YIELDS GIRL'S BODY

The body of Donna Fay Stamper eight-year-old Lewiston girl who drowned June 16 when she slipped from a rock into Fish Creek, was found Friday afternoon by two Kamiah fishermen.

The girl was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Neal D. Stamper, 924 Warner Ave., Lewiston. The accident occurred while the family was on a fishing trip.

Donna slipped from a large rock into the swift current of the creek close to its junction with the Lochsa river. A Kamiah child drowned at the same spot a year earlier.

The body was found by Andrew Doty and his son, Floyd, who were fishing on the Lochsa. It was located just below Old Man's Creek. about five miles from the spot where Donna had slipped into the water. The body was wedged between two
