both played baseball at school and both worked hard to get through school. "Bashor used to pump a church organ to make his way through school."

Bashor's father, George W. Bashor, owned a farm on American ridge near Kendrick, and later at Gifford until 1909, when he moved his family to California. Lame used to work on the Bashor farm during the summer. Since their normal school days Lame has become a realtor, Dr. Bashor a physician and surgeon.

The former roommates have corresponded little during the 53 years. "We have an awful lot to visit about," Lame said.

DEATH CLAIMS O. E. HAVENS

A retired banker and civic volunteer, O. E. (Ebb) Havens, 74, died Friday morning at the Hillhaven Nursing Home in Bremerton, Wash., after a five-month illness, following a stroke.

A resident of Bremerton and Port Orchard since 1941, Mr. Havens worked at the Bremerton Trust and Savings Bank, also as a deputy collector of internal revenue before his retirement. Since then he had been active in civic affairs, having been stricken while he was doing volunteer work at the Kitsap county courthouse, Feb. 28. He was aiding in the county-wide enrollment for civil defense emergency rationing program.

Born at Masonville, Iowa, October 12, 1887, he and Emma Hussman were married Sept. 30, 1915, in Ferdinand, Idaho, where he was a cashier in a bank. He also had been associated with banks in the Spokane area.

Mr. Havens was the cashier of The Farmers Bank, Kendrick, Idaho, for some three years, preceding the family's move to Bremerton.

Surviving are his wife, Emma, at the family home at 709 Park Ave.; three daughters, Mrs. Frank (Leasel) Abrams of Kendrick, Idaho; Mrs. Phillip (Mary) Droubin of Bremerton, and Mrs. William (Wilfred) Truemper of Bremerton; two sisters, Mrs. Carl Fish of Orofino, Idaho, and Mrs. Alfred Anderson of Longview, Wash.; four brothers, Ira W. of Juliaetta, Idaho; James of Masonville, Iowa; Vern of Boise, Idaho, and John of Moscow, Idaho, and 15 grandchildren.

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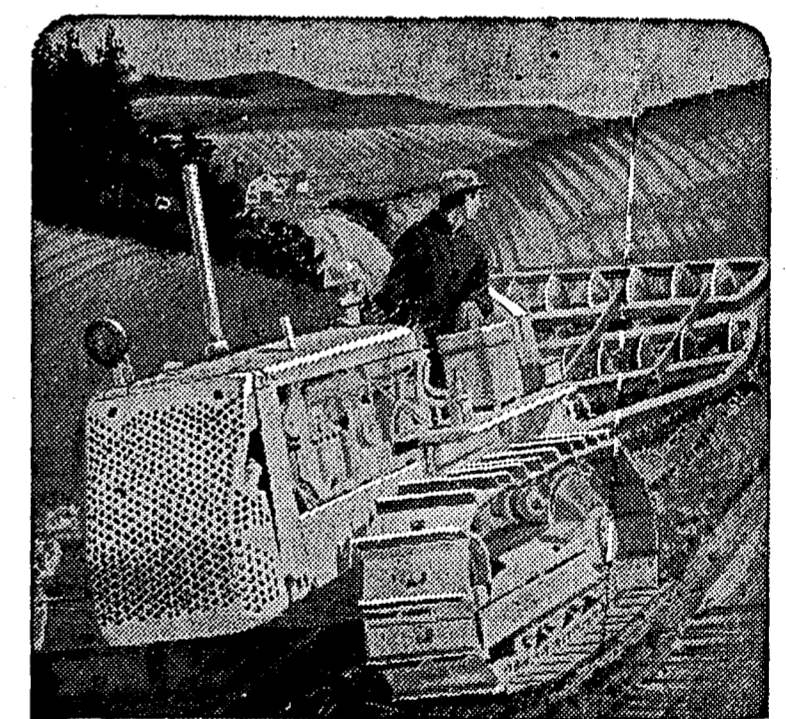
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
